#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

It has been a year of great excitement and hard work for the merging committee of Briars and the Greenlees Bowling Club. This last year ending September 2006 has witnessed the birth of the new entity of Briars at Greenlees Ltd and it gives me great pleasure to report on our progress over this period.

The merger has provided a great base to grow our sporting teams and provide the Canada Bay community with a club that can cater for all their needs. Improvements in the Club to date include the new interior of the Club, new card membership and an upgrade of the audio and visual facilities. The recent purchase of eight new poker machines has assisted in increased turnover and participation within the Club. The Board is still very active in progressing the total refurbishment of the Club and have plans in with Council for approval at the time of writing. This would substantially upgrade all facilities for members and cater for individual Club and personal needs.

On the sporting front, our successful retention of the Cricket Club Championship gave the new club a great boost in our first year. This success spilled over into all sports with increased participation in all areas – bowls, hockey and rugby all saw a renewed vigour. Rugby was ultimately successful in the Club Championship and major grades. (I will leave the sports results and the successes to be aired by the sporting chairpersons in their reports). Undoubtedly the profile that Briars at Greenlees now has in the community will assist further in those positive outcomes on the sporting field.

It has been a major exercise in establishing Briars at Greenlees Ltd - merging all the sports, their individual needs and nuances, providing a new accounting system and implementing financial systems to cover a much larger business. Members should take note in the financial pages of the enlarged business structure. This would not have been possible without the positive attitude of your Board and management. To this end I thank the Board and our General Manager, Glen Taylor, for providing this great base to grow. To all our cheerful staff, thanks for your patience during the year and the great results to come. To all sponsors, thank you for your help in assisting our sporting teams in their great achievements.

Finally, many thanks to all members for assisting positively in this merger and the understanding that we are building a club with great merit. Also thanks to the Mayor and the City of Canada Bay for their continued contribution to the Club's course.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

I have pleasure in presenting the first Treasurers' Report for the amalgamated club. This report is for sixteen months due to the change of year-end from May 31 to September 30. Comparisons from the previous year are of little relevance as these figures included only the Greenlees Park Bowling Club and not The Briars Sporting Club financials. The Briars Sporting Club financials have been included since January 2006. From this date membership has doubled and significant items of revenue for the year are Poker Machine Net Profit increased 70.8% and Bar Sales Net Profit increased 226.6% with Overhead Operating Expenses increasing by 99.0%.

Another significant area is the increase in cash flow \$387,100 with a balance of \$699,527 and net assets of the Club are \$3,605,493. An independent valuation of the two premises was carried out in November 2006 and will be reviewed for Balance Sheet purposes in the current financial year. The introduction of a point of sale computer system and membership database during the year has provided management with better stock control, pricing percentages, and allocation of grants to the sports. Management is trying to have as many members on email so as to reduce costs and improve information to members.

Finally many thanks to Bill Hooker, Phil McAulay, John Windon and Glen Taylor for their help during the year in consolidating the amalgamation accounts which was not an easy task and installing systems which will provide a sound financial base for future years.

At September 30 2006, there were twenty-one members of The Foundation and total assets stood at \$191,598. There are now three past members, Don Walker, Doug Prowse and Don Way.

Don Way died earlier this year, and is an example of a member who had chosen to apply a codicil to his will to The Foundation's benefit. In this instance an amount of \$25,000. A wonderful gesture from a man who enjoyed sixty-five years of Briars membership.

During this past year the Foundation provided \$10,000 for junior Rugby development, which was well managed by the Rugby committee.

Funds have also been approved for the resurfacing of the hockey field at Cintra, and the Foundation will provide \$150,000 towards that cost.

Perhaps the most important decision taken by the Directors was to explore the possibility of future donations being tax deductible. The benefits would be obvious, and we believe that it would produce new members as well as encourage fresh donations from existing members.

Negotiations have been proceeding all year with the Australian Sports Foundation and, at the time of writing, a Grant Agreement is being finalised, and we are keen to have all of the accounting and administration details in place in the next two months.

On the basis that such a structure could be established, twelve Briars have pledged an amount of \$111,000.

In the coming year, the Foundation is committed to assisting with the funds necessary for major renovations to the clubrooms and to the lights at Greenlees Park, which will be a new training venue for Rugby.

The renovations will provide additional administration space for the management of the various sports, and for the storage and display of trophies and Briars sporting memorabilia.

As is always the case, new Foundation members will be eagerly sought to assist the club with its objective of providing first class sporting facilities for all members.

I appreciate the support and interest of the Directors, and thank John Randle for his work as Treasurer and Keith Wearne for the preparation of the company's accounts.

### CRICKET CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Unbelievable! That is one of the few words to describe the season 2005/06. For the 4<sup>th</sup> time is 4 years and for the 9<sup>th</sup> time in the past 13 seasons we have won the most prestigious trophy, the CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP. As well as this magnificent achievement we were also able to win the 1<sup>st</sup> grade premiership for the first time since 1999/2000 and the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade premiership for the third year in succession! Our 2<sup>nd</sup> grade were Minor Premiers (again) but were unable to continue their good form in the semis and the 4<sup>th</sup> grade and Under 24 teams were both narrowly defeated in their respective Grand Finals. Finally, our 5<sup>th</sup> grade were also semi finalists so you can see that it was a season like no other in that we were in contention to win four Premierships and a Club Championship all in the same season.

To complete our success Rothwell Park, through the efforts of Adam Powell, was voted the Shires Ground of the Year for the second year in succession. What an achievement by everyone and congratulations to all the players who contributed in some way to our success.

Although there was plenty of success on the field it is no doubt a reflection of the efforts of a few members off the field that allows us to continue with the amazing run of outstanding performances.

In no particular order I would like to thank the following people who have assisted me in some way during the past season. The playing of sport nowadays is becoming a very costly exercise and as such it is vital that we seek out sponsors to help fulfil any projects we wish to achieve. The involvement of Venus Packaging for the last 7-8 years has coincided with much of the Club's success and on behalf of all the cricketers I would like to thank Ian Venus for his involvement.

Although we play serious cricket and are committed each week there are occasions when we may need a player or 2 to fill in for a game. This happened regularly during the year and I would like to thank the many players who helped us out in any small way.

Each season the Club competes with Epping for the Turnbull/Richardson Trophy and is awarded to the club that secures the most Club Championship points in the matches between the 2 clubs. For the 15<sup>th</sup> successive season we won the trophy. Well done boys.

On behalf of all the cricketers I would also like to thank the staff and management of Briars at Greenlees for their assistance and service to all the cricketers during the season.

Our Annual Presentation evening was held once again at Nudis on the Green and the 100 or so in attendance had an enjoyable night. #### CRICKET FIRST GRADE - PREMIERS

What a wonderful season we had. After a couple of seasons where we were competitive but just not good enough the Club were fortunate to recruit a group of very good players who were able to combine with our own very talented group of players to win the prestigious 1<sup>st</sup> Grade Premiership. Throughout the season there was only about 15 or 16 different players used in the team and this stability obviously helped the guys to form a very tight unit who completely dominated the big end of season matches.

The team was very slow out of the blocks winning only 1 of their first 4 games before they absolutely decimated the hapless Strathfield team. We dismissed them on a good batting wicket for only 72 with Anthony Raymond, Ash Squire and Hilal Dannaoui destroying the opposition. We then set about scoring some quick runs to finish at 151 before the bowlers once again had Strathfield in big trouble at 3-12 at the days end. Day 2 was a washout when all other grades played. This game seemed to help the team click into gear as they then demolished Roseville with Dannaoui taking 5 wickets and Cameron French 4 in a cameo appearance. Cameron with 44, Ben Crawley (66x) and Sean McKiernan (44x) then finished the game off.

The final game before Christmas was a 1 day game against Macquarie University. We batted first and fought well to score 9/211 thanks to skipper Damon Smiths 74x, Ben Chapman (26), Brett Hawgood (28) and Dannaoui (27). Sean McKiernan, in his first game with the ball then took 5-13 off nearly 10 overs to set up an excellent victory and keep the boys on a roll.

First game back after Christmas was against Auburn who were in the top 2 at the time. Not for long. After being sent in on a wet wicket in a reduced over match the boys smashed their way to 8-259 off only 47 overs with Ash Squire (80), Ben Chapman (41) and Damon Smith (36) leading the way. Auburn were then bowled out for only 217 with Hilly taking another 3 wickets.

Round 9 saw us up against the lowly placed Georges River who were dismissed for 19, Hilly, Sean and Ash all taking 3 wickets each. We were 2-95 overnight when play was washed out the next week!

The next round is one to forget where Pennant Hills scored plenty and beat us easily with Damon Smith scoring 58, Anthony Smith 40 and Craig Parkinson 42. We faired a little better in our 2<sup>nd</sup> innings with Ash (41), Chappo (60) and Damon Smith (49) all batting well.

With the run into the semis now well under way the team seemed to lift in their performances with some very good victories resulting. Against Southern Districts we dismissed them for only 205 with Paul Panutti taking 3 wickets. Some good batting followed as Sean McKiernan (101x), Craig Parkinson (74) and Ash Squire (40) all scored well to set up an easy victory.

Round 13 versus Lindfield saw a very dominating performance from the team as they dismissed Lindfield for only 132 and 95. Dannaoui took 9 wickets for the match and McKiernan took 6 after the batters scored 5-264 off only 39 overs! Squire (81), Hawgood (50) and Anthony Smith (40x) starred.

In the last round before the semis the top spots were up for grabs as we played 2<sup>nd</sup> placed Warringah on a traditionally dodgy Weldon wicket. A brilliant start of 81 between Parko and Squire was alter wasted as we were dismissed for only 161. The bowlers, led by Dannaoui with 4 wickets then had Warringah 9-143 before the last pair scored the required runs in a very close finish in the last over.

QUALIFYING FINAL vs Warringah - The rematch of the previous game once again saw us batting first. The batsman played much better this time around as we amassed 276 with Ash Squire (98) and Anthony Smith (63) batting brilliantly. The bowlers then continued their good work to dismiss Warringah for 188 with Dannaoui taking another 4 wickets.

SEMI FINAL vs Lane Cove - After losing the 1<sup>st</sup> game of the season to Lane Cove the boys were very keen for revenge and what a performance it was. After having Lane Cove 7-77 at one stage they recovered to score a respectable 214 with McKiernan taking 5-17 off 18 overs! The batsmen then took over as they smashed their way to 2-221 and a wonderful victory. Ben Chapman fell just short of a century with 94 and McKiernan batted his way to a man of the match performance with an unbeaten 71.On to the final.

GRAND FINAL vs South Sydney - A game against another of the teams who defeated us in the rounds South Sydney. After winning the toss and batting Souths were soon in strife at 2-8. The wickets continued and we eventually dismissed them for only 152 with Steve Harvey and Ash Squire each taking 3 wickets. The loss of an early wicket kept Souths in the game before Chapman and Ash took the score to 60 before Chapman was out in the last over of the day. The game was poised in our favour overnight but McKiernan and Squire took the score to 100 before Ash was dismissed for 31.McKiernan continued on his merry way later combining with skipper Damon Smith (41) to easily pass the total and then score yet another century and later be awarded the medal for Man of the Match. The score finished at 6-242 before the game was called off and the celebrations began

Damon Smith - led the side very well in his return to the club. Scored 558 runs at 55.80 with a highest score of 101x against Epping. Tried to bowl on occasions as well and took 9 catches. Great season.

Sean McKiernan - had a sensational season scoring 516 runs at 49.16 including an unbeaten century in the final and a score in the 90's. Also took 30 wickets opening the bowling and was awarded the Player of the final medal.

Ben Chapman - including under 24's Chappo scored 923 runs at an average of 51.28. Tops score in 1st grade was 94 in the semi final and has stepped up to be a top class player.

Ash Squire -was voted Players player by his team mates in a wonderful season. Scored 619 runs including 98 against Warringah in the qualifying Final and also took 17 wickets. A future leader of the club.

Ben Crawley - in his first year with the club played well. Scored over 300 runs including 83 vs Souths and 63x against Roseville. Shared the keeping duties with Anthony Smith taking 19 catches.

Anthony Smith - another new boy to the club who probably didn't perform to his potential. Came good at the right end of the season with a match winning 63 in the semi vs Warringah.

Hilal Dannaoui - Hilly led the bowling attack throughout the season taking 49 wickets off 273 overs. Completely outplayed the Strathfield batsmen taking 5 wickets in the day before the day 2 wash out and regularly took wickets in his opening spell. Excellent season.

Steve Harvey - combined with Hilly and Sean to form a pretty lethal bowling attack taking 20 wickets with a best of 5-40. Great team man who rarely batted.

Peter Catalovski - his first season in 1<sup>st</sup> grade taking 11 wickets but played his support role very well behind his strike bowlers. Did not bat very often but a good season as well.

**Brett Hawgood** - to his surprise played 11 games in 1's after starting in the lower grades but played a very important role batting in the top order. With 2 scores of 50 he deserved his spot and the premiership cap. Can't bowl though.

Craig Parkinson - joined the team later in the season due to work commitments but still able to score over 300 runs. Chipped in with 10 wickets at crucial times as well. Hope to see him more often next season.

Anthony Raymond - started the season in 1's taking 11 wickets and scoring a valuable 49 against Souths. was relocated to 2's where he became a key player. Still a bit of life left in him.

#### CRICKET SECOND GRADE

Firstly, congratulations to Damon Smith and the 1<sup>st</sup> grade side and to Jason Harris and the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade side on their tremendous success in winning their respective finals. I'd like to extend particular thanks to Gerard Price and Brett Howle for their efforts in making my job a lot easier during the season. Also, a big thank you to all of the players that played 2<sup>nd</sup> grade this season, 25 players in total. Every one of these players contributed to the team; their commitment and attitude built a foundation that helped the side claim another minor premiership! It was an honour to captain the side and even though we didn't reach our ultimate goal of winning the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade final, I think we can be very proud of our season reviewed as follows:

- Minors premiers finishing on 80 pts, 20 pts clear of 2nd placed South Sydney.
- Contribution of 400 points to the club championship, which we won again by a margin of 51 points over Warringah.
- We recorded three outright wins against Georges River, Pennant Hills & South Districts.
- In our three one-day matches, we won each of these games and gained the maximum of 2 extra
  bonus pts. These games were against Macquarie Uni, and also Auburn & Warringah (two of the
  teams that qualified for the semi-finals in 2nd grade).
- We had 3 losses in the rounds, these were against last seasons final-winners Holroyd Hills, who finished 5th this season; Epping, when we were sent in on a soft pitch, then we nearly managed to beat them outright on the second day; and Pennant Hills, who we did eventually beat outright on the 2nd day.
- The turning point of our season was in Rd 4 when, after a slow start to the season, just 1 win from 3 matches, we beat South Sydney. Peter Catalovski in his first and only game for us in 2's, as he was then promoted to 1st grade for the remainder of the season, bowled absolutely superbly to take 6 / 52. Brett Hawgood steered us home with 62 n.o.

Some of our best performers during the season were:

Wayne Grimson scored 467 runs @ 38.92, usually batted at no.5, but was very successful as an opener in the one-dayers. His top-score of 128 v Macquarie Uni at Rothwell was a devastating for the visitors, but highly entertaining for his Briars team mates. He also took 12 wickets @ 11.92; with best bowling of 4/4, took 8 catches and effected 4 run-outs.

Andrew Jalalatay scored 311 runs @ 25.92 with a top-score of 73 n.o. and, as our wicket-keeper, was very reliable with 27 catches and 2 stumpings. Andrew has a bright future with the club and I expect him to push towards cementing a spot in the 1st grade side.

Brett Hawgood, who only played 4 games before establishing a spot in 1st grade, scored 154 runs @ 38.5.

David Willis finished the season with 580 runs @ 41.43 with a top-score of 128 n.o. v Strathfield.

Phil Tregeagle, scored 250 runs @ 25, with a top score of 58.

Gerard Price, claimed yet another 44 wickets this season @ 9.16; his best bowling outing was 5 / 18, plus he weighed in with 220 valuable runs @ 27.5. The Chairman was a stand-out performer, yet again.

Paul Pannuti, took 18 wickets @ 8.28 from just 5 matches, including the best figures for the season of 6 / 25 v Auburn.

Unfortunately, we couldn't continue our solid form right through to the finals series and we bowed after losing to Auburn and then to South Sydney in the semis. It was important that whilst we weren't playing in a final, the 2nd graders gave some good support to our other grades playing in the finals...sharing in the success, that's what makes this club stand out from the others.

Special thanks must go to Mrs Grimson who was our most loyal supporter throughout the season and went to the trouble of providing lunch for the players on many occasions and a supply of Kleenex tissues for those batsmen, who were visibly upset, each time they threw their wickets away.

The wicket takers were Steve Hudson with 5 for 48 from 10 overs and Brendon Warburton bowled well taking 2 for 20.

Round 7 was against South Sydney at Alan Davidson Oval. We lost the toss and Souths elected to bat first. Due to some excellent bowling from Dereck Welsh 4-17 from 9 overs and Mark Smyck 2-26 off 10 overs, we bowled Souths out for 160 in 48 overs. We batted, we got the runs in the 32<sup>nd</sup> over, thanks to a well made 49 from Andrew Jones and Ben Crawley making 30. With this win it ensured that we got a home quarter final.

The quarter final was against Epping. With Epping winning the toss, they elected to bat first at Rothwell. We bowled and fielded well and kept them to a reasonable score of 202 off their 50 overs. The standout bowlers for us were Dereck Welsh taking 3-17 off 10 overs and Steve Hudson taking 3-25 of his 10 overs. We thought that this score was very gettable but with some poor batting from our top order, we were bowled out for 119. With Rob Jalalatay showing some fight scoring a well made 28. We came out to bat and we got the runs in the 19<sup>th</sup> over. Ben Crawley didn't muck around scoring 47 not out. This win set up a grand final spot for us.

Grandfinal vs Epping at Alan Davidson Oval: This was the 3<sup>rd</sup> time we played Epping in 24s this year and it was one win a piece. Epping won the toss and elected to bat first. Some good bowling from Mark Smyck 2-39 off 10 overs, Dereck Welsh 2-31 off 10 overs we kept Epping down to a gettable score off 202 off there 50 overs. With huge support from the 'Parko Stand', we thought we were in for a good chance of getting the runs. It wasn't to be with some good bowling and fielding from Epping they bowled us out for 74 in the 27<sup>th</sup> over. A disappointing result on the day but we did extremely well to make it to the Grandfinal.

I have to thank everyone from the club who came down to the games this year and supported the guys and for everyone turning up for the final. The guys in the team thought if was awesome playing in front of everyone.

#### RUGBY CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

THE TRUTH IS: First year as Rugby Chairman, I was very disappointed with season 05's results. To win and enjoy success was not only what I wanted but what other Briars had wanted for Rugby for a long time. 2005 comprised of finishing 7th in the Club Championship, Seventh in 2nd, 3rd & 4th Grade and 1st Grade bowing out in the final against Epping. At the Briars Annual Dinner, Mal Weber asked Ashley Walsh and I what was needed for Rugby to move forward and we spoke of our ideas. John Threlfro gave examples of successful teams and sports within Briars. Ian "The Beast" Richards told us how to execute them and who could help. He pointed us in the direction of a Briars Great.

CHRIS WALKER: I met with Chris the following Tuesday afternoon at Kirribilli and realised after meeting Chris what it meant to be a Briar. That afternoon laid the foundation for the season ahead. The basic principles were to recruit coaches that could recruit players, have coaches for every grade, bring in a forwards specialist coach, raise player fitness to peak levels and play Rugby the way it was meant to be, free flowing and running with the ball in hand.

ONE GOAL: The 2006 Club Championship. As a Committee, we agreed in late November, to prepare Briars Rugby to win and that nothing else mattered. Initial concerns were for player morale and the future ahead.

SUPER LEAGUE: What would happen to those Briars who had been with the club for a while, loved playing and not at the skill level that our lower grades required for the grand plan? Peter "Indy" Kelly took on the role as 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Coach of Briars Halligan's Cup side, now known famously as "The Briars Superleague". This simple concept proved successful but so important for a club making the jump to the next division by providing a blooding ground that increases depth for a club, a grade where anybody could get a game but most importantly bring back to rugby those Briars who could not overly commit due to the demands of modern day society. We had to look after these Briars and Superleague was for that purpose.

UNDER19s: Had to happen and for our future! Promotion to the next division requires U21 Colts and the devotion by Simon "Punchy" James establishing Briars U19s programme rewarded the Club. Naturally not an easy age group to deal with, the bond that Simon developed between his players and constant emphasis of enjoying Rugby was a sign that our younger Briars have the substance of a new generation. Our concerns were that this grade would struggle and not see the season out. Punchy had to deal with forfeits and short numbers on a few occasions, but reminding his boys what they were capable of had proved that sticking together as mates and playing for each other was what being part of a team is all about. In their inaugural year our Briars U19s had five selected for the New South Wales Suburban Rugby Union's U19s Representative training squad. Andrew Gregson and Luke Sanders went onto represent NSW and the Briars U19s side made the semi-finals. For a group of lads, and for most had never played rugby before, they made us proud of their achievements. Further skill development will see these Briars enjoy U21s Colts and refine their already spectacular style of rugby. Without the efforts of Simon James and Father in law Norm White, U19s would never have happened.

THE NEW GENERATION: Was Briars "Slogan", for 2006. As a Committee now with control, we wanted a fresh start for Rugby. Our returning players and new recruits had to realise our "One Goal" and it was made very clear at our joint season launch with the Greenlees Park Bowlers. Introduced to Briars was Teki Tuipulotu who had joined us from Parramatta as Club and 1<sup>st</sup> Grade Coach, ex Sydney Rooster Grant Hyde as Fitness trainer, defensive specialist and 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade Coach, ex 1<sup>st</sup> Grade Briar now 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Coach Ben Underhill, and 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Coach Robert Walsh (Father of 1<sup>st</sup> Grade Hooker Ashley). A fun day was had and new players made welcome at our new home at Briars at Greenlees.

Preseason training started early on the 31<sup>st</sup> January with the 1<sup>st</sup> week comprising of fitness testing and sprint work. Numbers in the first week had increased by 20 over the usual 30 of previous seasons. Many new faces joined the preseason period and the general feeling of training together as a Club, was experienced. Over the four trials planned, three were only played and an exciting one against the Bathurst Bulldogs that Chris Walker had organised against his Brother David's club and reigning country west premiers. Briars in their first outing tamed the Bulldogs, defeating them in all four scheduled trial matches. The final trial against Epping was unfortunately postponed due to a rain soaked pitch.

Our season started with some interesting results and as the season progressed, Briars Rugby began to blossom with convincing wins over the competition. Weakness in our game was observed by the eagle eye of our Briars piers Tony Wozniak, Terry O'Kane, Scott McGill and our in house tactical genius Chris Walker. Their observations and input was vital in our play being corrected, especially Christian Burden who

guided our dominating forward packs. Col Dennis and Chris Walker provided a scouting service in travelling to opposition matches. They collated important data of opposition teams and held briefing sessions on our rained out training nights of what to expect in our next encounters. Towards the end of the season this became crucial as the run for the Club Championship post was a close one. In the final round Briars played Christian Brothers Old Boys whilst Oatley played Blue Mountains at the daunting Lapstone Oval. We had to win two matches with one being at least 1<sup>st</sup> grade to take out the Club Champs, Oatley had to win all four to overtake us. The day of round 18, Briars played CBOBS early with 4<sup>th</sup> grade kicking off at 10am. Bob Stephenson kept in mobile phone contact with Chris and Col who were at the mountains. Chris in his ever-smooth business like manner let the Oatley secretary know at half time during their second grade match that Briars had beaten CBOBs in all four games and our scores.

HICCUPS & HURDLES: Discipline was an issue at the beginning rounds with concerns expressed from NSWSRU. Violent encounters against the Oatley and St George clubs were unfortunate. Some testing measures were imposed by the Committee and NSWSRU. Our tolerable limit had been reduced with the likelihood of a 4<sup>th</sup> established offence would have us to show just cause for remaining in the competition. At that time and I did hate to admit it but Briars Rugby was in "Damage Control". I worked out where we had failed. Lengthy phone conversations with Ian Blair and Milton Howell assisted in implementing the necessary measures to ensure Briars remained in the competition. What I had overlooked was the fact that we had a good disciplinary record and merely assumed that the mass of new players would follow suit, and realised that the traditional Briars new member's night (now no more) is a very important tool in educating new players of our traditions and how they should represent Briars. What did the Committee do? We made the players responsible for their actions. From that point we educated them on how discipline had its advantages in playing smarter and how you could turn it into points. We also made the boys aware of the consequences a simple indiscretion could cost the Club and the individual responsible would be made to pay. Other Clubs did find out about the crisis Briars was in and began to bait us. Late tackles in back play and "Cheap Shots", on our players became part and parcel of the game. The composure of our boys weathering the season was outstanding and a credit to them. Failing to retaliate started to upset those Clubs who resorted to un-sportsman like tactics. The return match against Oatley at Evatt Park was the turning point of the season. We had to win this round with all 4 grades to peg back Oatley who were 1st in the Club Championship even though we had a round up our sleeve due to a rained out Saturday. We knew it wasn't going to be easy and the coaching staff had prepared us well. Much to Oatley's disgust and frustration, Briars beat Oatley in 1st, 2nd, 3rd Grade and drew in 4th Grade. We also reminded them who we were by all Briars (including spectators) joining together and singing "California". Evatt Park is in the middle of a valley. The suburbs of Oatley and Lugarno could hear us singing. How sweet it was and also loud!

With the Oatley return game and Club Championship hurdles overcome there was one hurdle in between that gave us the jump on the competition and that being a back-to-back weekend. Due to a Round 9 wash out and being washed out from the make up wash out match, we had to play two rounds in a spare second wash out weekend, CBOBs on a Saturday and Hunters Hill on the Sunday. Although a big weekend of Rugby, the coaches prepared us well again. Ellen Gant from Kevin Ivins Chiropractic treated our injuries as she did all season and old Briar Andrew Craig lent a hand in reducing our soreness by supplying mobile ice baths for our boys. We managed 6 out of 8 matches that weekend.

GREAT PLAYERS. I was privileged to play amongst some great Briars this season. Playing beside Chris Lamond a Briar who had 17 years experience with our club captained our 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade side to winning the Farrant Cup for the first time in Briars history. "Lahar's", half time talks were always short and to the point. As the "Older Bloke", in the side it was his job to lead by example and Chris did this effectively week in and week out. Members of the 2006 Briars 2<sup>nd</sup> XV Premiership winning side were ex soldier Tony Watts, Daniel Martin, David "Mudguts" Fiorio, Matthew Shepherdson, Peter Etches, Patrick Schramm, Isi Penitani, Lloyd Fatafehi, Ben Tuipulotu, Maka Latu, Shane Boag, Daniel McPhee, Billy Splidias, Sione Vahai, Alex Viane, John Filipana and the ever talented Craig Douglass.

If confidence has something to do with winning it is a by-product of intelligence. Being able to play amongst our 1<sup>st</sup> Grade side against St George gave me insight and reaffirmed my belief that this side had what it took to be premiers. Leadership on the field was not only limited to the Captain Ashley Walsh. Peter Watkins, James Nott, Matthew "Ninja" Want, Lachlan White and Sean Hudson shared the role throughout the season. Overcoming their early 2 match losses Briars 1<sup>st</sup> XV motored through the season getting better and better every game. The cool hands of Adam Dowling at inside centre and speed just wide at 13 of Mirsad Halep combined well. Established wingers Aaron Maloy and Sisi Tuipulotu teamed up with our Fijian Flyer James Lagiloa at fullback. Engine Room men Kerri Constanti, Club Captain Aaron Boyter, Charlie Guttenbiel and Andrew Arquilla were instrumental of a winning juggernaut forward pack. The most dynamic player of 1<sup>st</sup> Grade and team mate of the Briars pack was James King. Young and with a great

future in Rugby, James King is the best athlete I've seen play for Briars and many senior Briars would agree. A No.8 that can play 6, 7,11,12,13,14 and with a devastating clearing kick at 15 has a brilliant future ahead of him in our sport if he choose its path. On September 9th, Briars 1st XV's dream of being premiers was answered with a 29-14 victory over Hawkesbury Valley in atrocious conditions. Bob Clarke's trophy "The Holy Grail", returned home to its rightful owners.

Many players who are not named contributed to 1st and 2nd Grades achievements and this is reflected in 3rd and 4th Grades Division 3 results. Our Coaches belief in blooding U19's, 3rd, 4th and 5th graders by giving them a taste of 1st and 2nd grade were not only for development of skills but also for rewarding a player for his efforts and talent. What is important from my view is that as a Club all players acknowledged that they contributed to Briars success this season. Individuals did not make us Club Champions.



## SQUASH

Squash, as a sport, saw a dramatic change this year in the way that the pennant sport is played. All players that I have talked to use the web based system to get an idea of who they are playing and take great delight in viewing player history. While the Association's executive may not have got the changed competition format correct, they have certainly got it correct with the matrix, and that has generated a lot more interest in the game. 2006 AUTUMN PENNANT - Briars entered five teams into the winter pennant played from March to July this year. While we managed to get three out of our five sides into Grand Finals, that was where the excitement ended. While one of the sides was expected to be an absolute shoe-in all three sides lost. It was a most disappointing finish to a great season.

B1 TEAM - Racked by injury and unavailability of players the team struggled throughout the competition but did manage to come in second. This put them into a preliminary final for a shot at the top team. Olympic were the third placed side who had beaten Briars twice out of the three rounds, so Briars headed into the preliminary final as underdogs. They got up on the night and then looked forward to playing Wenty Leagues in the Grand final. Briars had beaten the side in round fourteen so it was not totally against the odds for a win. #### NOTE 1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001. The financial report of Briars at Greenlees Limited complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) in their entirety. The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the economic entity in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

BASIS OF PREPARATION

First-time Adoption of Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards.

Briars at Greenlees Limited has prepared financial statements in accordance with the Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) from 1st July 2005.

In accordance with the requirements of AASB 1: First-time Adoption of Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards, adjustments to Briars at Greenlees Limited resulting from the introduction of AIFRS have been applied retrospectively to 2005 comparative figures excluding cases where optional exemptions available under AASB 1 have been applied. These accounts are the first financial statements of Briars at Greenlees Limited to be prepared in accordance with Australian equivalents to IFRS.

The accounting policies set out below have been consistently applied to all years presented. Briars at Greenlees Limited has however elected to adopt the exemptions available under AASB 1 relating to AASB 132: Financial Instruments: Disclosure and Presentation, and AASB 139: Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement and the Registered Club Act and the Gaming Machine Tax Act.

#### REPORTING BASIS AND CONVENTIONS

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

#### a) Revenue Recognition

Sales Revenue

Sales Revenue comprises revenue earned from the provision of catering, beverage, and poker machine facilities to members and other patrons of the Club. Sales revenue is recognised when the goods and services are provided.

Asset Sales

The gross proceeds of asset sales are included as revenue of the entity. The profit or loss on disposal of assets is brought to account at the date an unconditional contract of sale is signed.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised as it accrues.

#### b) Principal Activities

The company operates as a Licensed Sporting and Bowling Club.

#### c) Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are included at cost or at an independent valuation. All fixed assets, including buildings and capitalised leases, but excluding freehold land, are depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

#### d) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not legal ownership are transferred to the company, are classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalised recording an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual value. Leased assets are amortised over their estimated useful lives. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

#### e) Depreciation of property, plant and equipment

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis to write off the net cost or revalued amount of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over its expected useful life. The exception is glassware, crockery and cutlery, which is expensed in the year of purchase. Estimates of remaining useful lives are made on a regular basis for all assets, with annual reassessments for major items.

Depreciation of assets is calculated using the straight line/diminishing value methods to allocate their cost or revalued amounts, net of their residual values, over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount (Note 7).

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the income statement. When revalued assets are sold, it is company policy to transfer the amounts included in other reserves with respect to those assets to retained earnings.

#### f) Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the club prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

#### g) Maintenance and repairs

The costs of maintenance, repairs and minor renewals are charged as expenses are incurred.

#### h) <u>Employee Entitlements</u>

(i) Wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave Liabilities for wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave are recognised and are measured as the amount unpaid at the reporting date at current pay rates in respect of employees' services up to that date.
