CRICKET

CLUB ROOMS

An extensive refurbish was completed in the past year. A total of \$42,600.00 was outlaid to provide new bar equipment, carpets, office, re-painting throughout. Our thanks to Richard Crookes and Craig Hickey for "Getting it Done". Some minor cosmetics remain to be done together with further display of Club Memorabilia.

A significant feature of the "New Look" is the display of international rugby jerseys in the glass case over the main bar. Our thanks to R.E.M. (Bill) McLaughlin for making this donation.

PERSONNEL

It is still of some concern to the Board of the number of players not adequately "processed" as financial members.

We should also be paying closer attention to the induction of new members, as I am sure our turnover of one-season players, in all sports, could be greatly reduced.

Bob Bishop retires after 3 years as Personnel Chairman and we thank Bob for his past work.

I regret to advise members of a misappropriation of club funds that was revealed in October last year. The funds have since been fully recovered, together with interest outstanding. The Club has adopted measures which, if followed, should prevent a similar situation arising.

It was also sad to note the passing of Stan McGregor, a Vice-President of the Club and without doubt one of our greatest supporters. Further mention in detail, of Stan's membership is noted later in the report.

Two directors are retiring at the Annual Meeting. Keith Wearne and Richard Crookes. They have both been of great assistance to the Board and we thank them for their valuable contribution.

This year also will see Craig Hickey retire as Hon. Admin. Exec. Officer. Craig has given outstanding service to the Club, in various offices, and we thank him for his contribution in the above.

The Club is well placed financially. Major refurbish has been completed, and apart from some further minor interior decor additions, the only major expenditure would be on additional or replacement air-conditioning.

The 1981—82 Season can at best be described as disappointing. After the magnificent results of the previous Season, the performance of all teams, with the exception of the Under 16 Juniors, deteriorated.

Granted, there was not much room for improvement, however the overall keenness and dedication of members left a lot to be desired.

As previously mentioned, the keenness that had been so much to the fore during 1980—81, evaporated during the winter recess when a complete team (eleven players) declared themselves unavailable at the start of the Season for the Shire teams, for a variety of reasons. This was a blow from which we never really recovered.

Despite the disappointing results, the policy was pursued of encouraging as much as possible the younger players and the A Shire Team has the nucleus of a top team for many years to come.

The B Shires salvaged some belated glory by winning the end of season Limited Over Competition (for teams not competing in Semi-Finals), which was some comfort for just missing out on the Semi-Finals.

Alan Thompson, in his first Season as Captain of the C's, had the unenviable task of taking the field every match with a new combination and bore the brunt of the beginning of Season 'drop-outs", as well as the last minute withdrawals (colds, weddings, sore toes, etc.).

If players had a proper appreciation of the disruption caused by dropping out of a game at the last moment, I am certain that the practice would be less prevalent.

Our one premiership winning team was the Croydon — Briars Under 16 Team. I repeat the words that have been written on many occasions in the Annual Report, that our Association with the Croydon Cricket Club has been one of the most progressive moves in our history and has to be maintained if we are to survive as a major cricket playing Club.

The City and Suburban Team functioned in their own inimitable fashion and my personal thanks go to Col Dennis for removing from me any concern in getting a team on the field each week.

Regrettably the busy programme during the Season did not allow for the holding of a Double Wicket Competition, however we did entertain a team from Wagga, compete in the Macquarie University 6-a-side Competition, and played our now annual match at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

My thanks go to Ian Blair for his assistance in liaising with David Scoble in the organisation of the match against Wagga, which was a most enjoyable one and could become a regular feature of our Season.

In reporting on the 1980–81 Season, reference was made to the inadequacy of the Roth-well practice wicket, and the hope expressed for improvement in the near future. During the Season under review, agreement was reached with Concord Council for the provision of two (2) synthetic practice wickets at Majors Bay Reserve and these are scheduled for completion for the start of the 1982–83 Season.

With regard to mid-week practice at Rothwell Park, it is regrettable that the standard of the wicket did not allow for reasonable practice to be undertaken, however Steve Schomberg diligently looked after this function during the Season.

In conclusion, I wish to acknowledge the winning of the A Shires by Wentworthville, the B and C Shires by Epping, and the Club Championship by Lindfield — congratulations to those Clubs.

"A" SHIRE CRICKET REPORT, 1981-1982

After our premiership win of the previous season, the team was still on "cloud nine" at the start of this season. The side got away to a good start with a win in the first game but then the side came "back to earth" in a hurry by not winning a game until after Christmas. In the second half of the season we did not lose a game until the final round robin one-day game, which we lost by 3 runs and also lost that particular competition on a count back.

The introduction of younger players in the side took a while to settle in but by the end of the season they were performing admirably. Gerrard Price and Peter Caruanna came up from the winning "C" grade side and Paul Thomas took over the gloves from David Walker. At one stage there were five players who were under twenty-one years of age and there is no doubt that with a year's experience in the "A"s, the side should be back in the top four.

Over the fifteen games the side used seventeen players of which David Wright picked up glandular fever in the first game and David Walker made a brief return for one match, so the selectors to stay with a nucleus of players were rewarded with a fine performance after Christmas by the team, as mentioned earlier — only losing one game.

The weather in the first part of the season caused a problem, where one game was completely washed out and the following game the second Saturday was called off by Council the Friday before the match because damage could be done to the wicket, in hindsight, it was a hasty decision.

The captain again, had trouble with the toss, losing seven out of eleven. It has been noted that in our C & S side, they have a tossing captain.

It is also noted that while the captain was taking a leave of absence, trying to get some ideas on refereeing, Bill Hooker won three out of three.

Due to the lack of experience, the members of the side were run out on ten occasions, whereas we ran out the opposition on only five occasions. Experience will rectify this problem.

Another statistic which has been a problem area in this competition is the L.B.W. decision. We gave six and the opposition gave three — enough said on the subject.

Practice was not good this season, the main reason being the poor wicket preparation. We hope that a synthetic practice wicket area can be provided for next season, as was proven in 1980–1981, practice is most important.

The fielding generally was not up to the standard of the previous season. Too many catches were dropped and the ground fielding could have been better.

Many thanks to our resident 12th man, Col Dennis, filling in for players who had to miss games because of illness and injury.

Congratulations to Wenty for winning the "A" Shire Premiership for 1981-1982.

Finally, I would like to thank Peter Mansford for looking after cricket this Season and Bill Hooker captaining the side in my absence.

IAN BLAIR (Captain) Did not have a good season with the bat and a break mid-season did not help, but was pleased with the side's return to form in the latter half of the season.

BOB STREETER — Bob did not have a good season with the bat. An undefeated opening of 176 with Peter Caruanna against Auburn was a fine performance, Bob scoring 70. Did not field well in his customary position at first slip.

PETER CARUANNA — A fine season for Peter, coming up from the "C"s. Took a while to settle in but then played some fine innings. His 92 while batting with Bob Streeter was one of the highlights of the season. Must concentrate harder on his running between wickets and his fielding. Peter must make time to practice.

BILL HOOKER — The Captain left Bill in charge of a side that was not winning and deserves some of the credit for the good performance after Christmas. Bill started off the season in top form but this fell away until late in the season. Did not field as well as the previous season. Was given a bowl late in the season without luck.

BART POZUELO — As mentioned in previous reports, a player with a lot of potential but must keep his mind on the game. Had a fair season with bat and ball. The captain is convinced that Bart can lead the bowling and batting statistics each year if he concentrates. Always keen to practice.

GERRARD PRICE — Gerrard, like Peter, came up from the "C"s, and batted very well, scoring a fine 91 in his first innings in the "A"s. Fielded very well in all positions in the "A"s. Proved his all-round ability by bowling very well in the one-day games. Has a good future in cricket with the Club.

ROD SMITH — For the first time ever and very pleased to see, Rod leads the batting averages with a fine performance. Many words have been written about Rod throwing away an innings, but this season he had five not outs and good scores to go with them. Batting seven and eight saved the side on a number of occasions. Did not get much of a chance to bowl due to washed out games but when he did, bowled well. Did not field as well as usual.

NIGEL STERRY — Nigel returned to the Club after a short break from cricket and stood out more for his batting than bowling, with four not outs out of seven innings. He and Rod Smith took turns to save the side from batting collapses in some games. Lacked penetration in his bowling and gets upset easily, thus losing concentration which also affects his fielding.

PAUL THOMAS — Has taken over from David Walker and at the age of eighteen is proving a very capable keeper. Took 23 catches and one stumping, which is an excellent performance in his first season. Was not given much of a go with his batting until late in the season and put together a couple of good innings. Has a most promising future in batting and keeping with the Club.

STEVE SCHOMBERG — Steve was not available all season and then badly hurt his back late in the season, so for Steve, a most disappointing year. Did not get many opportunities with the bat, fielded well.

RICHARD TREGEAGLE — Another fine season by Richard, leading the bowling in aggregate and averages. Against Lane Cove, he took the first eight wickets in their first innings,

a fine performance, and against Warringah he took a hat-trick. For some reason he bowls better after Christmas than before, which seems to relate to the team's better showing in the latter half of the season. Fielded well.

B SHIRE CRICKET REPORT 1981 - 82

At first sight the 1981–82 season for the B Shire team may be said to have been disappointing. The team finished in fifth place after completion of the preliminary rounds only two points away from the semi-finals and a clear eight points ahead of sixth place. In perspective however, this showed to be a commendable effort particularly having regard to the fact that of the twelve regular players from the previous season's final only five were available for selection in the B team in the 1981–82 season.

As often happens in circumstances such as these, an offsetting factor arose in the introduction or reappearance to the B side of young players with plenty to offer the Club for the future in Adam Lax, Paul Price, Joe Catanzariti, Mark Powell, John Jessup, David Young and Claudio Orlando. This group, together with Craig Smith and the old stalwarts Mansford, Holley, Price and Richardson provided a well-balanced stable side proving a strong base for the team in the immediate future.

The season started with an unconvincing first up win, followed by three straight losses. The team went through a strong mid-season recovery with no further losses until the last round played against bottom of the ladder team Bexley. In hindsight a first innings win would have sufficed in this game for a semi-final berth to be obtained. However, after losing the toss and being sent in, Burwood did not apply itself well with either bat or ball and a chance of a place in the semi-finals for the third year in a row, was lost.

However there was some consolation at the end of the season with the team convincingly winning the limited over competition amongst the non semi-final participants. After a draw in the first game due to the weather the team went on to record crushing wins over Roseville, Lane Cove and Wentworthville, to end the season on a particularly fine note. Unfortunately, this form arrived one game too late.

The batting during the season lacked any real consistency. No one batsman was able to consolidate after a good start, with only two individual scores during the season being over 60.

Although missing the outstanding strike power of Terry Finlay, the bowling attack found a ready substitute in Adam Lax. It is interesting to record that our two spinners contributed just under 30% of the total overs bowled by the team during the season. The Club has unearthed an outstanding leg spin prospect in young Paul Price who joined the team after the third game of the season. The opportunity to introduce the variation of leg spin bowling of this calibre to the bowling attack is certainly welcomed but unfortunately it is too seldom seen in the current cricket era.

The Club maintained its continuity of top grade wicket keepers with Claudio Orlando accounting for 37 dismissals behind the stumps.

Despite the disappointment of missing the semi-finals, the past season proved to be most enjoyable and the team which developed into a most harmonious and well-balanced unit was indeed a pleasure to lead. If we can demonstrate next season the confidence and will to win that was shown in the last three games of this season, the future looks particularly bright.

Once again, our congratulations to Epping in taking out premiership honours.

PETER RICHARDSON (Captain) — After a bright start with the bat preceded a mid season slump following a loss of form through injury. He showed a welcome return to form in the latter part of the season.

KEVIN PRICE (Vice Captain) — Following his premature retirement announcement at the end of the previous year, Kevin reappeared and provided a fine all round performance. Given limited batting opportunities, showed examples of his natural ability and timing in a couple of pugnacious efforts. Kevin's bowling, from the middle stages of the season went from strength to strength. Not quite the same force in the field, however proved thoughtful and most helpful in his role as Vice Captain.

PETER MANSFORD — After a poor start to the season which saw him relegated to the C's for one match Peter showed his resilience upon return with a fine half century. For the rest of the season, Peter displayed the unhurried consistency with which we have become accustomed over the years.

DAVID YOUNG — David has employed a far more dedicated approach to his game following recovery from a major knee operation and settled into the second wicket batting position well, particularly in the early part of the season. A natural left hander, shows particularly good timing with his strokes straight of the wicket, although an analysis of his dismissals shows a need to keep his head over the ball. Obviously enjoys fielding in covers with a good throwing arm; also showed to be a handy change bowler in the limited opportunities provided.

MARK POWELL — Struggled a little with his batting in his first season on turf; however in his undefeated innings of 51 against Pennant Hills, showed his potential, mainly with strokes square of the wicket on both sides. Needs to concentrate his efforts in meeting the ball with the bat coming through in a straight line, and placing his feet accordingly. Outstanding in the field, either close to the wicket where he took a couple of remarkable reflex catches, and in the outfield where his ability to speedily cover ground saved scores of runs during the season.

CLAUDIO ORLANDO – Claudio completed a highly successful season, having the highest aggregate and average of the front line batsmen and securing 37 dismissals as wicket keeper, 16 from stumpings. Possessing an ideal temperament, Claudio, on occasions, showed a maturity beyond his years. His cover driving, although at times lofted, was executed with perfect timing. Very seldom guilty of lapses as wicket keeper.

KEVIN HOLLEY — After several seasons, Kevin was asked to resume his former role as opening bowler and in this capacity did everything asked of him. Although lacking his pace of old, showed plenty of guile in limited spells; an admirable foil for Adam Lax. As in the past helped the side out of trouble on occasions, initially as low order batsmen and then later in the season at third wicket.

CRAIG SMITH — Craig again captured most wickets for the team with 37, albeit at a higher average cost than the previous season. Took the second most number of catches with 8, but proving human by putting a few down (most, incredibly off his own bowling). Did not quite live up to his promise of last season with the bat. A valuable team member with a fiercely competitive attitude.

JOE CATANZARITI — Displayed a high level of concentration with a straight batting line in early matches before elevation to the A's. With limited opportunity, showed capabilities as a wicket keeper.

ADAM LAX — Most capably filled the immense gap created by the return to Adelaide of Terry Finlay. The similarity between the two was often evidenced by the number of times batsmen were beaten without a resulting wicket. Safe in the field. Earned a well-deserved promotion to the A's for the limited over matches.

PAUL PRICE — Paul, still at school, certainly justified the selectors' faith in introducing him to the team early in the season. Given ample opportunity, his well-flighted leg spinners captured 18 wickets at a cost of less than 3½ runs for each of his 104 overs. Prefers to field away from the wicket where he was most reliable, leading the team for the season with nine catches. With limited opportunities, showed strong potential with the bat; his innings of 35 in a low scoring game against Wentworthville and later 41 as an opener against the same team, confirmed all that promise. An elevation in the batting order can be expected before long. A very welcome addition to the side.

JOHN JESSUP - Joined the side after the fifth game and obviously relished the opportunity

in the higher grade. Showed his full range of powerful hitting in his undefeated 77 against Lane Cove. However must concentrate on establishing his innings before taking to the bowling. A useful field and popular team man.

C SHIRE CRICKET REPORT 1981-82

The question that must be asked is what happened to the previous year's champions?

The easy answer is that they finished 7th and perhaps that may be the best place to stop, but after such a season what's a few pages more!

This season saw the 'C's removed to a permanent home ground at Majors Bay, where we were found on the carpet in more ways than one. Known affectionately by the cast of thousands that masqueraded there as "The Bay" as although it was not impossible, it was very difficult to get anyone out; the remark was made that being caught was the only way of getting into one and out on the other.

We were visited by some illustrious names, all wishing to inspect this synthetic surface, Gary Schomberg stayed for 3 runs and muttered something about it being easier in the 'A's, Col 'T.F. was never like this'. Dennis scored an exact same number, David Jamieson sat in silence for several minutes, Aldo Cantouri debunked to Queensland, Bob Moller saw some merit in it, David Wright married to miss an afternoon and Mansford being Chairman and living only a leg tickle away, played only an away game before managing to be selected in the 'B's. Never was the heavy vacuum-cleaner so oft requested. In fact, 28 players were tried of whom only four were of last year's side; the rest opted for higher grades or banished themselves into exile (also known as C & S). One megalomaniac was bribed with the captaincy as Michael Sterry declared himself unavailable at the start of the season as did David Guille at the start, in the middle of and shortly before the end of the season.

Throughout the season the side selected never actually took the field on the Saturday and special thanks go to all the people who turned out after a Friday night or Saturday morning phone call. Among these were a couple of the championship winning junior side who became regular members of the side proving once again the value of supporting junior sides.

At the end of the season we had 40 points, only ten behind the 4th placed side. With 2 matches washed out when looking good for at least first innings points and allowed several sides off the hook after having dismissed all but the last 2 or 3 batsmen, we may easily have made the semi-finals.

The fine bowling is borne out by the fact that during the premiership rounds, the

opposition was dismissed on six occasions for less than one hundred, only passed the 150 mark five times while no side managed to score 200.

It would be unfair to single out any one bowler but special mention must be made of Norm Lee's hat-trick against Lindfield,

The fielding in general was good but as with the bowling, players tended to relax with only the tail to be polished off. Never was this more evident than in the game when eight catches were put down trying to dismiss the last three batsmen.

Again special attention must be made of Herman Hitipeuw's wicket-keeping, having surely broken some records with 43 dismissals for the season, twice taking 5 catches in an innings and twice 6 in a match.

Regular readers of 'Focus' will recall that many words could be used to describe the following section, but we will in fact refer to it as "The batting".

It is not easy to go from a synthetic surface where anything short, even fractionally, rears to waist height no matter what the pace but this could also have been used to advantage. A far greater application by batsmen may well have reversed several results most notably against Epping (2) and Auburn-Lidcombe (1) losing each game by a dozen runs.

In the limited over competition our bowlers once again proved their worth as we finished the season with four very close games, most notably against the eventual winners, Pennant Hills who scored the winning run off the last ball, with nine wickets down.

Finally, congratulations must go to Tim Creer's Epping (1) side on winning the Premiership after being Runners-up the previous year and proving it is always possible to go one better.

ALAN THOMPSON (Captain): Lost the toss once all season but fails to see this as a reason for the team's lack of success; was invited to tour overseas several times during the season, mostly by the rest of the side.

HERMAN HITIPEUW (Wkt.): Gave another magnificent display behind the stumps. Showed late in the season that he can score runs when he plays his own particular style. Great team man, bakes a great cake and member of the punter's club.

NIGEL KURZ: The "Kurz of the Briars". Knows only one way to bat — attacking. Not the prettiest batsman but was effective. Needs to work harder on his fielding. Good team man.

NORM LEE: Took most wickets, second in batting aggregates and held some very good catches in close fielding positions, believed to have retired to Japan on the strength of it. Best of luck, Norm.

GREG LIPPIATT: Not the best of seasons for Greg. Settled at the wicket for some time but must learn to start playing his shots once he has his "eye in". Very good field, excellent team man.

PAUL MATTICK: Always looked as though he was going to make runs and take wickets but never quite fulfilled the promise. Needs to concentrate and think more about the game. Held some magnificent catches.

DAVID GUILLE: A good example to the younger players of how to apply yourself when batting. Great competitor and third member of the punters' club.

JOHN PRICE: Once again indicated that he may possess a lot of talent. Would be most welcome to the side on a permanent basis.

ANTHONY FARINOLA: One of our champion juniors, Anthony came into the side halfway through the season to help out and made a regular spot his own after a nervous start. Showed his ability by scoring 45 out of a total of 83 in the final match. Must improve his running between wickets.

MICHAEL CLARKE: Another champion junior. Leg spinner who showed remarkable coolness for one so young. Will make a fine bowler if he works at it. His batting and fielding will improve with his confidence but must practice at both.

BOB MOLLER: Not one of the juniors. Quite remarkably, Bob, not only talked his way into the side but also proved his bowling ability — quite probably first in the Briars. Finished the season helping out the 'B's.

ROBERT ELLIS: Came into the side for his batting but showed he has the makings of a good fast bowler. Unfortunately missed the second half of the season.

CAMERON THOMPSON: Started the season by almost winning the first game for us. Then faded quite badly. Very keen but must work for results.

PETER WALLACE: Rumoured to be spending a whole season in Australia next year and must surely play higher grades once more. A good team man for whom nothing was too much trouble. A pleasure to have in any side.

They say that in the running process, all the potential signals are released that will enable an astute judge to identify the timing, footwork and power, that produces the class batsman and the parallel skills for bowling success.

Fielding ability is a snack to assess this way, so they say.

Well if it's true that people claim to have this insight, and it may not be entirely accurate, due to the fact that I just made it up (but it might be), then those believers should witness the C & S Sprint. Quad erat demonstrandum.

The C & S Sprint is unique to our Club, and its history is as colourful as the exploits of our C & S teams have been. Laurie Yeomans: Breaks twice and is thrown out. Appeals that the crowd only came to see him run and the whole event would be a farce if not re-instated.

Conducts his own appeal. Re-instated, but fails to get away well due to

lack of breath.

Bob Moller: Badly handicapped and given a severe penalty as well. Put on scratch

which was only to be expected. There's never been a Victorian winner

yet and no precedents are about to be set today.

David Blair: Just taken a wicket. Bowled six overs. Off two yards and smirking as

only a Pom can. Could win if it was a clean event but this is Carrs Park,

not Old Trafford.

Mal Croughton: Given four yards but has to run in the lane between Marty and Laurie.

The pressure's too much. He overtenses, loses his rhythm and misses the

photo.

Brooks wins and that may well be the only official result ever recorded. A rather subdued group of losers clap politely, as David is rewarded with a cup of tea and a pillow biscuit.

There's a lot of bickering actually.

Where was Magrath?

What if Barrett had run?

Ralph would have given Dunc a big shot if he'd started.

And what about Roger Bailey?

And so on

In hindsight, too much administration and strategy planning went into the sprint this year, to

the detriment of our match ambitions. Consequently our win-loss record is not as we would have wished

A small number of pleasing wins, coupled with quite a number of "good" losses, in the C & S tradition. Three times we were heavily outgunned on the day and overall it might be argued that we should field our best XI more often. No doubt that would bring greater rewards, in a competitive sense. But it would also remove, or greatly reduce, the opportunity for thirty or so members to share some cricket together during the year.

The coach learned from mistakes a great deal in the areas of pre-season pre-paration, training methods, scrummaging and the importance of a tight-forward platform.

As far as the season is concerned we again suffered from our inability to win a good percentage of games during the first round of the competition. Being on four points at the half-way mark in the competition again put enormous pressure on ourselves to make the semi-finals, although it was not until the second last round that we were out of contention.

My personal thanks goes to David Blair for the great job done as Manager of the team, making the coaching of the team an uncomplicated affair. I would also like to thank Bruce Robinson for his support throughout the season, as well as Peter Dunlop for his confidence.

The players who contributed to the Kentwell Cup season are:-

DAVID GUILLE: (3) Was playing well until hit with an injury that virtually ended his season.

ROSS THOMPSON: (4) Handling still a problem but showed a lot of improvement in the second half of the season.

LINDSAY CALLOWAY: (6) Played well early but lost form and confidence midway through the season.

OWEN MOORE: (4) One of the most incisive backs in the club but needs to improve his defensive technique.

TONY RODI: (15) A new player to the club who gave the team everything. I think next year he could be a first class Kentwell Cup player.

JOHN HURLEY: (16) Greatly improved his all-round game showing new found attacking abilities. Who could forget that try.

JOHN MAGRATH: (15) A good job done as team captain. Throughout the season he consistently trained the house down.

BOB BISHOP: (16) A great season by Bob playing the way Bob likes best but on a much more consistent basis.

JOHN JESSUP: (15) The Kentwell Cup best and fairest player, who along with Bob Bishop next year should be the best attacking back-rowers in Sub-District.

GORDON BROWN: (14) Part of our "Mighty Mite" back row who throughout the season did more than he was asked and more than the opposition cared for.

KIM PIEFKE: (1) Unfortunately his season was again hit by injury. A player the team did miss.

PETER RUTLEDGE: (10) A player we really missed when he went back to Norfolk Island who, when he played, gave 200%. If only he had some heart.

TONY WOSNIAK: (13) Tony did not have one of his best seasons mainly due to lack of fitness. Hopefully next year we will see the real "Captain Tony".

NEIL QUINLAN: (7) Up until his unfortunate incident with the Hunters Hill hooker, Neil was playing quite strongly.

JOHN HEALY: (13) A great season surprised many including myself. Next season should really establish himself as a Kentwell Cup player to be reckoned with.

IAN RICHARDS: (7) Plagued by injury but has a lot of ability.

JOE LANCUBA: (3) Limited opportunities but next season could see him establish himself a Kentwell Cup half back.

CHRIS KUBARA: (10) Showed a great deal of potential as a top line-out jumper but needs to work at his general play.

DAVID VAUGHAN: (4) This season was affected by study commitment which resulted in limited opportunities.

GREG STEVENSON: (1) Had injury problem but hopefully next season should see him have a good go at Kentwell.

BOB STEPHENSON: (2) Unfortunately back problems hindered Bob's ability to play prop, therefore limiting his Kentwell Cup appearances.

DAVID GARRITY: (13) A new player to the club who displayed great all-round ability. David's tremendous kicking game made him our forwards most popular player.

MAL WEBER: (14) Mal had some fine games this season in both attack and defence. Still needs to improve his consistency.

TIM O'REILLY: (8) Tim's opportunities were fairly limited in attack but he still made the most of them as usual.

PETER DUNLOP: (11) Peter gave the team great strength in determination which had a great effect on the forwards. A good team player.

GARY PIERCE: (6) Gary took things easy this year in preparation for his honeymoon, but when called on, gave his best.

PAUL BEVINS: (5) Paul's late start to the season effected his Kentwell appearances but Paul still proved he is one of the strongest scrummagers in Kentwell Cup.

BRUCE ROBINSON: (8) Bruce's final rugby season, outside special promotional appearances, was fittingly finished, playing in the club's first grade team. Bruce's influence improved our scrummaging by 200% on his arrival.

Overall, the season must be seen as a disappointing one from the point of view of our competition standing. We were not able to win the close games and the games we won were by comfortable margins which was belied by the fact that we had the fifth best for and against in the competition. But that doesn't win competitions and a rugby trophy we need. I believe if we can retain our current players, learn from our experiences and maintain belief in our ability and playing style, we WILL win Kentwell Cup in 1983.

1982 BRIARS RUGBY WHIDDON CUP REPORT

just one point short of a semi-final position. Had we maintained the majority of our players after the initial rounds, I have no doubt we would have made the grand final.

ROGER FISH: A very versatile back and kicker with a deceptive running style. Fishy filled many back line positions this year but showed in the semi his considerable ability as a centre.

PETER PAYNE: Peter is an ideal centre — he tackles, he runs, he passes and he mauls when required, he does not kick, he does not complain. A top player in my book.

JACK ELLISON: Jack is an exciting player who added considerably to our attacking game. Maybe a full season next year?

DAVID WRIGHT: Dave patiently waited his turn on the paddock, took his chance and became a fixture at five-eight. He played very well in a tough position and should go on with the job next season.

GREG STEVENSON: Stevo had a strange season — up one week — injured the next — down the next week — but he added a great deal of "stick" to our back-line when available.

CRAIG HICKEY: What can I say? When all other half-backs were unavailable for one reason or another, Hickey (after stuffing about in Whiddon Cup earlier in the season) came trotting out of the mist from the direction of the sheds at Goddard Park one Wednesday and announced his availability. He got the game, quickly got into the Judd Cup spirit and consolidated his spot to the end of the season — thanks, mate!

ROSS SEABROOK: Another versatile player who played wing and breakaway this year. Has the commitment to become a good breakaway but should concentrate on the backs at present weight as shown by a very neat try in the semi.

TONY ASMUS: Tony made a few guest appearances this year being a victim of the Billy Burns school of milk vending and added measurably to our forward strength. Finished off the try of the season against Colleagues in the second round and scored another try against Hunters Hill.

GARY STEWART: "Drain" is a good style of reliable player who quietly gets on with his job. Showed ability in line-outs and has the ability to play higher grades with a little more experience.

CHRIS MURRAY: Returning after injury, Shirl found himself seeking selection in Judd Cup in the second round. Added experience and his own brand of enthusiasm and improvisation to our side. Unfortunately, the season ended for us before his ability could be fully utilized.

GEOFF MOSS: In the first season for the Briars, Mossy showed glimpses of form which, no doubt, he will capitalise on next season. Has learnt the necessary techniques and with more aggression Geoff could become a very capable tight forward.

TONY SWANSON: Swany earned a great deal of respect after playing on the wing in the

first game and then established himself in the side as a prop forward. His build and strength caused him to be a worry to many opposing props and I think he will distinguish himself next season in any position.

BRUCE EVANS: Bruce played with considerable physical problems this year but had several top games in the tight play.

WARREN BRYAN: Warren is sometimes criticised for his mobility around the field but his scrummaging and tight play was valuable to our side this year. He will continue to hold a position in the front row especially if he remembers the coach's theory on selective second-phase play.

JOHN STANIFORTH: His play on occasions left the coach speechless!

Now I come to three members who deserve special mention:-

SCOTT CARDWELL: A deserving winner of the best and fairest award. Scotty's conversion from an out-of-form winger to yet another Briars backrower was, in all honesty, a stroke of good luck. Scott has a job in front of him to play breakaway for Briars in the top two grades at present, as the Club has always had ample talent in that position. However, I am sure he can make it if he takes his time and supplements his attacking ability and speed to the breakdown in play, with effectively decking the opponent in all tackles thereby negativing the necessity to have a verbal altercation. Congratulations, Scotty!

PETER STEWART: Peter supported the Judd Cup effort admirably throughout the season notwithstanding Tech. commitments. His knowledge of the ability of the new players was a valuable help to the coach in team selections. Pete is a top team man whose application to the game serves as a fine example to the other players. During the season Pete established credentials as a very competent hooker who, like all hookers, can vividly recall all tight heads won and full details of how he did it on each occasion.

TERRY DALY: Terry backed up for his second year as manager and provided all necessary services without fail. His efforts in reviving injured players and assisting those who failed to respond to his magic sponge from the field had to be seen to be believed. Once again the jumpers were maintained in immaculate condition which I suspect was largely due to Terry's wife, Ann. Terry made sure the traditional port was served at half time in the last comp. game. Unfortunately, Terry did not get a run this year but I believe he may announce his availability for selection next season?

My final comment is to express the hope that after two years in the final four, Briars can continue to capitalise on the depth of present talent in the Club and put together a premiership winning Judd Cup side in 1983.

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HOCKEY REPORT - 1982 SEASON

It is fervently hoped that the season just passed is not as vital to the future of Briars Hockey as it was expected to be at the conclusion of the previous season. The challenges faced during 1981 were generally perpetuated in 1982 and in fact (apart from the Damoclean sword of deficit financing hanging over the 1981 Chairman's head, which problem having been redeemed prior to the start of 1982) the absolute number of challenges to surmount actually declined in 1982.

Thank heavens they did, because in 1982 there were considerably less heads available for problem-surmounting!

Subsequently the 1983 administration is now facing a situation highly reminiscent of the 1970–71 period when Briars Hockey was pulled back from the rim of the precipice and experienced seven highly successful seasons through to 1980.

The format of the 1982 season was not as revolutionary (and potentially damaging) as expected, and in fact apart from the formation of an S.H.A. Under—17 Competition, run in conjunction with senior hockey, the introduction of a Premier B Division of three grades composed of most of the previous year's 1st Division but excluding any clubs that were already represented in the (renamed) Premier A Division, actually saw a weakening in the strength of the Premier B Division in which your teams participated.

On that basis alone the 1982 results should have been superior to the previous season's results.

In fact, in a weaker competition in 1982, Briars scored 14 more goals than in 1981 and reduced the opposition goal average from 2.7 per game to 2.4 per game, but concurrently won 3 fewer games and finished 27 Club Championship points behind the 1981 figures.

This in a climate in which some of the stronger Premier B Division clubs agitated against the disparity between the playing standards of their 1982 Saturday's opposition, and the S.H.A. Development Committee supported this contention with the specific proposition (detailed in the October Focus) to quote "Keep competition format same as 1982 with the hope that the performance of clubs like Wests and Briars will strengthen in 1983" unquote.

Player strength is the simple reason for most of the 1982 on-the-field maladies, and remedying the lack of numbers on the subscription rolls is the major task of the incoming administration!

The other major problem in the season just passed was the lack of sufficient involvement by players in the administration of the sport within the club, to the extent that a submission involving a restructuring of responsibilities was circulated by two of the more genuine club men, with sufficient impact to (hopefully before this correspondence goes to press) promote the installation of an organised dedicated administration of rather more than the previous two effective "wheels".

It is debatable how much the sudden player loss affected the functioning of a reasonable machinery controlling the club's destiny in the 1982 season, but the bare facts are that of the 38 players profiled in the 1982 Annual Report, 10 were totally lost to the 1982 effort and 6 more played on a very restricted basis! That is uncomfortably close to a 33% decrease in player strength, and the old bogey of doubling up became the norm rather than the abhorrent exception.

On the brighter side, some of the junior players benefitted from having two seasons experience added to their belts in just 17 games (or was it 34 games?).

It is perhaps indicative of the way things were that a special point was noted in the previous season's report when one player managed to represent in all three of the Club's grades at various stages of the season, whereas in 1982, an incredible 6 players performed the same feat! That is another statistic that would be wonderful if it meant that 6 3rd graders had performed well enough to earn a 1st grade spot. !

Because of the polyglot nature of the season's activities, it is pointless to attempt the usual team by team player profiles.

Instead, the relevant statistical analysis is detailed, followed by some pertinent observations on the season's highlights.

- * If all grades B & F points were tallied, Robert Wood would have pipped Paul Price by one solitary point.
- * Richard Coghlan and Robert Wood each earned five major B & F awards spread over the grades.
- * On eight occasions goalkeepers (Warren Widger, Laszlo Kovacs and Wayne Smith) claimed major B & F awards, indicating their increased involvement in the games in 1982.
- * Against Sutherland on July 17 Colin Huggett and Michael Sterry claimed the principal B & F points in both 1st and 2nd grade.
- * Against Ryde on June 20, Robert Wood scored 2 points in 1st grade B & F and 3 points in 2nd grade.
- * Neil Huggett, a highly thought of centre-half prospect made his debut in 1st grade on the left wing against Easts on May 15 and promptly netted 3 good goals then three weeks later split the scene for Adelaide!
- * Peter Jones rapidly cemented a 1st grade fullback spot that simply did not look on two years ago.
- * Nigel Sterry came back from a knee operation to add much needed strength to the 2nd grade half line and prompt a strong season's finish for that team.
- * On only approximately 7 occasions out of the 49 times a senior Briars team ran onto the field in 1982 was there **not** a member of the Price family involved and of course they played all the morning junior games as well!
- * Andre Declase found a new challenger for most sideline sorties during the season, and that worthy would prefer to remain un-named in this report!
- * 1st grade's memorable games were mainly first round efforts, a 3–3 draw against Bankstown and close games with Northern Districts, Sutherland and Manly, plus the enjoyable local derby victories over Wests.
- 2nd grade highlights was undoubtedly a great win (3—1) against North Sydney at Primrose Park, with several other games qualifying as memorable for all the wrong reasons, except for strong end-of-season performances against Northern Districts, Bankstown and Ryde.
- * 3rd grade enjoyed greatly, wins over Macquarie University, a draw against Bankstown at Burwood after a first round 9–0 drubbing, and a gallant 3–4 loss against Northern Districts at Pennant Hills in a thrilling game.
- * Special mention must be made of the players who formed the backbone of both the 2nd and 3rd grade games for the bulk of the season, namely Paul Price, Richard Coghlan, Warren Sharp, Paul Huggett, Sandor Kovacs, Eric Wade and Lew Martin.

- * The Annual Briars Barton encounter in Canberra saw the locals win all three games, with the 2nd grade game being the only close contest. Barton have, in fact, amalgamated with the Woden club and nowadays circulate under a "Valleys" tag, while preserving the "Barton Woden Hockey Club" title for auspicious occasions (like Briars contests). The hospitality on the June long weekend was up to its usual high standard, but the weather was not, although the locals loved us for bringing the rain to their parched climes. For 1983, moves are underfoot to schedule the annual event for a mutually compatible normal weekend, in order to minimise the ravages of family commitments on players' required hockey responsibilities.
- * Budgetry—wise, Hockey finished the Briars financial year with a deficit of \$110.00 caused principally by an increase in equipment inventory of some \$446.00 over the previous year. An additional cause was the shortfall of drink sales receipts at games to the amounts budgeted for, and tightening up of this area is obviously necessary.

Expenses for training also increased significantly over 1981 and reinforced the contemporary cost spiral in sports accounting, e.g. 1978 expenses were \$994.00 compared to the current \$3680.00.

* At last, the good news! As detailed in an early edition of Focus, Hockey 1982 saw a team of Briars players carry off the Metropolitan B Division Sydney Indoor Hockey Association Competition against the more financial State Bank (North Sydney) team. The final score of 7–6, with the winning goal scored after the final whistle does not indicate the play of the team on the night when just a few touches would have us comfortably clear of the State Bank challenge. That was a most satisfying win, and it was thought at the time that it would set us up for a strong field hockey season!

In 1983, Briars Hockey would do well to heed the advice of one Robert Louis Stevenson, viz:

"To travel hopefully is a better thing than to arrive, and the true success is to labour".

* Two weeks prior to occupancy, the full fee is to be paid and becomes non-refundable unless suitable substitution is found.

The Fire Escape construction, as required by the New South Wales Fire Brigades Report has been completed and up-grading of the upstairs Bathrooms, is complete.

No final decision has been made by Kosciusko Thredbo Pty. Ltd., concerning the extension of our lease (currently running to 2004) or extension of the lodge accommodation, and negotiations on both matters are to be undertaken as soon as K.T.P.L. are ready to proceed.

If our proposed development plans are approved, it will be necessary to re-structure membership somewhat, to finance the project. Naturally this would require a special General Meeting, as a move of this nature would require the full support of at least two-thirds majority of the membership.

Brian Darragh, who has given exceptional service to the Club as Chairman of Directors for over ten years, has stepped down from that position, although he remains a Director, so his experience is still available to the Board.

Peter Arnold has relinquished the position of Secretary due to increased Family and Business commitments and has been elected to the Board.

The Club is indebted to Brian and Peter for their work over the years.

Ross Anstey was elected Chairman and is guiding the Club through this period where such important developments are to be undertaken.

Sadly, the passing was noted during the year of one of our Foundation Members, Mr. B. A. Grace.

Mr. Grace was instrumental in giving strong support to our Founder, Doug Vanderfield, in the formation of Briars Ski Club. Our sincere condolences are extended to his family.

As reported, earlier bookings were slow during the winter due to the poor season, but we should remind you that the lodge is an excellent base for Fishing Holidays and also Tennis Courts and Golf Course are only a few minutes from the lodge if you would like to "get away from it all", during the summer.

The Excess of Income over Expenditure for the year amounted to \$7,833 (1981 - \$4,369).

The principal activity of the Company during the course of the financial year consisted of promoting and playing amateur sport.

There was no significant change in the nature of that activity during the year.

During the year an amount of \$6,295 was transferred from gifts for Oval Development to the general reserve. This represented donations to the Company from club members for the development of the proposed oval that those members agreed to leave with the Company following the decision not to proceed with the proposal. The amount of \$5,000 in relation to the club's renovations costs was charged against provision for deferred maintenance. Apart from the foregoing there were no material transfers to or from reserves or provisions during the financial year.

No shares or debentures were issued during the year.

Before making out the Profit and Loss Statement and Balance Sheet of the Company, your Directors took steps to ascertain what action had been taken in relation to the writing off of bad debts and the making of provisions for doubtful debts, and to cause all known bad debts to be written off and adequate provision, where necessary, to be made for doubtful debts.

At the date of this Report your Directors are not aware of any circumstances which would render the amount written off for bad debts or the amount provided for doubtful debts in-adequate to any material extent.

Before making out the Profit and Loss Statement and Balance Sheet the Directors took reasonable steps to ascertain whether any current assets other than debtors were unlikely to realise in the ordinary course of business their value as shown in the accounting records of the company. Where necessary, the Directors have caused the assets to be written down to an amount that they might be expected so to realise or have made adequate provision for the difference between the value shown in the accounts and the amount that they might be expected so to realise.

Directors' Report (Contd.)

At the date of the Report, the Directors are not aware of any circumstances that would render the values attributed to current assets in the accounts misleading.

At the date of this report there is no charge on the assets of the Company which has arisen since the end of the financial year to secure the liability of any other person.

No contingent liability has arisen between the end of the financial year and the date of this Report.

No contingent or other liability has become enforceable, or is likely to become enforceable, within the period of twelve months after the end of the financial year which, in the opinion of the Directors, will or may substantially affect the ability of the Company to meet its obligations as and when they fall due.

At the date of this Report your Directors are not aware of any circumstances not otherwise dealt with in the Report or Accounts which would render any amount stated in the accounts misleading.

The results of the Company's operations during the year were not, in the opinion of the Directors, substantially affected by any item, transaction or event of a material and unusual nature, apart from the misappropriation of funds dealt with in the President's Report.

In the interval between the end of the financial year and the date of this Report no item, transaction or event of a material or unusual nature has arisen which is likely, in the opinion of the Directors to affect substantially the results of the Company's operations for the next succeeding financial year.

Since the end of the previous financial year, no Director has received or become entitled to receive any benefit other than emoluments reported in the accounts by reason of a contract between the Company and himself, his firm or a Company in which he has a substantial financial interest.
