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Gentlemen

I am very proud to present my first report as President of your club. As Craig Hickey alluded to in last year's report, we are facing challenging times and that is very true in our business, private and social lives.

Sports continue to rise to the challenge with Cricket to the forefront in winning the club championship for the 2nd time in 3 years. All teams contributed to this outstanding achievement and congratulations to Second Grade on their emphatic win in the final. Rugby were very competitive all season and at one stage looked like giving the club championship a shake. With the keenness and enthusiasm in the sport, I think we can look forward to promotion to Kentwell Cup in the near term. Squash continued on their winning way with pennants galore but have been struck a blow by Squashlands, Burwood, being sold and the club required to find alternative home courts. The challenge will be to retain the club identity at their new home courts at Five Dock. Hockey did not enjoy a good season on and off the field. The complacency in the sport has been well and truly exorcised and I am sure Hockey will turn the corner in the coming season.

Your club continues to adhere to the ideals on which it was founded and prospered over the years. However, many clubs whom we compete against have been envious of the sound financial footing of The Briars Sporting Club, and the clubrooms in particular. Some of these clubs have now acquired their own premises or have been able to organise financial backing for their organisations. In my view, to keep The Briars Sporting Club at the forefront of amateur sport, we must make hard and courageous decisions to move the club into the next chapter of it's illustrious history.

Board is focused on examining the positioning of sports within their relevant competitions; the need to encourage junior development with appropriate support structures; and the mix of sports within the club. In addition Board must keep in mind the need to maximise the returns from the club's investments and ensure the clubrooms are adequately maintained and well patronised.

The executive of your club, Board and the Management Committee, do not resile from examining these issues and ensuring decisions are made in the best interest of the club and, you the members. Board is asking each sport to put in place a management structure appropriate to each sport and I am pleased to report that the sports realise the relevance of a strong management structure to enhance on-field achievements. To those of you involved in committee structures in the individual sports or functions, please accept this as public acknowledgement of your often unsung contribution to the welfare of your chosen sport and your fellow club members.

It is becoming increasingly obvious that a structured junior development program must be a priority across most sports and is an issue which deserves the closest scrutiny. Juniors can become an integral part of each sport's recruitment program but there is a price to pay, and that is continuing commitment to supporting a carefully planned junior program, utilising the abilities of current players and parents who wish to contribute along the way. Hockey are well advanced with a junior program already in place and continued support from Senior Hockey will ensure a dividend in the near future. I hope this is not a one-off dividend and Junior Hockey continues to prosper - it really is in the hands of Senior Hockey to ensure this is the case.

The club again experienced difficult bar trading conditions with turnover now about half of what it was 4 years ago. Board has continued to upgrade the clubrooms and bar and indoor sports facilities to encourage patronage. Further initiatives are being explored to boost bar turnover. The gross margin on trading is now back to an acceptable level, reduced turnover is the problem.

Board and Management continue to highlight the need for fiscal accountability in all our operations. Increased emphasis will be placed upon the sports to ensure that they conduct their operations in a financially responsible manner. The financial deficit of Hockey was particularly disturbing and strong action is being taken to get the sport "back on the rails".

With the depletion of our cash investments over the last few years for the Building Refurbishment, the past year has seen a steady increase in funds, largely due to the rental from the modernised shops below the clubrooms. Board will continue to ensure that our cash investments are gradually built up again.

The 1995/96 season can be one we can be a little disappointed with as we finished 1 win short of making the semis. There were 2 games during the season which we most definitely should have won after getting into winning positions but forfeited any victory chance through some ordinary batting.

Unfortunately, our batting during the season was consistently disappointing with only 1 player, Paul Simpson scoring over 400 runs. However, our strengths were obviously in our all round bowling strength.

The season began well with easy victories over Baulkham Hills and Pennant Hills. A draw followed against Strathfield before a devastating loss to minor premiers Lindfield. After dismissing them for 177 we batted superbly to be 4-140. But, then we succumbed to some tight bowling to be dismissed for 160 and a crucial loss.

We were back on track against South East Sydney when we dismissed them for only 158. Some good batting allowed us to declare at 6-263 in quick time and but for the torrential downpour that followed, an outright was denied as they finished at 8-62.

Another game we were disappointed with was against Blacktown. We dismissed them for 131 in a one dayer and were 6-100 before eventually being dismissed for only 114.

Victories followed against Auburn and Lane Cove before a sensational game against Warringah. Once again some poor batting saw us dismissed for only 93. We then bowled and fielded well to have them at 6-76 overnight. An amazing 2nd day followed as we cleaned up the tail to dismiss them for 86. However, the game was still a long way from over. Needless to say our batting crumbled again as we were routed for only 82. This left Warringah 90 to win in 23 overs. They took up the challenge and scored runs rapidly. We also took wickets rapidly and Warringah finished at 8-73. A very exciting game.

Our winning streak continued as we accounted for Roseville, Macquarie University, the eventual premiers, an outright win over Epping, and Canterbury before our last round encounter and Holroyd. Needing to win to ensure a semi final spot we batted very well on day 1 to finish at 8-296, enough to win if we played well enough. However, we didn't play as well as we needed and a crucial loss resulted. Unfortunately, the loss cost us a semis spot and a disappointing end to the season.

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The 1995/96 season for the Burwood Briar's 2nd grade side was outstanding, culminating in a victory in the Grand Final over arch rivals Strathfield.

This year saw a new captain, several new faces and an abundance of talent, which was utilised very well to achieve the premiership. It was a close knit team effort that saw our side totally dominate the competition (except for two hiccups) - this fact is shown in that 8 batsmen averaged over 25, and all 5 bowlers took between 17 and 33 wickets each. The fielding was of an exceptionally high standard throughout the year, with a total of 75 catches being taken.

On reflection, the team knew from game 1 that the premiership was ours, as long as everyone focussed on that goal. There were very little personnel changes throughout the year, showing a dedication and application to the team that made the job of captaining such a committed group all that much easier.

In brief, the semi final against Holroyd saw Yianni Platania and Rohan Appleton score 150 together with Rohan (61). Andy Macky joined Yianni for 69 runs together, Andy (49). Yianni was finally dismissed for 109 - an outstanding innings under pressure. We finished with 274 with Jason Hughes and Steve Schomberg adding 37 for the last wicket. A. Raymond struck twice before stumps, then we totally dominated them on day two, with tight accurate bowling, two superb runouts (R. Appleton, G. Abood) to have them all out for 132.

In the Grand Final, our bowlers did the job - A. Raymond started with 3-32 off 12 tight overs. Steve and Jason tightened the screws, Steve bowled 19 straight overs, 2-39. Dan Rojo came back all fired up, 2-62 and Jason cleaned up the tail, 3-29. Strathfield were all out for 185.

After a few tense moments in the batting - Yianni (33), we were 3 for 83, but Colin Wilcockson 39 (6 fours x 2 sixes) and Gerard Abood 65 dominated the attack to leave us 4-189 at the end of day one. Gerard's six over covers to win on 1" innings will always remain a shot to be remembered. On day two Andy Macky (39) and Garry Schomberg steadily increased our lead with a 75 run partnership. Then Garry cut loose - 10 fours and 8 sixes to finish with 111*. Jason Hughes batted well for a 48 run partnership with Garry. They conceded at lunch with our side 9 for 345. A tremendous victory, thoroughly deserved.

For the second time in three years the Burwood Third Grade cricket team completed the preliminary rounds as Minor Premiers. This season however, we were unable to take the excellent form maintained throughout the season and repeat the performance of two years earlier in converting the minor premiership to a premiership. Nevertheless, given the circumstances of the final and despite the fact that we did not play to our full potential in that game, the team should be very proud of its accomplishments during the season.

The strength of the team was undoubtedly based upon its pace attack headed by Sarkis Achmar, Nick Rojo and later in the season, when he returned to cricket with the Club in the second half of the season after injury, Phil Adams. In particular Sarkis' performance in securing 60 wickets at 9.55 in his first season in Shires cricket was outstanding. Phil and Sarkis came first and second in the third grade competition's bowling averages respectively, and the latter led the wicket takers for the grade with Nick being equal second leading wicket taker with 50.

Even recognising that it was difficult to accumulate high scores at our home ground for much of the season because of the slow wicket and outfield, our batting lacked stability and it was fortunate that our bowlers were able to defend these low scores with comparative ease. Indeed it may seem surprising that the team achieved the Minor Premiership without one of its players being in the top twenty of the competition's batsmen on averages.

Now to review our participation in the end of season final series.

In the semi final at Epping Oval we met Lane Cove, who we had beaten comprehensively earlier in the season. Winning the toss and electing to bat we were in early trouble at 3 for 27 and later 8 for 95 before Anthony Clarke (73) and Sarkis Achmar (15*) compiled a superb century partnership to restore credibility and a score of 199. When bad light stopped play on the first day, our opening bowlers had made heavy inroads into the Lane Cove batting for them to be 4 for 34. On the second day these two continued unchanged to rout the opposition for 73, with Sarkis Achmar and Nick Rojo both taking five wickets. Rather than enforce the follow on, Burwood chose to bat again, but struggled somewhat to be all out for 105. Set 229 to win we were able to maintain the pressure to dismiss Lane Cove for 83 with Sarkis, Nick and Phil Adams each taking three wickets.

So set the scene for the final, when we were drawn to play a very strong Auburn side, which was somewhat surprising, given the relative standing of their two higher grades. Unfortunately for Burwood the game was set for Airey Park which had the effect of the wicker blunting our four pronged pace attack and proving to be ideally suited to the Auburn bowlers whose two legspinners were able to derive prodigious spin even before lunch on the first day.

Having won the toss and elected to bat, we proceeded to lose wickets progressively, and were all out for 133, with eight of our batsman falling to the two Auburn spinners. Only John Price, playing a dedicated lone hand to compile 39, providing any real resistance. Despite defending a meagre total and bowling on a pitch unresponsive to our pace attack, we approached our task with full commitment.

Despite all these efforts, Auburn were able to bat well into the second day to be eventually all out for 224. Our bowlers toiled without luck, with Sarkis Achmar particularly bowling absolutely superbly, conceding only 44 runs off 23 overs and consistently having a former first grade district player playing and missing outside off stump. Indeed as the Auburn batting very much revolved around this particular player, the fall of his wicket in the early stages would undoubtedly have provided a very much more keenly contested match. With time limited, we commenced our second innings with a view to scoring quick runs and hopefully setting a target. Unfortunately this last hope proved to be forlorn and we collapsed for a total of 52.

Although confronted with circumstances that made winning the game difficult, for the most part, our top order batsman did not set about doing the necessary hard work to build the innings. On the other hand the performance against adverse conditions in the field was full of commitment and, although we did not win, the team should be very proud of the fact that at no stage did that commitment fall away.

Without wishing to detract from the very good all round performance of Auburn, to whom our congratulations on achieving the premiership are conveyed, in my view the wicket prepared for the final was less than suitable for a match of that status. Unfortunately it appears the selection of a ground with a wicket that provided fairer conditions to both teams



was not possible because of the prolonged season and the unavailability of more appropriate venues so late in the season.

In concluding this report, it is fitting to again recognise and thank:-

Gerard Price and his team, including my fellow selectors, for the most valuable support that continues to be provided to the Club's cricketers.

Club coach, Steve Thomlinson who must derive immense satisfaction in seeing Burwood achieve the Club Championship for the second time in three years, and

finally to the Concord Council ground staff for the preparation of the Ron Routley wicket, which in its early existence continued to show improvement during the course of the season.

Player Profiles

John Price - Invariably able to establish a good start, however did not carry on his many scores of over twenty into innings more substantial. Most consistent top order batsman in both semi final and final when he did his best to hold the middle order together. Due to strength of our pace attack, John's off spin utilised only sparingly. Mobile phone at times appeared to hamper his fielding and umpiring duties.

Phil Adams - Great to see Phil return to cricket with the Club after a prolonged absence. Quickly regained his form with his high action left arm pace bowling, on all too many occasions being far too good to get the edge. His effectiveness was shown by having the lowest average of bowlers in the third grade competition. In the last two games before the finals showed his undoubted class with the bat with two scores of seventy. A good field with a magnificent throwing arm. Look forward to seeing Phil performing in the higher grades next season.

David Trewin - Provided his usual stabilising influence for the lower order, although was also was unable to convert good starts into more substantial scores. Another who was not given a bowling opportunity because of the abundance and quality of pace bowling that the side was fortunate to have. His contribution as vice captain, particularly in providing the on field encouragement that is necessary to maintain momentum, was very much appreciated.

Cory Dickerson - Still at school, Cory showed much promise in his first season with the Club. A forceful first or second wicket batsman, who in time will undoubtedly develop the skills needed to pace his innings in the context of batting out the target overs. A capable wicketkeeper and very athletic in the field when given the opportunity. Unfortunately we lost Cory for the second half of the season due to football commitments. Hopefully will return next season when I am sure he will develop into a most capable cricketer for the Club and in time make his contribution to the higher grades.

Anthony Clarke - A most combative cricketer with either bat or ball. With our highly successful opening bowling pair, Anthony had to be content with second and third use of the new ball, which he did without complaint. Can be devastating to an opposition if on fire with the bat, as he so clearly showed when he played a superlative knock to set up our first innings score against Lane Cove in the semi final. With his typical Club and team attitude, took the brunt of organising and on many occasions carrying out the onerous task of putting down the pitch covers on Friday nights.

Peter Richardson - Chipped in with an occasional useful innings with the bat in the lower order, including a three hour plus marathon when he assisted with a determined lower order to deny Macquarie University a win when they decided to continue batting into the second day of the game with an overnight score of 330. Very much enjoyed the opportunity of leading a very competitive and harmonious team.

Jason Bailey - Did not enjoy success with the bat until the last few games when his confidence returned and he set about showing a very commendable application to make the necessary adjustments to his game. Also capably assumed the role as wicketkeeper when Cory Dickerson became unavailable for the latter part of the season.

Nick Rojo - Enjoyed a most successful season, working as an opening bowler in tandem with Sarkis Achmar, and taking fifty wickets at 13.3. Both these bowlers by virtue of their different

Here is a summary of the 7 matches:-

Round 1 Briars 9-79 drew with Baulkham Hills

The President's Review of Operations

Public Profile

Our Club continues to gain greater public profile, and in 1996 this was perhaps the best it has ever been. What with the Governor of NSW, His Excellency Gordon Samuels AC, mentioning his association with the Club in The Australian Newspaper and the press coverage of Ken Williams' 800th game, it truly was a great season for the Club's public profile. Briars Rugby will need to leverage from such publicity to gain more sponsorship dollars and greater recruitment.

Standards

The standard of competition this year improved dramatically from that which we experienced in 1995. Despite this our players were able to lift themselves up and equal most teams in most facets of the game. However, it did become evident that if Briars is to succeed in achieving their goal of playing Kentwell Cup, the club's technical skills will need to be improved somewhat. For this to happen we need to take a more professional approach to training and be carrying and using the ball in nearly every drill. Selection of coaches for 1997 will hinge upon accreditation and technical ability. Too many times have we relied upon sheer determination and heart to win crucial games, and whilst this is every important it does not guarantee wins.

Fitness in 1996, especially during the latter half of the season, was less than adequate. It is intended that in 1997, that fitness training will be taken in squads rather than as a large group. This should help to group players into their respective playing abilities, fitness levels and commitment and enable differing drills for differing abilities.

In 1996 we introduced a monitoring of player physical characteristics, and found this to be both very interesting and also very useful in helping to analyse player performance. The characteristics measured included, height, weight and speed over 100 metres. Measurements were taken at different times during the season. The following graphs provide a player profile for the 1996 season.



Player Height Summary - 1996

As can be seen from the above graph the majority of our players are between 176 cm and 186 cm tall. This would appear to be reasonably normal however if our club is to dominate lineout possession more 186 cm plus players will need to be recruited.

Analysis of weight graph (page23) is somewhat limited by the inability to determine the fat content of the players. Suffice to say, when analysing this weight graph against the height graph, our players in general appear slightly heavier for their height, than what would be expected from a normal athlete. To improve the use of this information a fat test will be developed for the 1997 season.

Speed over 100 metres was perhaps quite good. The results detailed in the graph do however appear inaccurate given that some of our players managed to clock times below 11 seconds, world record pace in anyone's standards. Not to detract from the players speed, careful attention will be made when measuring the distance in future seasons.



A the conclusion of the season the coaching teams and the Rugby Committee decided upon suitable players to receive the awards. The following table summaries the finalists and winners for each of the specific awards and the best & fairest award. It also provides a summary of the criteria for selection for the specific awards.

Best & Fairest Players

Awarded to the player with the highest number of best & fairest points accumulated during the season. This year we selected random critics to award the points for different games. Care was taken when selecting critics to avoid favouritism. It should be noted, that for future years team managers take more care in recording points awarded so that we do not need to rely on scraps of paper used by our Club Captain for his after match speech.

Tony Johnston: Johno proved to be an exciting and powerful committee member. He was responsible for the recruitment policy and sponsorship function. The lack of success from a sponsorship perspective did not reflect the effort devoted by Johno in preparing proposals and mail-outs. Thanks Johno.

Rob McQuade: Rob took on the Operations Managers role and did a great job. His opinion was always respected by other committee members and he provided valued input into the running of the code. With his trusty disciples, Scott Carey - canteen, Steve Loxley gear steward and Paul Koziollek - ground setup operations was perhaps the smoothest it has ever been. Thanks boys for all your efforts during the season.

Scott Carey: Scotty put in a huge effort this season. What with holding down 2nd Grade Manager, Canteen Officer, and Social Manager there was no one else during the season that could match his efforts. With his good mate Chris Lamond, social was well covered. Well done Scotty and Chris and thanks.

Reg Taiata: Reg put in an enormous effort as Club Registrar during the season. With the huge increase in new players together with the inability of players to properly complete forms, Reg had a mammoth task. Deciphering the name was difficult enough. Thanks Reg a great season.

Matt Waddington: Club Captain is always a difficult role. Matt was the right choice. He commanded respect among the players and coaches and was also able to use himself as an example in most disputes. With the introduction of the Code of Conduct and Selection Policy Matt's work doubled. Well done Matt, a good solid mature season.

Fitness Manager: Ian Beattie, Stuart Brisbane, Reg Taiata and Terry Cleary all assisted in this role, Ian was original appointed, but due to work commitments was unable to give as much time as he would have liked. Thank boys for your efforts during the season.

Membership

There were 178 rugby players who played 1 or more matches for the Club in the 1996 season. This is a relatively large number, given we field only 4 grade sides and 1 colts side. The colts team had by far and away the highest turnover of players, with some 33 players

playing more than 1 match this season. It is evident from these high turnover rates that the Club must field a 5th Grade side in 1997 in order to maintain player interest and attempt to prevent such a large turnover of players. If the Club maintained every player that came down during the season we would have enough players to field at least 8 teams.



The 1996 season saw some 59 new players, representing 33 % of our total playing base. This represents perhaps one of the biggest influx of new players that I have seen in the Club for many years. We must ensure that these new players maintain their interest.

It is also worth noting that a large number of rugby players are drawn from suburbs not traditionally considered Briars suburbs. The graph above highlights the ever increasing distances Briars Rugby is drawing players from, and certainly future planning needs to carefully consider this fact.

Facilities

In 1996 Briars Rugby used two ovals within the Concord Municipality. Rothwell Park on Majors Bay Road was the home ground for the Club and accommodates both cricket and rugby during the year. Ron Routley Reserve behind Concord RSL was Briars Rugby's training ground.





Rothwell Park has been the Club's home ground for some time. The Club has over a number of years invested a considerable sum of money in its beatification and improvement for use by both Cricket and Rugby.

Rothwell has been considered our home ground for many years and therefore is historically significant to the Club and its players and supporters. Players both past and present, together with spectators, are familiar with Rothwell and its location. Rothwell is relatively close to the Club rooms at Burwood and the cost of leasing Rothwell is within Briars Rugby's current fiscal constraints.

Despite the above, Rothwell cannot accommodate after match speeches; the canteen facilities a becoming small for rugby and are insecure and require considerable upgrading to accommodate the ever increasing importance of the canteen; it does not have lights and therefore cannot be used for training purposes; it is not close to public transport and players and spectators have traditionally driven to the ground, a luxury not always available to everyone; and it has limited storage space to store equipment and goods.

Ron Routley Reserve has been the Club's training ground for several years. It is relatively large and has lights. There are, however, no facilities on site to store equipment, the ground is relatively far away from the Club rooms and therefore prevents any real post training discussion; and, the ground is nowhere near public transport, preventing players from using this form of transport to attend training.

It is imperative that future Rugby Committee's continue to examine the playing facilities currently used by rugby and compare them to those which are available elsewhere. By doing this the rugby facilities used will always be the best available.

Finance

The graphs below summarise the constitution of rugby's finances for the 1996 season. From these graphs it is quite clear that without the continued support of a few areas of revenue, rugby will not be in a position to meet it's strategic goals. That revenue is made up of:

- i) Player fees - collectability is crucial for the viability of the code
- Sponsorship a replacement for Manches ii) ter Unity will be required for 1997
- iii) Canteen, and - continued patronage is appreciated
- Bar profit share enjoy it while you can. iv)

It is important that every player be aware of this fact and be supportive to any player asked to contribute to our cause.

1st Grade

With the 1995 season a resounding success, it was anticipated that with some hard work and some off season recruiting the club should compete reasonably well in the 2nd division competition. However the season did not start as planned, with only 8 of last years 1st grade side beginning the season. The overlap of the cricket season by 2 weeks, delayed the appearances of some last years 1st graders until round 3 and 4. This also excluded some players at the trials and made it difficult to judge form and abilities. Accordingly by round 4, 1st grade had won only 50% of their games.

Fortunately with the availability of some players as the season progressed the team was able to build and compete to a level as was required in the new division. The 2nd division competition was not any tougher than 3rd division, but the standard of each club was more even rather than in 1995 where only the top 4 were of a consistent standard.

With some off season recruiting, the club was fortunate to gain the services of some new players of 1st grade standard such as: Ted Churchyard, Steve Arnold, Lee Tone, Phil Mason, Trevor Folsom, David Taylor, Silui Pita. This combined with the availability of players to 1st grade this year of: Phil Guest, Rob McQuade, Tai Singapu, George Ford, Mark Kingston, Jason Riik. These players had not played 1st grade in 1995 and with the existing players formed a good nucleus to work with and good depth.

The hardest part this season was to instil the discipline of the 1995 side into the team, and to get the team to forget the 1995 season and put the hard work in that was required to compete at the appropriate level. This was very hard throughout the season and together with the amount of injuries sustained made it difficult to maintain the consistent form that is required to win a premiership. However as with most good sides, in times of adversity, "when the going gets tough - the tough get going". This was evident in the last round when we had to win to ensure that we were in the semis and also in the semis and finals where the team came from the fourth position to play in the grand final.. A feat I'm sure many people did not think the team could achieve.

A total of 30 players played 1st grade throughout the season with no one player playing the full season. Those players with most games were Ted Churchyard and Greg Guest with 20 games each and Scott Hyde and Brendan Bailey with 19 games each.

The best and fairest award went to the 1st grade captain, Ted Churchyard, who had an outstanding season, and was a most deserving winner. In addition Ted also won the player's player award for the entire 2nd division competition, which showed the impact he had in the 1996 season.

On reflection of the 1996 season, it was a season of missed opportunities, players plagued by injuries, players transferred in their work, and some players lacking commitment of club policy and therefore the aspiration to play 1st grade. The opportunities missed were in losing the games such as, Canterbury (1st 7-6, 2nd round 20-20), Barker 26-25 after leading 25-6 at half time, Knox 21-17 giving them 10 points start in 3 minutes and a soft try, Newport 18-14 with a total lack of commitment, St. Ives 15-8 where we scored more tries and had more shots at goal and still lost the game. Considering the missed opportunities (i.e. 6 games) a further 12 points would have put 1st grade on 33 points and easily minor premiers.

Players lost to injury and unavailable were:

Anthony Johnston: arguably the best no. 4 in the competition and greatest impact player in the side with a broken hand in the 16th round

Lee Tone: a most exciting runner with the ball who broke his leg in the 2nd game of the season.

Trevor Folsom: 5/8 extraordinaire, the director of the team , and in my opinion could have directed us to win the Premiership had he not been injured, lost to the side after the 14th round with dislocated shoulders.

David Taylor: loose head prop, pinched spinal nerve after 17th round

Other players injured at any one time that caused a reshuffle in the side were Riik, Brisbane Taiata, McQuade, Beattie, Tepe, Koziollek. Other players lost to the side were Phil Mason, outstanding loose head prop, and Tai Singapu a good defensive and attacking outside centre, who both were transferred with their work late in the season.

As can be seen from the above the team was unable to settle into a nucleus of 15 players, and on a week to week basis new players were being tried in various positions or existing players



shuffled into other positions to best complement the team. Unfortunately, with the fortunes of 1st grade not as outstanding as the 2nd and 3rd grade sides at approximately the 3/4 mark of the season, some players decided that they would prefer to play only in the position of their own choice. This is contrary to club policy and in no way assists the rugby club as a whole. Fortunately all but one of the players was able to understand that 1st grade is the most important grade as it achieves the most points for the club championship and it is only by winning the club championship, that the club is promoted to 1st division, the goal we all aspire to. In the words of one outstanding player in the club when asked to play in a position not fancied by him- "for club or country !!!" (to quote an esteemed poet - "there's a spirit in The Briars - etc.")

However, in spite of all the problems that the team encountered the players were able to rally and produce some excellent games. For mine the three outstanding games of the season were the St. Ives 13-12 (2 tries to nil), Newport 31-11(4 tries to 1) wins in the first round, and the 32-0 annihilation of Forest in the 2nd round. In the Forest game we had close to our best side and with Trevor at the helm showed what could have been on grand final day had he and the other 5 players missing on the day through injury been available.

For sheer commitment to the task at hand the semi final against St. Ives, won 13-11 on full time, and the final against St. Ignations won 6-0 defending a lead and playing into a howling gale into the 2nd half, were outstanding achievements and showed the true character of the side. Both these teams had beaten Briars at their last meeting and given the situation of sudden death football, the 1st grade side rose to the challenge.

The style of play adopted this year was once again to run good ball, punch up bad ball until it is good ball and then use it. The side played attractive football and this was evident with 52 tries being scored in the 21 games played. The tries were evenly shared with 26 tries being scored in the backs and the forwards. The play was directed from the 5/8 position and used the runner on the inside and outside. At times the team suffered by not having the mobility to ensure that each phase was controlled. For this season the scrum was a lot stronger than last year, but if the forwards do lack a particular trait it is that they need to concentrate more on their technique and ensure that each phase of their game is controlled. This will come with a greater emphasis now there is a common nucleus of players in the side . These features do not just happen but take time, confidence and a willingness on the part of the player to make it happen rather than play one out type football. I believe the last two years has engendered the confidence and never say die attitude in the players and will pay huge benefits in the 1997 season. As I stated in my last year report the 1st grade side now has a will to win and regardless of the score at half time believe in themselves that they can win any game.

It should be said that the cameraderie of players is the strength of any team, in this side and for that matter in the club the players not only generated good vibes amongst themselves but given the situation with unavailability of players through injury and the like, it was for this reason that the team and the club had such a good year.

As the coach of the side and ably assisted by Tony Wozniak, we were pleased with the results of the season. Certainly there are things that need to be fixed but to have competed in the grand final in the 1st year in 2nd division, was an outstanding effort and the players are to be congratulated and should be proud of their achievements. However, having said that the goal is to get the club back into 1st division, and each year it is left to happen becomes that little bit harder.

We believe that with the new coach as now secured, and the benefits and access to players that he will undoubtedly bring with him and the standard of players currently with the club, ensures that the 1997 season will be a good one. Furthermore it is now time to have a professional trainer for the club that is not associated with the club in any way, and his job is to ensure that the fitness of the players is at an appropriate level. For too long the majority of these tasks has been handled by the players in 1st grade and it does not allow them to concentrate sufficiently enough on their own fitness.

Highlights of the season were: the semi final and final - you had to be there to experience it and words cannot describe the feelings that Woz, Andy and I felt when we won a birth in the grand final for the 2nd year in a row.

The season was a successful one but mainly due to the hard work and support of a lot of people. Special thanks must go to my assistant coach Tony Wozniak for his 2nd year in support. Woz's talents and experience as a coach were invaluable. His support, understand-

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ing, and patience assisted the team and myself greatly. Woz has the ability to recognise the problems readily and communicate clearly the ways of addressing the problem without being dogmatic in his approach. A great deal of the success of the team in the last two seasons was in my opinion due to communication that we had together with the team being of paramount importance and the relationship and communication with the players over the last two years . Woz has the respect of the players and also the ability to relate to the players at the highest level. Thanks Woz.

Andy Craig, in a difficult year for him handled the duties admirably. As manager of the side, Andy has only one problem in that he is so passionate about the team he sometimes is unaware that he is the manager. Andy was more than a manager, he was another team member and often could be heard barracking and driving the team that little bit more. Andy was the third coach often discussing the benefits and disadvantages of the team with Woz and I. It should be said that the success of the team was due to the open communication that existed with Andy, Woz and myself and certainly I was very appreciative of the support given to me by Andy. An extremely good clubman well liked and respected by the players. Thanks -Andy

Special thanks to the players who led the training sessions on a weekly basis: Stu Brisbane, Reg Taiata, Terry Cleary, Phil Guest, Ian Beattie. The club physio, Dianne Porter, who worked tirelessly to keep our players on the paddock and ensured they were well taped and strapped before the games. We are very fortunate to have a lady of Dianne's abilities, strength of character, and love of the club and team - we should never take her for granted.- Thanks Mrs. churchyard!! To John Threlfo for his support on the sideline, and support as Club President. To Chris Walker for his continued support and advice from overseas. To those people that always helped out when required especially Steve Loxley.

Last, but not least, special thanks must go to Phil Guest whose tireless work and organisation behind the scenes laid the foundations for a very successful 1996 season! The Governor's Day, an excellent function, organised by Phil was testimony to his hard work. Phil's administration and drive and support ensured that what was formulated at the beginning of the season became practice throughout the season. In conclusion, I am sure that the team can go on to greater things and be equally successful in the 1997 season. Provided that the team can display the same dedication, commitment, discipline and most importantly establish the same cameraderie that was so evident this year, together with the will to win, there is no reason why the Barraclough Cup cannot be won in 1997. Let's get it right in 1997 and approach the rugby as a club and set our goal to win the club championship and get promoted to Kentwell Cup, the premier division. Greg Brown: Full back (18) Outstanding player good under the high ball with a safe pair of hands. Good timing and has the ability to beat a player and create breaks. Very good in attack and organises the players well around him in defence. A much quieter season for Greg as he approaches his veteran years. A handy goal kicker at long range. Will get even better with improved fitness. A great acquisition for any team and needs to be involved as much as possible. Shall we ever forget his field goal against St. Ives?



James Steele: Left wing/centre (16) A good positional winger with good defence that is not afraid to support the forwards when required. Lost interest in the wing position but with new found enthusiasm in the centres was a good asset for the team. Elusive runner with the ball with deceptive speed. Needs to motivate himself at training a bit more but always gave 100% on the field. Had a good season that was enhanced with his centre form in the final series.

Silui Pita: Left wing (9) A very strong offensive and defensive player that cemented his position in the side with some strong runs into the back line and big hits on the opposition. Lacks some positional play but this will improve with further experience. A good half back if required. Had a good debut season in 1st grade.

Hockey Chairman's Report

1996 proved once again to be not the greatest year in the history of Briars Hockey. We find ourselves being unsuccessful and part of the reason is that we are not doing enough of the basic things, some of which I will outline later.

As is normal we had an unprepared start to the season, in spite of preseason warm up games and a registration day, these were poorly attended. An exodus of players from the previous season made things appear very grim indeed. Thanks to the informal recruitment efforts of Andre De Clase, Jesse and Bob Singh and others we were able to field three teams pretty consistently throughout the year.

On field performances varied across the grades and throughout the season but were on the whole disjointed, disunited and feeble. Lack of constructive. on field direction and cohesion from senior players made things difficult for younger players who found themselves disagreeing with many ideas being suggested. Training attendances also varied greatly, having record numbers near the start of the season but declining rapidly to be quite poor by the end of the year.

The support of players for fund-raising and social events must again be called into question. If players are not prepared to spend the time and effort to ensure these successes, they must inevitably pay higher fees, which no-one wants to do. A hockey season does not run itself, it takes money and work. To be successful requires a certain high level of commitment and effort from all involved. It is a very sad fact that apathy spreads very easily and keen people lose their motivation and enthusiasm very quickly if they are not supported and their good example is not followed.

In these days of high cost amateur sport we must endeavour to defray expenses as much as possible by fund-raising, social events and especially the pursuit of sponsorship, which is the best avenue of raising working capital.

Lack of financial knowledge and poor decisions by hockey management coupled with player apathy and lack of a thoughtful budget contributed to a \$7000 loss for the season. This is unacceptable and may well mean the decision is made to play on grass in 1997. This would probably mean the death of Briars Hockey as we know it. The Hockey Management Committee is continuing its efforts to ensure that this does not happen and will require every players' assistance and support. This includes mass fund-raising activities, attendance at the golf tournaments and social events.

The Board of Directors has requested and we have submitted, a Business Plan for 1997 to outline ways to improve the financial and morale situations. This Plan, among other things, must be followed closely if we are going to recover from our recent poor experiences and forge ahead to bigger and better times.

Discipline was again a problem on occasions throughout the year. Board has expressed concern about what strategies we have in place to maintain discipline. Rugby have produced a Code of Conduct for themselves, it may be a good idea to do the same for Hockey to have an outline of recognised appropriate behaviour and an official point of reference within Hockey for disciplinary procedures.

On a more positive note, our junior program was very successful this year. The all-conquering under thirteens won the Sydney Junior Hockey Association North Area competition and were declared Premiers, after downing Northern Districts 3-0 in the Grand Final and only losing one game all year. Congratulations go to the players and also to Coach Nick Pervushin and Manager Lachlan Boa for a committed, positive and professional attitude throughout the year.

Numbers and training attendances were excellent for all three junior teams, but insufficient for an Under 15 team this year. We will, however, have a strong Under 15 team in 1997. Behaviour was quite good, with just a few undisciplined players causing the occasional few headaches on and off the field. Kids were happy and satisfied most of the time, as were the parents, who gave great support throughout the year.

Allen Chu did an outstanding job in his position of Junior Convenor, sending out regular memos and newsletters, attending S.J.H.A meetings and generally ensuring that everything was under control and running smoothly. He was ably assisted by the Junior Committee which included player Paul Burgess and parents Barbara Allsop, Sandra Hook, Dean Garland and Vicki and Harry Miliatis. The Junior Presentation Night at the Club was a big success.



Much thanks and recognition must go to Paul Burgess, for the many necessary but thankless administrative and junior tasks he performed during the year, and to Brett Graham and Jesse Borthwick, without whose everyday assistance the season would have been an absolute disaster, instead of a minor one. Players mentioned and others including Marc Burns, Marcus Thiele, Brad Fussell and John Price obviously care a lot about the Club and will form the basis of Hockey Management next year. I urge any other players who have the same feelings to become involved, it can be very rewarding.

Things we must endeavour to perform in 1997 include; setting up a motivated skilful, workable Committee of Management; establishing good communication, i.e. a regular newsletter; and task allocation. So we know who is responsible for doing what. Card completion, match reviews, field bookings, uniform supply and control/maintenance. Focus article writing, attending meetings, keeping a diary and getting up to the club after games are some tasks we must improve on. We <u>must</u> also put a lot more players though umpiring courses and secure ourselves more badged umpires within the Club. Basically we need to have a more professional attitude towards everything we do.

In conclusion I would like to thank all players and supporters for their efforts during 1996 and I look forward to seeing you next season. I sincerely hope that we find within ourselves what is necessary to have a more successful 1997.

Well, what can I say? This is the most successful team in Briars Junior Hockey history, finishing the 1996 season on 22 points with 11 wins, 2 losses and 2 draws and securing both the Minor and Major Premiers.

From the outset we knew that we had to ability to make it to the semifinals with a brilliant 6-0 thrashing of Redlands. By round 2 of the competition it was an obvious three way race for the Premiership, as we conceded a draw to Baulkham Hills and a loss to Northern Districts. At the end of the regular season we turned up and whipped Baulkham Hills then had an unfortunate 2-2 draw with Northern Districts.

The Major semifinal was against Northern Districts at Ku-Ring-Gai (Gordon). We turned on some our best hockey all year only to go down 2-1, not helped by a pitiful display of umpiring witnessed by all at the ground.

We had one last chance to make it to the Grand Final, but we had to go up against Baulkham Hills. After 60 minutes of hockey (i.e. full-time) in summer weather the score was locked at 0-0. We began a 20 minute period of overtime and scored after 5 minutes. We held out Baulkham Hills for the next 15 minutes and were courageous winners 1-0.

The Grand Final. After just over 5 months of hockey it came down to this one game against Northern Districts, against whom we had only managed 1 draw and two losses in our three outings against them. The extra semifinal and training session in that week worked in our favour and we were fully prepared for the game.

We started the match very strongly and scored in the 13th minute to go to half time with a 1-0 lead. In the second half we scored two more goals and narrowly missed two other scoring opportunities to take out the Grand Final 3-0.

Activities:

The principal activity of the Club during the year was that of the promotion and playing of amateur sport. The Club is a licensed club under the provisions of the Registered Club's Act 1976 as amended. There has been no change in the company's activities since the last report.

Results:

The net result of operations for the year was a Profit of \$9,653 (1995 - \$4,342). Income tax was not applicable as per Note 1(c) of the Notes Accompanying the Financial Statements.

The results of the Company reflect the continued difficult bar trading conditions of recent years. Patronage of the bar after sport and on Friday evenings continues to decline reflecting the cultural change with "drink driving". The refurbished shops are fully occupied and returning the Club considerably higher rents.

The Directors and Management of the Club are continually instigating various initiatives to improve the Bar Trading and general use of the Clubroom facilities. We now have modern Clubrooms with good facilities that need to be utilised by the membership a lot more than is currently the situation.

Sports continue to find it difficult to contain operating costs without significant sponsorships. The loss of some major sponsors has impacted the recent operating results of Cricket and Hockey. The deficit recorded by cricket was after providing for a write down of equipment inventory values by \$3,811. The large Hockey deficit has been addressed by the Hockey Committee and Board with steps now in place to ensure that the sport is administered in a financially sound manner to ensure that no further deficits are experienced. Budgets provide for the recovery of this year's deficit over the next 3 seasons.

Directors' Benefits:

Since the end of the previous financial year no director of the company has received or become entitled to receive any benefits.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting standards and the Corporations Law, including the disclosure requirements of Schedule 5 of the Corporations Regulations. The financial statements have also been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the Accounts:-

(a) Depreciation

Non-current assets, at cost or valuation are depreciated at rates based upon their expected useful economic lives, using the prime cost or diminishing value as applicable.

(b) Inventories

All inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost has been determined by specific identification.

(c) Income Tax

The club considers its operations to be exempt from income tax under section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act in that the Club is established for the encouragement and promotion of amateur sport.

(d) Subscriptions in Advance

Subscriptions in Advance represent membership receipts beyond the current financial period. Such income is brought to account in the period to which the subscription relates.
