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# AS THE WORLD MOVED INTO A NEW MILLENNIUM and the many challenges facing a changing world, so too The Briars Sporting Club Ltd has to address the same changes.

The Club has recorded a financial loss; however the loss has arisen out of our decision to engage the Club's first full time employee. A review of our accounts will show that, in the absence of the costs of the employee, a profit would have been returned. In this respect, the Board considers that steps are being taken to address the question of the profitability of the Club.

Once again, Bar turnover has failed to reach expectations. It is heartening to know however, that the profitability of the Bar has been increased. This has occurred primarily due to a continued upgrading and monitoring of the Bar equipment.

We continued to have good relations with our tenants, who continued to pay rent on a timely basis. In the current climate of minimal consumer price index increases, the rental return has not increased substantially. However, the reliability of our tenants is appreciated.

Over the year, a review was conducted of our financial investments in an attempt to maximise future earnings, and funds have been placed appropriately.

We have continued the gradual upgrade of the Club's premises. In last years Annual Report, it was noted the Board is mindful of ensuring that any expenditure carried out will ultimately increase the return of such investment to the Club. One hopes that with the soon to be completed re-carpeting the Club rooms will become a more inviting venue for socialising, with a return to strong profits.

As a Sporting Club, we have continued to excel and noting that this is the primary reason for our existence, it is in this area we should judge the continued success of the Club. Cricket continued the magnificent era they are in by winning the Club Championship yet again, successfully defending 1st Grade premiership, winning our first under 24 premiership and again winning the 4th Grade premiership. Additionally, 2nd Grade, 3rd Grade and 5th Grade were beaten Semi-Finalists. It is also heartening to note that the success of Cricket comes with a growing group of players, which augers well for the future. Once again, the efforts of Gerard Price, his players, coaches and Committee are acknowledged.

Last year saw Hockey promoted to the Premier Division of the Sydney Hockey Association. This year the Club finished 4th place in the Club Championship. The 1st Grade team were beaten in the minor Semi-Final and the 2nd Grade team beaten in the preliminary Final. A growing junior Club and successful female teams, coupled with an aggressive junior program in the area, ensures that Hockey will continue to grow provided our efforts are continued. During the year, Dean Garland resigned as Chairman and was replaced by Greg Dunn and congratulations go to both of them and their Committee.

Probably the highlight of the Hockey season was the opening of the Hockey Field adjoining Concord Oval. As was reported last year, Concord Council elected to build this facility and financial assistance was provided by the Briars Foundation. Significantly, the financial arrangements associated with the running of the Hockey field and its canteen, has ensured that Hockey has made a healthy profit, which will greatly assist in the continuing development and promotion of Hockey within the local area.

Squash was reported last year as continuing to perform reasonably in difficult circumstances. The situation does not change. Ron Marshall retired as Chairman during the course of the year and was replaced by Guy Amedee. The most significant challenge that faces Squash is the availability of a suitable venue with the continued suggestion the Five Dock Squash Centre will close. Notwithstanding that one of the Courts remaining in the local area, which is our home base at the present time, may close, the Squash Committee has committed itself to ensuring that Squash continues as a major sport in Briars. Continuing efforts are being made in an attempt to re-locate to suitable courts if necessary, to seek to have further Courts developed in the local area.

Rugby continued to struggle in 3rd Division. One cannot detract from the efforts of Matt Waddington, Rugby Chairman, his fellow Committee members or the coaching staff. The results throughout the year were mixed with no team making the Semi Finals However the potential that exists within the Club was most clearly displayed by the fact that we defeated the 1st Grade Minor Premiers, Petersham, in the 1st round and were beaten on the bell by them in the 2nd round.



To carry the Chairman's role in a sport that continues to struggle, requires great fortitude. The Board thanks Matt Waddington and his Committee for their continued efforts and trust that the injection of more senior members into the Rugby Committee will give Matt the honour of leading Rugby back to its rightful place.

Once again, we have received support from Burwood RSL by way of donation. These have been used in meeting the cost of various junior development programs. If there has been one area the Club has continued to excel in, it is the development of junior programs, primarily within Hockey and Cricket. The year 2001 is also going to see significant involvement in junior Rugby.

As mentioned earlier, the Club has employed its first staff member. Unfortunately, the road has been somewhat rocky with our first two employees resigning after a relatively short period of time. Notwithstanding this, the Club has seen the benefit of having a full time employee in assisting in the smooth running of the Club. There is little doubt our Treasurer, Bill Hooker and Hon. Executive Officer, John Threlfo, have appreciated the assistance given by these people. The presence of a paid employee has also enabled us to become more involved in the Schools and the surrounding junior Associations. We believe the continuation of this arrangement will continue over the next few years and all junior sportsman and women within the Burwood and Concord areas will become well acquainted with the Briars Sporting Club.

The past year has also been a period of consultation in relation to a proposal to change the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Club to allow for female membership. A Committee was formed, made up of people who covered all views in relation to the question of female membership. There has also been extensive canvassing of members, both young an old. I note that at the last Annual General Meeting, the question of allowing female membership was to be put. However, it was agreed that it was inappropriate to consider such a significant move without having first thoroughly investigated the effect of such a decision on the continued running of the Club. I believe anyone who has wished to have a say, has been given ample opportunity to do so and so the question of female membership will go to the members at this Annual General Meting.

I acknowledge the contribution and assistance of Board and Management Committees. Once again, the outstanding contribution of Bill Hooker as Treasurer of our Club, cannot be under estimated. During the last year, Bill, in addition to his voluntary work for The Briars, has been constantly involved in the Paralympics and we thank him for his contribution.

At the time of writing this report, it is with sadness that I acknowledge the passing of our Patron, Harvey Ford. During my time as President, I have on many occasions been contacted by Harvey with his views on where the Club is going and comments in relation to any proposed changes within the Club. Notwithstanding that Harvey represented in some respects the views of the earlier years of the Club, he has also acknowledged that the people now running the Club were those who would make the decisions in relation to the future of the Club and was full of support for whatever those decisions may be. The passing of Harvey is the passing of a true gentleman, the passing of a Briar of whom we have always been proud.



THE FIRST GRADE SHIRES COMPETITION consists of highly paid ex first grade players, a number of ex Sheffield players and the odd ex Test player. To win one competition is remarkable: to win two in a row is amazing – and that's what the mighty Burwood Briars have achieved.

After achieving what we'd been searching for, for a number of years – a "Premiership" – in 1998/99, this season was always going to be difficult. No First Grade Shires premiers have made the semi-finals the following season for the past four years. So our aim for this season was exactly that – to make the semi-finals. Well, not only did we achieve that we also became the first Briars 1st Grade side in 50 years to win back to back premierships – a remarkable achievement.

The loss of Darren Holley back to Sutherland, and an early season exit to Port Macquarie by Phil Adams – two of our top performers last season, was always going to make things difficult. However the inclusion of Greg Douglas (former junior) from Penrith, Dave Smit, our English friend, and Cameron French from Parramatta certainly filled the gap. More consistent performances by Anthony Raymond and Sarkis Achmar and penetrating bowling from Brad Sculley and Gerard Price also impacted dramatically on the side. Our English Dave Smit has been a revelation with over 600 runs in first grade to date and 300-400 runs in under 24's. Although we started the season a little slower this time, we hit form at the right end of the season and peaked during the FINALS, despite being in 8th place just after Christmas.

# Cricket Third Grade

A few problem areas surfaced in our loss to Pennant Hills and we finished with another crushing win and a wash out.

We entered the preliminary semi final having had a preview of our opponents, Holroyd in the previous round. We had the advantage of the best home wicket we had seen all season and batted in 35 degree heat, yet it was our batsmen who wilted under mild pressure. The game was virtually lost before lunch as poor shot selection and execution gifted wickets to the moderate attack. The later batsmen showed how easy it was but the damage had already been done.

I hope that the players who participated in this game will have gained an understanding that the purpose of the preliminary rounds extends beyond winning to development of a blueprint for winning the games that count.

On a positive note, our points made a significant contribution towards yet another Club Championship and several players produced significant individual performances as detail below and in the statistics. Congratulations are extended to each of the members of our three premiership teams, especially Nick Rojo, who captained a winning side at first attempt.



I thank all thirty three players that played in the side during the year: Player profiles of regular team members appear hereunder:

# **Player Profiles**

PAUL BEACROFT: contributed either runs or wickets in most games prior to moving to Perth in January.

MICHAEL BODMAN: competent middle order batsman who scored two half centuries. The only member of the team to run in the Olympic Torch Relay.

SCOTT CASTLE: Enthusiastic fast bowler who bowled without luck early in the season and then hit a purple patch where he took 17 wickets in 3 matches at extraordinarily low cost. Finished the season in 2nd grade.

CORIE DICKESON: Middle order batsman that gets on with the game. Particularly severe on bowlers who are short of the required standard, punishing Roseville and Hills with centuries. Useful fielder who is only too happy to advise opponents on how to improve their game.

ADAM HUDSON: scored more than 250 runs in only 4 innings and spent the rest of the season in 2nd grade.

SAEED KHAN: Proved that he had been wasted in 4th grade in the previous 2 seasons when his 8 games produced 20 wickets at the excellent average of 11.5. Knee problems restricted his appearances later in the season. Had a batting average of 2.25.

ALAN LOGAN: Mr Reliable kept wicket in every game and topped the association dismissal list with 23 catches. Five scores in excess of 30 meant that Alan was runner up as Player of the Year.

NICK MURPHY: Aggressive fast bowler who arrived from Melbourne mid season and took wickets consistently to finish with 22 at 15 each. Took another 3 in his only appearance in 2nds. Fields like some of the great fast bowlers of the past.

BRENT PATERSON: Increased availability allowed Brent to develop into the key batsman in 3rd grade. Scored 419 runs and reached double figures on 11 occasions. Capable of similar figures in 2nd grade. Voted Player of the Year by his peers.

NADEEM SHEIKH: A large hundred against Macquarie University demonstrated he was in fine form before he was called suddenly to Pakistan to advise Inzamam on running between wickets. Outstanding slips fielder.

ASH SQUIRE: Finally began to deliver some of his undoubted potential when consecutive forties preceded a broken thumb in the Under 24s Final. Bowling would benefit from greater consistency.

WINNING A PREMIERSHIP with these guys was simple and the only acceptable result. In any other club the majority of the side would have been in higher grades, but getting all 11 players to the same ground, on time, and with all the equipment necessary to play cricket was the challenging part.

The excitement of being captain was quickly washed away in the first game of the season against Canterbury/Bexley as I slowly realised that I had been suckered once again by one of the Prices. Watching the sun go down behind the houses of Concord I tried to recall the moment I actually accepted the position, but strangely, I couldn't. But getting wholloped by Canterbury was the wake up needed and thankfully we played the remainder of the season without losing another match.

As in any successful team the nucleus remained more or less the same for the whole season and when we were in trouble against sides it was the strength of our core that we relied on to get us home. For me it was the experience and fierce competitiveness of Kevin Ivins that greatly helped me motivate the team and the reliability of the opening partnership in Jason and Brendan Bailey that provided a solid start on most occasions. Their unbeaten opening stand against Macquarie Uni of 265 was not only a club record but an SCA record as well. Unfortunately for Jason, overseas commitments meant that he was not with us at the end of the season but he was an invaluable part of the team for 9 matches. Although these two guys seemed to dominate most of the match reports throughout the season the efforts of other players cannot go unmentioned. Paul Pannuti was the target of many team jokes but always gave 110% and proved his ability with the ball on many occasions, Babar Khan took wickets whenever he bowled and managed consistency with the bat and Dan Rojo was coaxed off the comfortable lounge to play as a batsman and ended up averaging 42 from his four digs.

So those were the highlights and there weren't too many disappointments, mostly unforgettable experiences. Like the semi-final where one brother couldn't bat because his other brother was wearing his underpants. Or the final against Souths where an experienced bowler was mistakenly cautioned by the square leg umpire for 'sledging' the batsman when in fact the abuse had been levelled at his captain because he'd made the outrageous decision to give the bowler a rest. The Epping lads provided some tough opposition in the qualifying final and batting first, posted a moderate 116. They were routed by some excellent bowling from Babar Khan with 4 for 18 off 15 overs. In reply Adam Langhans and Brendan Bailey got us to 57 before Brendan went for 39, but a solid 57 from Adam got us home before a middle order collapse on day two saw us finish on 164. Epping then scrapped a competitive 119 with Pannuti taking 4 for 28 off 18 overs. There were a few nerves before we got to 5 for 68 and close of play.

Winning the Semi-final against Warringah was going to be much tougher and when I lost the toss we were sent in to bat on a sticky Ron Routley wicket. Being 3 for 13 after 9 overs wasn't what we had planned but good batting from Paul Fraser and Babar Khan started a middle order revival. Babar's 47 was his best innings of the summer and with Kevin Ivins 24, Luke Stewart 31 and Mark Bailey 18\* we finished a defendable 165. At the end of day one Warringah were 2 for 79 and things weren't looking that good for us

but on day two good bowling and finals pressure got to the young Warringah side and the runs on the board were enough to secure us victory. Seasons' best figures of 5 for 30 for me couldn't have come at a better time, and some good fielding grabbed us two runouts.

On to the final against everyone's favourite club, South Sydney. This time we had a fair chance with neutral umpires, although how they managed to get the final played on their home ground is beyond reasoning. They won the toss and elected to bat first, finishing 182 all out. Their usual niggling and delaying tactics were adding fuel to an already tense final and unfortunately the flare ups detracted from a solid fielding effort that contained and dominated the South Sydney batsmen. Overnight rain should not have been a problem but regrettably for Souths their expensive covers leaked water onto a good length at both ends of the pitch. Souths were despetate now, so off they went to Kennards and hired themselves an industrial blower and a generator to match.

Sitting back in the sheds knowing that a draw was good enough and watching one or two of our favourite South Sydney players sliding around in the mud will keep me laughing for many years but after all their hard work they finally had Burwood on a sticky wicket with 50 odd overs to win the game. Solid sensible batting saw us get to 108 without loss before they gave up and surprisingly called off the game. I can't imagine their despair!.. I suppose the papers read better if the game finished up a draw, and they were probably thinking of their sponsors. Still, everyone who was there knows that they quit! Excellent batting under extreme pressure by Adam Langhans 33\* and Brendan Bailey 64\* gave the Briars a well-deserved premiership. It's a funny game cricket!

Many thanks to all 25 guys that came through the fours this year, thanks particularly to Gerard and Paul Price who offered some good advice throughout the season and helped me greatly with selections, tactics and even finding players at the 11th hour. Special thanks also to Kevin Ivins who added to the team a great sense of focus and commitment, to the other captains for letting me keep the Baileys (I think?) and to Daffy for giving us the only motivation we needed to win.

Congratulations to the mighty fours for a great season and some really good laughs. By the end of the season we developed a strong attitude as a team and it proved to be a winning formula. I just hope I never see any of you guys ever again. Congratulations also to Paul Price and the other first graders, Rob Nandi and the 24's and congratulations to all cricketers for the Club Championship. It's great to be part of such a successful club.



WE FINALLY WON THE SHIELD! For the first time in the Club's history, our under 24's won the Frank Gray Shield competition this season. Dominating, efficient, professional and ruthless all aptly describe the manner in which this squad went about its business in realising its premiership aspirations.

To say that winning this competition is the result of a number of years of hard work and planning would be an understatement. Rob Nandi, as skipper, has moulded the core of the team over the last three or four seasons into a highly credentialed and awesome outfit.

To illustrate just how dominant Burwood was throughout the season, our lowest total of 171 was more than the highest score against us in any game. With the bat, we had eight batsmen average more than 20, including David Smit, who finished with an average of 65.8. With the ball, each of our four main strike bowlers averaged under 12 runs per wicket. It is clear by this table that there wasn't much between the top three clubs and how great the gap is between the club champions and Briars. If we are to gain promotion back into second division we will need to accumulate around 800 club championship points or 500 more points than we achieved this year. For those who aren't aware 1st grade is worth 30 points, 2nd grade is worth 16 points, 3rd grade is worth 8 points and 4th grade is worth 4 points. I'll let you work out your own maths as to how to make-up the extra points.

At a minimum we will need to improve our overall attitude and commitment. The attendance at training has been at best, poor. Too often there were only enough guys there for first grade to train together as a team with mixed opposition from the rest of the grades. Thank you all and hope to see you all next year and lets have a better season.





My personal broad assessment of the team perfomances is as follows; -



Your directors present their report on the accounts of the company for the year ended 30 September 2000. The following persons hold office as directors at the date of this report:

Activities:

The principal activity of the Club during the year was that of the promotion and playing of amateur sport. The Club is a licensed club under the provisions of the Registered Club's Act 1976 as amended. There has been no change in the company's activities since the last report.

Results:

The net result of operations for the year was a Loss of \$37,159 (1999 - \$6,049 Loss). Income tax was not applicable as per Note 1(c) of the Notes Accompanying the Financial Statements.

The results of the Company are disappointing in that we are still unable to turnaround the ever decreasing bar turnover. This has a significant impact upon the Club's revenue base for which we do not have a replacement income source at this stage.

During the year the Club appointed a Marketing & Development Officer to help grow our membership base while also marketing the Club to prospective Sponsors to help alleviate the financial costs of running the various Sports. The costs associated with this position were \$39,320 for the fiscal period. This appointment was never expected to yield a return in the initial 3 years. It is an investment in the future strength and financial viability of our sports. It is an investment that the Board is continually assessing to ensure that we stay focused on the goal of increasing our playing membership and also increasing the contribution by local businesses to our sports operating costs,. The need to ensure that we lift our bar contribution is also paramount to this investment.

Subscription Notices were omitted from being sent to members until November 2000. Annual income in the order of \$7,500 has therefore not been received in this fiscal period. Rugby recorded a \$4,367 deficit (1999 \$3,132 deficit) for the period. Board and Management have made changes within the organisation structure of Rugby to try and bring the sport into a financially viable operation.

Directors' Benefits:

Since the end of the previous financial year no director of the company has received or become entitled to receive any benefits.

Indemnity against Liabilities:

The company has not during or since the financial year, in respect of any person who is or has been an officer or auditor of the company or a related body corporate:

- indemnified or made any relevant agreement for indemnifying against a liability, including costs and expenses in successfully defending legal proceedings; or
- (b) paid or agreed to pay a premium in respect of a contract insuring against a liability for the costs or expenses to defend legal proceedings.





### NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2000

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards and the Corporations Law, including the disclosure requirements of Schedule 5 of the Corporations Regulations. The financial statements have also been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the Accounts:

#### (a) Depreciation

Non-current assets, at cost or valuation are depreciated at rates based upon 'their expected useful economic lives, using the prime cost or diminishing value as applicable'.

#### (b) Inventories

All inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost has been determined by specific identification.

#### (c) Income Tax

The club considers its operations to be exempt from income tax under section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act in that the Club is established for the encouragement and promotion of amateur sport.

- (d) Subscriptions in Advance Subscriptions in Advance represent membership receipts beyond the current financial period. Such income is brought to account in the period to which the subscription relates.
- (e) Due to the need for the Sports within the Club to raise monies for not only the current financial period but for future periods also the Club has adopted the accounting treatment of transferring operating surpluses, after any Club subsidies to reserves held in trust for the sport. These reserves can be called upon in future periods should a sport run at a deficit.


