The 1st. XI.—Although N. Wales was missed from the 1st. XI last season, C. Mitchell filled the gap wonderfully well, and was the batting mainstay in a team that was proficient in this respect. Brought up from the Seconds after the 4th. Round, he started off with 129 and subsequently never failed to reach double figures in an innings, finishing up with an aggregate of 441 runs for an average of 49.0, the best ever recorded in the Club.

N. Neville topped the aggregate with 534 runs and his score of 180 against Waverley C.C. is another Club record.

Others to bat particularly well at times were H. Windon (1 century), C. Nee and A. Land (1 century).

Three partnerships worth recording are: 203 for the 4th wicket by H. Windon and C. Mitchell; 222 also for the 4th wicket by A. Land and N. Neville, and 152 for the 10th wicket by B. McKittrick and R. Clark.

The best of a weak attack were D. Robinson, H. Windon and R. Clark.

The fielding throughout was very fair, and few chances in the air were missed.

The 2nd. XI, runners up the previous season, were a weaker batting combination, and the only member to show to advantage after C. Mitchell's promotion were R. McLaughlin, who played some nice innings, and J. Hollands, a very promising bat.

The bowling was better, and P. Murray and R. Glasgow had an unsuccessful but interesting race for 50 wickets with their consistent trundling. The best average went to A. McNaught, who received few opportunities but made the best of them.

The fielding on the whole was disappointing, and there is room for improvement here.

The 3rd. XI. commenced the season for more powerful in batting than it has been for some years, but the bowling did not match this department in proficiency, nor was the fielding of a high standard early, although this improved as the season advanced.

L. Davis was in great form, scoring 406 runs, including one century, at an average of 45.1. J. Hollands earned his promotion to the Seconds, while L. Keeler would rise higher, too, if only he played regularly. Others to bat well were K. Maxwell, K. Grave, A. Herron, F. Bissaker and D. Fraser,

Although the bowlers possessed average ability, they were far too inconsistent.

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE AND HON. TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

To the Members of The Briars Sporting Club-

Gentlemen:

The Nineteenth Annual Report of your Club's activities for the year ended 30th, June, 1937, is submitted herewith.

In our sporting results, there has been a decline. At cricket, the 1st. and 2nd. XI's dropped in the competition table from 3rd. and 2nd. to 7th. and 5th. place, respectively, while the 3rd. XI dropped from 3rd. to 6th. position.

The footballers are having a lean time this season, and the standard is below that of previous years. Yet it is nice to be able to write that, since our last report, the 2nd. XV. were successful in winning the Whiddon Cup for the 1936 season.

Our sporting weaknesses, we feel, are part of the inevitable ebb and flow of athletic bodies, and can be looked upon as a passing phase.

What is causing your Committee more concern is the reduced keenness of members and their reluctance to support Club activities.

We boast a peak membership, but this is not adequately reflected either in the attendances at our domestic sports or at the Club Rooms.

A spirit of complacency appears to be spreading to the various sub-committees and stewards, and is becoming increasingly evident as the older members cease to take an active part in the various phases of the Club.

The new members of recent years are urged to display the interest and enthusiasm necessary to keep the Club organisation on a sound footing, while efforts must be made to awaken greater activity next year to ensure that the Club will maintain and even improve on the expected standard.

Library.—Sub-Committee: Messrs. W. Hulls, L. Keeler, Ron Thomson. During the year the usual quota of new books has been added to the Library, and evidently the additions have proved popular.

Whilst on this subject, the attention of members is invited to the necessity for their collaboration when taking out and returning books. It is a source of deep regret that the courtesies have not been properly observed during the past year, and this fact is no doubt the cause of the alarming increase in the number of books unreturned and not able to be traced. The position has become so serious as to warrant earnest consideration being given by the Committee to the curtailment of the Library facilities which, of course, will be a definite inconvenience to all concerned.

Entertainments.—The 1936 Christmas Smoko was not attended as largely as usual, but this did not mar the enjoyment of the night. Through the kindness of Mr. R. Porter, a very fine programme of artists was arranged and was fully appreciated.

Cigarettes.—It is pleasing to see that the sale of cigarettes and tobacco has increased slightly, but this is still absurdly low for our large membership.

Stewards.—Some of the stewards appointed this year were not as satisfactory as usual, and better attendance and greater interest is expected in the coming year.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

Dances.—Sub-Committee: Messrs. J. Dinning, H. Haigh and A. McClintock. Only two dances were held during the period under review. The annual event attracted a gathering of more than 250, and was a most enjoyable night, but the New Year's Eve function received little support, due, no doubt, to so many people being away for the long holiday week-end.

Dinner.—In recognition of its performance in winning the Whiddon Cup, a dinner in honour of the 2nd. XV was held in September last, and was attended by 79 members.

Annual Meeting.—The substitution of a Smoko for the usual Social at the termination of the business at our Annual Meetings was so successful last year that the change will be continued.

FINANCES.

The finances of the Club have conntinued on a sound basis, and we are pleased to report that this year's surplus of $\pounds 34/7/8$ has exceeded that of the previous twelve months by $\pounds 19/2/3$.

Sales of tobacco, cigarettes, etc., have increased by $\pounds 24/1/3$, compared with last year's figures and, whilst this improvement is gratifying, it is thought that with a little more effort on the part of members, even better results might be expected next year.

The higher cost of cricket has been more than offset by the grant of $\pounds 20$ from the N.S.W. Cricket Association, but it might be mentioned here that this grant cannot be expected every year.

Dances and entertainments which, in past years, have been of considerable assistance to the Club's finances, have barely shown a profit, but the increase in proceededs from Club Room Amusements has provided some compensation for this loss of revenue.

Fixed Assets have been depreciated by $\pounds 23/2/3$, and the surplus of Assets over Liabilities now totals $\pounds 349/7/4$.

The wicket provided was generally an excellent one, and Mr. F. Rowlings, the groundsman, is to be thanked for his careful preparation.

Opportunity for practice on Concord Oval was available through the courtesy of Mr. Reg. Herford and the Western Suburbs Club, and this action is appreciated.

Mr. A. J. Robinson once more filled the position as official scorer for the 1st. XI, for which service we are truly grateful.

During the season a match was played against the Hawkesbury Agricultural College at Pratten Park, when your Club was able to act the part of host and repay some of the kindnesses received by your representatives from time to time at the College. The match resulted in a win for Hawkesbury on the 1st. innings.

FOOTBALL.

At the time our last report was written, the 1936 season was nearing the close with the 2nd. XV in a favourable position for winning the premiership in the 3rd Grade (Whiddon Cup), and we are pleased indeed to write of the team's ultimate success.

This year, the sub-committee was faced with the difficult task of fielding teams in the Kentwell Cup and Burke Cup competitions with some of last year's members not playing and new ones not offering too freely and, with one or two exceptions, not up to the usual playing standard.

Our 1st. XV. has a light but sound pack of forwards and a set of backs that showed promise early. Reg Lamb, a breakaway forward, has filled the gap at half-back quite creditably, while Neil Sharpe, at outside centre, has shown great improvement on last year's play, and Pick Binsted has been the usual dour defender, at five-eight, on last year's play. It is hard to select any of the forwards for special mention, though it has been pleasing to see two of last season's Seconds in N. Dunbar and R. Watson playing so well in the higher grade.

The 2nd. XV. never once showed its capabilities in the first round of matches. Latterly, however, the team has been putting more vim into its wo.k and, although combined play is rare, there is now a determination in evidence that was entirely lacking earlier.

L. Davis and D. Fraser in the backs, with H. Searl and G. Christmas in the forwards, have been the teams most consistent players.

Attendances at training have been fair only, and enthusiasm lacking. With so many young fellows playing, the reason is hard to fathom, but it does appear that the teams' committees are largely at fault and, with it, the present system of their selection. While it may seem logical for members of a team to elect its officers, our experience has proved this method a weakness, due mainly to the lack of thought given to the selection by members.

A recommendation is to be made for remedying this disability.

Much work will require to be done before next season comes along, if we are to field a team worthy of our name. New members are of first importance, but they must be keen and have a knowledge of the game. Now is the time to start team building.
