# TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE AND HON. TREASURER'S

### STATEMENT.

To the Members of The Briars Sporting Club, Gentlemen,

The Twenty-third Annual Report of your Club's activities for the year ended 30th June, 1941, is presented herewith.

It has been a most difficult year for sporting bodies. Not only has it been hard to get players, but it is has been harder still to raise the necessary enthusiasm to conduct sporting activities. We can feel well pleased, therefore, with the Club's efforts.

Two teams were fielded at both Cricket and Football, with but little falling off in the standard of previous years.

Membership has been maintained—in fact, it has been improved a little, due mainly to much hard work on the part of the Membership Committee.

The net increase has been 11 and takes the total membership to 192, made up as follows:—

Our domestic sporting activities have been reduced considerably, and, with difficulty being experienced in filling vacancies on the General Committee, little improvement can be anticipated here.

In common with many other Clubs a large number of our members have joined the fighting forces and gone overseas and as time progresses no doubt these numbers will increase.

We cannot afford to relax our efforts and must continually seek the introduction of new members.

Attendance at the Ciub Rooms though fair is not all that could be desired. The Committee earnestly asks all Members and especially the younger Members to make some effort to take an active part in the Club's affairs and to assist as much as possible to keep these functioning normally during the present times. The Committee feels that there must be quite a number who could give up a little time to this end but who perhaps have not realised that assistance is required. They therefore make an appeal to members to consider this matter most seriously and if required to take any active office to make some effort to help.

Arrangements to take the Club Rooms on a yearly tenancy instead of on lease for longer terms were completed with the Owners of the building and should prove equally satisfactory. The provision of new windows and front door, together with improvements to the front of the premises have enhanced the appearance of the place; and minor repairs and renovations inside, at present being carried out, will be an added improvement.

The transfer of our cricket to Concord Oval by the Council was generally appreciated by the players and we trust the same venue will be used this year.

# CRICKET.

#### "A" TEAM.

Two teams were entered in competitions—one each in the "A" and "B" Grade Municipal and Shire Competitions. Although results were not quite as good as in earlier years they were quite satisfactory.

Our Senior Team with a points percentage of 47.69 filled a lower position on the Competition table than in the two previous seasons. This was due mainly to a poor start, as the first three matches were all lost. The record improved as the season progressed, and of the remaining ten games, seven resulted in successes; including a sequence of four consecutive wins in the last four games of the season. It was some measure of satisfaction that the two teams which defeated us in the first two rounds were heaten by us in the concluding two rounds of the competition.

Due to force of circumstances the team was led by three different captains throughout the season. I. Cozens who captained the team during the latter half was responsible in a large measure for the greater success enjoyed during that period.

The batting as a team was not consistent, and partnerships of over 100 runs were achieved on only two occasions. Totals of over 200 were scored only four times, with 322 against Randwick, the highest.

The individual batting performances of D. Prowse and A. Land are worthy of special mention. These two players were each dismissed for less than double figures on only two occasions, and they compiled the only centuries recorded for the year; the former 100 (not out) against Juniors, and the latter 101 against Western Suburbs.

Prowse had the best average with 43.6 and an aggregate of 698 runs which is a record for the Club. It is remarkable that during the season he assisted in the best partnerships recorded for each of the first six wickets.

Land showed a welcome return to form and was a model of consistency with an aggregate of 441 runs, representing an average of 29.4. He has now scored 1,944 for the team and is likely to be the first player for the Club to reach the 2,000 mark.

The brunt of the bowling was borne by J. Walker and I. Cozens who both had excellent figures.

Walker bowled as well as ever and his 52 wickets at an average of 11.1 represented a wicket in every third over. He did not fail to secure a wicket in any one match. His 5 wickets for 3 runs versus Juniors was an outstanding performance. It is to be regretted that he was unavailable for the opening rounds of the competition. Cozens bowled consistently well as his 48 wickets at 13.7 will indicate. He had some remarkable performances, the most notable being that against Cumberland when he captured 8 wickets for 12 runs.

The fielding of the team was sound without being brilliant. L. A. Davis, D. Prowse and I. Cozens were safe in the air while the ground fielding of A. Land H. Scott, and J. Hollands left little to be desired.

We thank Mr. E. J. Siddeley for his interest and encouragement in scoring for the team throughout the season.

#### "B" TEAM.

After getting away to rather a bad start with three outright losses, the Seconds settled down and are to be congratulated for finishing so high in the competition table.

Some remarkable performances were recorded — particularly the three outright wins against Balmain, Bexley and Ryde. In each of these matches the Briars were well behind on the 1st innings, but with a really good standard of cricket, managed to turn the tide and come out on top.

Excitement was provided by Roy Glasgow and Mal. Gillies who turned losses into wins with the last balls of the last over of the day to finish two of these matches.

Wins against Ryde and Epping in the 2nd round were very satisfactory as these teams beat us outright, in the first two games of the season.

The batting of the team as a whole was not very impressive and it was rarely that it came up to expectations. This is born out by the fact that only one batsman bettered an average of 20 runs, this being N. Mitchell with 26.9 for 430 runs.

Nevertheless some quite good individual scores were made, the best of these being N. Mitchell 126 and 74, L. Meulman 76 not out and G. Arthur 58 and 57.

The 1st wicket partnership record of 112 runs established by J. Hollands and A. Land v. Lindfield (1939-39 season) was equalled this year by D. Way (73) and W. Wyllie (43) v. Roseville.

We were somewhat unfortunate in having too many bowlers of the same type for our attack. However, they all performed very well, G. Arthur being outstanding with an average of 11 runs per wicket. P. Murray and T. Hudson were always dangerous and with any sort of luck would have finished with better averages. Best performance goes to J. Carson who took 3, wickets for 4 runs at a very crucial period of the Bexley match. This effort paved the way for our outright win.

The fielding of the team throughout the season was below standard and it was only when we scented victory that the fielding became keen and anything like it should have been. The one exception to this was R. Farnsworth's performance v. Bexley — for his ground work was excellent, in addition to which he took three "test match" catches.

Although the start of the season was somewhat disappointing to all, it can be said with confidence that every member of the team finished the season feeling that he had played his part and that the team as a whole had given quite a satisfactory performance.

# FOOTBALL.

Sub-Committee: R. Wallis (Chairman, J. Carson, R. Stephens, D. Vanderfield and D. Walker. R. Farnsworth, G. Wright and M. Gillies resigned.

Owing to many of last years players joining the forces, we were faced with the possibility of fielding only one team, but after successful efforts by the Membership Committee and others, we were able to increase our playing strength and enter teams in the Kentwell and Bourke Cup Competitions and in doing so were the only Club to provide two teams in the Sub-District Rugby Union Competitions.

The team commenced the season depleted owing to the absence of many players, the greatest loss being that of Mal Gillies, last year's captain, but as a result of efforts made to acquire new players we were able to field a team which has performed creditably.

The backs have been disappointing, lacking combination and penetrative ability, but have shown improvement as the season progressed. Ken Bussell and Bill Edgington playing out of position owing to the scarcity of centre three-quarters, have acquitted themselves well and of late; have received improved service from Bill Theyer, who has overcome weakness in this department experienced earlier in the season. Don Vanderfield's displays at full back are worthy of praise particularly his sound defence. Jack Carson playing half back for the first time with the club has been promihent in every game, sound in defence, and has given his backs every opportunity in attack. As Captain he was supported by Laurie Knight, leading the forwards in an impressive manner.

The forwards have been the mainstay of the team; the game against the R.A.A.F. in the second round of the competition was a typical example, when a heavy ground was experienced and the team won comfortably. Striking real form, Don Walker has been a tower of strength in line outs and rucks, supported by Neil Barrell and Brian Hopkins, whilst the hooker and baby of the team, Jock Gibson has received more than a fair share of the ball; Col. Noble at breakaway has been always prominent and often succeeded in drawing the attention of the referee.

We feel that if more attention could have been given to training our record might have been improved.

The team was again coached by Geoff. Whiddon and it is due to his efforts and keenness that the team has shown considerable improvement and his advice at half time was always of great assistance. Many thanks Geoff.

#### 2nd XV.

This team was coached by Bill Wyllie prior to his enlistment and who, in spite of many difficulties, made the most of the material offering and although the team has not met with a great deal of success, the spirit of the individual players is very encouraging, as the team consists mainly of young players with many years of football ahead of them and continuing in the same vein, it is a good omen for the future of the Club.

The forwards have demonstrated they are capable of giving a good display but lack that little extra which holds an initial advantage and often makes the difference between winning and losing a game, whilst the backs have been generally disappointing, showing little combination and apparent weakness in defence.

# WAR COMFORTS FUND.

Funds have been raised by organising picture parties, card evenings and Cocktail parties. Two cocktail parties were held at the Club and were highly successful, over sixty being present on each occasion.

A large amount of knitted goods has been made by the girls and a well-filled hamper for each member overseas has been packed and sent on three occasions.

# FINANCES.

The year's activities show a deficit of  $\pm 21$  compared with a surplus of  $\pm 24/0/2$  for the previous 12 months.

Profit from dances, namely £59/6/8 has this year been given to the War Comforts fund which contributes towards the loss.

An amount of  $f_{23}/17/0$  was added to Furniture and Fitting A/c. during the year and the sum of  $f_{23}/17/0$  was written off as depreciation. The bank balance was reduced by  $f_{46}/15/3$  and now stands at  $f_{153}/16/4$ .

Outstanding subscriptions less reserve for doubtful debts stands at  $\pm 33/1/9$  compared with  $\pm 49/15/9$  last year.

Club Room Profit is slightly lower. The surplus of assets over liabilities now stands at £387/6/5.

We are exceedingly grateful to Mr. David Rossell who has again carried out most efficiently the audit of our books which is no small task. We understand he may be unable to carry out these duties next year owing to military duties, but we can assure him of our great satisfaction with the work he has done and trust that he may again be available in the near future.
