lost only two of the first twelve games played. However during the latter part of the season they fell away somewhat and were defeated in five of the remaining eight games.

The batting was only average, as, although wickets were improved, the side reached a total of 200 runs in only four innings. The evergreen A. Land topped the batting averages with 31.2 and his aggregate of 531 brought his total runs with the Club to over 3,000. Included in his innings was a fine century (110) against Lane Cove.

W. Elder again batted well and had the best aggregate (552). He reached the century on two occasions—100 not out against St. George and 103 against Bexley "B"—and played a number of other fine innings.

Of the other batsmen, W. Wolfe, a new member, L. Hokin and J. Hollands were best.

Bowling was the team's strongest feature. A. Rose set new aggregate figures by taking 65 wickets—eight more than the record established by P. Murray. Rose also had the best average (8.7). Murray was again in fine form and secured 58 wickets. E. Annetts (21 wickets at 9.7), E. Watt (36 at 12.1), and J. Walsh were also very successful with the ball. The strength of this department may be gleaned from the fact that the highest innings total recorded against the team was 9 for 166 by the competition winners.

The fielding was very fair, with E. Wait excelling. He took 15 catches during the season.

We are again grateful to Messrs. Siddleey and Robinson for their interest and encouragement, and their readiness to score for one or other of the teams throughout the season.

"B" TEAM.

This team was again handicapped to some extent by continued changes in the personnel which prevented the side from being moulded into a match winning combination. However, the side had the satisfaction of beating all the teams which occupied higher places on the competition table at least once—with the sole exception of the competition winners.

The batting was below average and a score of 200 was reached only once during the season. N. Neale, L. Davis and J. Rudd, until his enlistment, were the batting mainstays. Neale topped the averages with 35.4, and it is unfortunate that he was not available on more occasions.

L. Davis was slow to find his form, but in the latter part of the season batted brilliantly. He scored two excellent centuries and aggregated 571 runs—a new record for the team.

D. Prowse played one game whilst on leave from the R.A.A.F., and showed that he has lost none of his skill by compiling a dashing III in 35 minutes against Ryde.

With the ball, N. Neale was also to the fore. He took 45 wickets off only 104 overs, at an average of 10.2 runs per wicket. He was supported by R. Glasgow and W. Stephens, C. Coogan and K. Kropp, who, however, were not available regularly.

The brightest feature of the out cricket was the excellent form shown by W. Wyllie behind the stumps.

F. Richards, A. Leadbeater, C. Coogan, E. Fisher, E. Hampson, K. Kropp and A. Parker were new players of promise.

CHRISTMAS PARTY.

Last Christmas the Club celebration took the form of a mixed Social Evening at the Club Rooms to augment the funds of the War Comforts Fund. The function was fairly well attended and resulted in a sum of £19/5/1 being handed over to the Committee of the Fund.

MONTHLY FUNCTIONS.

During the year monthly mixed nights were inaugurated. They have been well attended but mainly by the same group of people each time. It is pointed out that they are held on the last Saturday night of each month and are open to all members and their friends.. These evenings have provided an opportunity of meeting a number of our members who are in the Services. They have also resulted in some increase of revenue to the Club.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting was again held in the Club Rooms. The usual after-meeting entertainment was again dispensed with in favour of an informal smoko.

CLUB ROOMS.

Chief Steward: W. Elder.

The support received by the Club Rooms has again been given by a small section of the members only. As mentioned earlier in this Report, it is felt that more members still in civilian life could make reasonably frequent use of the Club Rooms and amenities.

Cigarettes: Although supplies have been limited sales have again increased due no doubt to the difficulty of members in securing their smokes elsewhere. This has resulted in an increased profit of $\frac{1}{2}$ /2 over and above last year's figure on Club Room trading.

BILLIARDS.

Sub-Committee Chairman: A. Land.

Due to continued engagement of members in outside activities occasioned by the necessities of war, it has not been possible to conduct any tournaments this year.

Considering the comparatively small number of members who now make use of the tables the success of this pastime has been pleasing. Receipts have increased slightly due in some measure to the monthly mixed nights mentioned elsewhere.

LIBRARY.

Librarian: W. Stephens.

Due to the scarcity and high cost of new books, none have been purchased during the year under review.

A check conducted by the Librarian has revealed that a considerable number of the Club's books are unaccounted for. Members are urged to inspect their bookshelves at home and return any Club books they may have.

FINANCES.

The activities of the year resulted in a deficit of £34/2/4 as compared with £38/2/5 the previous year.

Contributary items to this loss were the absence of any dances, one of our chief revenue-producing items of the past, and increased expenditure on cricket material, this latter being considered necessary in anticipation of a shortage of supplies of this equipment. This expense should be proportion

ately lower in the coming year.

The sum of £20/10/- was written off Furniture and Fittings A/c. The bank balance was reduced by £34/7/2 and now stands at £105/14/3. Outstanding subscriptions less reserve for doubtful debts stands at £39/17/6. This does not compare favourably with the previous year's figure which was £33/6/-. Your Committee regrets that this sum has risen instead of being reduced and members in arrears are asked to assist by payment of their subscriptions.

We are very grateful to Mr. Norman Wales who has again conducted the

audit of the Club's books. This is a task of no small magnitude.

FOR KING AND COUNTRY.

During the past year four of your fellow-members—Kent Bussell, John D. May, Fabian McMaster, and J. Gordon Lee—have paid the supreme sacrifice in the service of their country, and three—Neville Austin, Noel Marshall and Wally Sams—have been posted missing, presumed killed. The loss of these seven men has occasioned heartfelt sorrow throughout the Club. All were held in the highest regard by their fellow-members and all contributed much to the position the Club occupies in the community to-day and to its spor ing and ocial prominence. To their relatives we extend our very deepest sympathy.

COMMITTEE.

We have been fortunate in keeping the General Committee intact throughout the year. Meetings have been well attended despite additional outside calls made on the time of a number of your Committeemen in furtherance of the war effort.

Once again we were fortunate to have the services of Peter Meulman as Hon. Treasurer, and the great amount of work that he has done is deserving of the highest gratitude.

W. Hill assisted both the Secretary and Treasurer and in many other

ways his efforts on behalf of the Club have been invaluable.

Bill Elder as Chief Steward has fulfilled his duties, made more onerous by prevailing conditions, in an outstanding manner.
