TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE AND HON. TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

To the Members of The Briars Sporting Club. Gentlemen,--

The Twenty-sixth Annual Report of your Club's activities, for the year ended 30th June, 1944, is presented herewith.

Again we are forced to review a year beset with the many difficulties consequent upon war-time conditions. However, despite such difficulties, the year has been outstanding for the encouraging activity displayed in nearly every phase of the Club's life. It may be no exaggeration to state now that an doubt that may have existed concerning the Club's ability to carry on during these difficult times has been dispelled during the past year.

A most pleasing feature during the year was the attendance at the Club rooms of a considerable number of Members who are in the Services, when on leave. Many had not been in a position to visit the Club for long periods, and most expressed agreeable surprise at finding the Club rooms a hive of activity, particularly on Friday nights.

Members will applaud the return during the present season of football as one of the Club's major sporting interests. A team has been fielded in the Metropolitan District Junior Rugby Union, and although the results of matches played so far are not favourable on paper, it will be realised that the effects of the revival of football in the Club will be more far-reaching than any scores for or against would indicate.

Two teams again represented your Club in the Municipal and Shires Cricket Competition, and both worthily upheld the Club's reputation in this sphere.

Total Membership increased during the year, and now stands at 209. Honorary Members, being those on Active Service, increased by two to 136 for the year, so that there was an increase under the classes Active, Associate and Country of 13, taking the total for these classes to 73, as at 30th June, 1944.

CRICKET.

Sub-Committee Chairman: J. G. Hollands.

As in the previous season, the 1943-44 Municipal and Shires Competition was confined to one grade and one division, in which the Club entered two teams.

We again appreciate the interest displayed in both teams by Vice-Presidents Messrs. E. J. Siddeley and E. F. Watt. Their cheerful encouragement and kindly criticism at all times helped to make the players' enjoyment of the game more complete. It was a matter for regret that Mr. A. J. Robinson was unable to attend the matches owing to illness, but we know that he was with us in spirit at all times. Our good wishes are extended to him.

The Bexley Club's "A" team won the Competition for the second successive year, and we congratulate them on their achievement. Our "A" team occupied third place, and the "B" team finished seventh on the Competition table.

Our thanks are due to the Western Suburbs District Cricket Club for directing several players to our ranks.

"A" TEAM.

After a disappointing start in the season this team made a good recovery to eventually fill third place in the competition. Weak batting resulted in five of the first twelve matches being lost, while two were drawn games. Arrangements for practice one night a week were later reflected in the batting

and in the second half of the season the team won the first eleven of the twelve matches played during that period.

A. Land was once again the most consistent batsman. His average (25.6) was the team's best, and he failed on only one occasion to reach a double figure score. A. Leadbeater, striking form somewhat late in the season, put together a sequence of sound batting displays. L. Davis and W. Elder were the best of the other batsmen, while W. Wolfe showed glimpses of his best. Next season should see J. Robertson fulfilling the promise he showed last season.

Bowling was undoubtedly the team's strong feature. A. Rose, E. Watt and T. Mobbs were all outstanding in this department. Rose concluded another excellent season by eclipsing his own aggregate record. He secured 95 wickets for the season, and his feat in securing the last three wickets of the Bexley "A" Team with three successive balls, when that team was but three runs short of our team's total, was the highlight of the season. As indicated by his figures (57 wickets at 9.42), E. Watt again commanded respect at all times with his medium paced bowling.

The bowling find of the year was T. Mobbs, who secured the best average and took 58 wickets despite the fact that he commenced to play only after several rounds had elapsed.

J. Roberts also showed promise with the ball.

Evidence of the quality of the team's bowling, backed up by good fielding, can be gained from the fact that our opponents exceeded a total of 100 runs only nine times in twenty-four innings.

In the field W. Elder was outstanding and by taking 23 catches established a new record. T. Mobbs, L. Davis, W. Wolfe, E. Watt and E. Annetts were also to the fore in the field.

"B" TEAM.

Despite lack of success in the first round the team built into a reasonably strong combination During the first round of twelve matches only three wins were recorded, but during the second round six of the twelve games were won.

To a large extent the team proved a recruiting ground for the "A" team during the first few games, but after settling down under the able leadership of Peter Meulman an excellent team spirit developed, and a most enjoyable season resulted.

The team's most notable win was that against the strong Western Suburbs side, which was defeated in the last over of the day by six runs.

The cricket generally was not of a high standard but several younger players show distinct promise for future seasons. Most notable of these are B. Curtin and H. Lennartz, while R. Fulwood and R. Ackerman are useful all-rounders. J. Mason bowled with exceptional accuracy.

The fielding was only fair, but there are excellent foundations on which to build next season, which is anticipated with confidence of improvement.

FOOTBALL

SUB-COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN: M. A. HILL.

It is most pleasing to report that after a lapse of two years the Club is again represented this year by a Rugby Union team.

Your Committee undertook to revive Club interest in football by entering a side in the M'etropolitan District Junior Rugby Union 2nd grade competition.

This meant an entirely new start, as most of the Club's players of former years are either in the Services or past the retiring age. However, an enthusiastic and energetic Sub-Committee attacked the problem with a will. New members were secured to form the nucleus of a team, and again the Briars football team took the field.

The team has a light but virile pack of forwards and a promising back line. It is difficult to select any players for individual mention as every man is keen and the team spirit is excellent.

Early the team was not able to show its true capabilities, injuries contributing particularly to this fact, but at present the side is showing more combination and is improving.

Attendance has been only fair, but this is excusable in most instances at the present time.

The process of team building is proceeding and will be continued during the summer months with a view to fielding a team or teams next year capable of further adding to the foundations laid this year.

The Gordon Bevan Shield, previously awarded annually, will again be a coveted and eagerly contested honour to be won by Club footballers.

Members who have appeared with District Clubs this season are: E. Watt, J. Robertson, M. Gillies, F. Richards, D. Vanderfield, and R. McLaughlin with Wests; G. Vanderfield, University; and G. Musgrave, Gordon. Peter Glanville has represented the R.A.A.F. in matches in England.

Cigarettes: A decrease in the sales of cigarettes and tobacco has been occasioned by a reduction in the supplies made available to the Club.

BILLIARDS. SUB-COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN: A. LAND.

This branch of the Club's indoor activities retains its popularity. The tables have recently been reconditioned and as they will receive regular quarterly attention in the future, it is expected that members will avail themselves still further of the enjoyment which is provided by this game.

A successful 100-up Handicap Tournament was held during the year and after some very close games Ted Watt defeated Don Walker in a hard fought final.

Your committee is looking forward to the time when the Club Rooms will again be open each night and members will be able to take far greater advantage of an excellent table.

TENNIS

It is pleasing to note that tennis has again been revived by Club members. Social mixed tennis has been played for the past several months each Saturday afternoon, and as the standard of play has generally been good, it is hoped that at least one team will be entered in the Western Suburbs Hardcourt Competition at the close of next cricket season.

A revival in this excellent sport is to be desired as it provides an avenue whereby cricketers who do not participate in the Club's football activities may be enabled to carry on those excellent associations which are so much enjoyed during the summer months.

LIBRARY

O. Osterman was appointed Librarian early in the year. Following his subsequent enlistment in the R.A.A.F., the position has not been filled.

Due to scarcity and high cost of suitable books, no new volumes have been added during the year.

FINANCES

The activities of the year resulted in a profit of 12/11 as against a deficit last year of $\frac{12}{12}$.

Increased collections of fees has been the main contributory item to this improvement, while reductions in the losses occasioned by cricket and the Annual Meeting in the previous year have been helped.

The rate of depreciation on Furniture and Fittings has been reduced from ten to five per cent. The amount was $\frac{12}{10}$.

Outstanding subscriptions less reserve for doubtful debts stands at $\sharp_{31/19/11}$, an improvement of nearly \pounds on last year's figure. However, this item can be reduced still further and members in arrears are asked to assist their Club by prompt payment of their fees.

Again we are indebted to Mr. Norman Wales who has conducted the audit of the Club's books. In this he has been of most valuable assistance to the Club at a period when his time must be very limited.

COMMITTEE

During the year there has been only one change in the Committee. Olaf Osterman, during the few months prior to his entry into the R.A.A.F., proved his worth in many ways and established himself as a very valuable Committee man.

Don Walker, who was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Committee, has been a particularly hard worker in the Club's interests.

Meetings have been well attended and the duties of the various Sub-Com mittees have been carried out in a most satisfactory manner.

Once again we were fortunate in having Peter Meulman as Hon. Treasurer, and he has carried the burdens of his office with distinction. W. Hill and J. Kerr have been invaluable in their assistance to the Hon.
