#### Gentlemen,

It is with great pleasure that the Board and Management of your Club present to you the 45th Report and Balance Sheet for the 1962/3 year.

The year generally has been a mixture of success and disappointment in the field of sport, of solid effort on the part of younger administrators and our team of Stewards and an unfortunate repetition of odd unpleasant incidents similar to those of last year.

Cricket's great disappointments were the performance of the 'A' Shires and a lack of real interest by a large number of the members engaged in this section of our sporting activities. The 'B' Shires contested and won the semi-finals. The fina's were completely washed out and Lane Cove, as Minor Premiers were declared the winners.

This has been one of our really bad years and we must endeavour to lift this sport "out of the doldrums".

On the other hand we concluded one of our most successful and enjeyable Football years. Four teams in the finals, a surplus of players keen to train and to win. Unfortunately no team presented us with a Pennant.

Hockey again provided our only Premiership with a win by the 'B' team. It appears, though, that this sport also would benefit with an infusion of younger players.

Golf and Squash were again enjoyed. Snooker, Billiards and Table Tennis did not hold the interest of the members as they have done in previous years.

This year provided the first game of Bowls amongst members, played at Leura in conjunction with a Golf day. The Club was again represented in the Harris Bowls Trophy, a trophy competed for by all Clubs, of any nature, in the Burwood Municipality.

Social activities were not as numerous as usual and this must be amended and our usual pleasant evenings reinstated.

Future Club planning has been continually investigated during the year and moves are afoot with more land to increase our playing ground facilities which might ultimately lead to changes in our location. These plans are very much in their infancy but indicate that this Committee is extremely active. Last year saw the opening of the Briars Ski Lodge at Thredbo. This is a private venture among members of the Briars and carries the Club's blessing. It is a very fine structure in a lovely situation.

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We tender our thanks and appreciation to the Burwood and Concord Councils for their continued help and cooperation and to the various bodies who assist in providing us with organised sports, and to the numerous Clubs against whom we competed in our sporting activities.

Financially the Club's position is very little changed from last year. The tendency is for steady trading with yearly small advances in our profit position.

#### CRICKET 1962-63

SUB-COMMITTEE: P. Mansford (Chairman), J. Balmforth, D. Williams, T. Mobbs, J. Wilson and A. Davis.

The 1962-63 Season will remain in memory as one of the most disappointing in the Club's history. The biggest single contributing factor towards this without doubt was the number of Saturdays on which torrential rain fell, which either eliminated play altogether or drastically cut the playing time.

The above circumstances particularly affected the Shire and City & Suburban Teams, the last three Saturdays of the Shires Competition being washed out, and the City & Suburban having their six matches abandoned.

A summary of the performances of the individual teams is unfortunately a disappointing one, on the surface. The A Shire Team again created a Club record, this year by not winning a match during the Competition. However, four matches were lost by between twenty and thirty runs and five other matches appeared almost certain wins, until the elements took a hand, and play was washed out.

The most heartening performance by a Club Team was that by the B Shires, who reached the final for the second successive year. Again the rain intervened and the final was abandened and Lane Cove declared Premiers, without a ball being bowled.

The B Junior Team met with mixed success during the Stason, several impressive victories being intermingled with some disappointing losses. However, as in previous years, the remarkable Club and Team spirit in this team was again evident and it is a pity that some of the other teams do not have the same spirit.

The C Junior Team finished in sixth position, as did the B Juniors, and were unlucky not to qualify for the finals as veluable points were lost through the playing of an ineligible player. Several of the lads in this Team are at last showing the form of which they are capable and it is expected that in the near future they will be making their presence felt in the higher grades.

The City & Suburban again performed creditably, winning more games than were lost, and late in the seauon defeated the B Shire Team comfortably.

Our heartiest congratulations are extended to Auburn-Lidcombe Club on taking off the double, the A Shire Premiership and Club Championship, and also Lane Cove on winning the B Shire Premiership, Vesuvians on winning the W.S.C.A. B Grade and Crossways on winning the C Grade.

We are again thankful of the co-operation received through the various Associations with which we are affiliated and it is wished to particularly thank Alan Barnes of the N.S.W.C.A., Jack Creak and the W.S.C.A., and Bill Ray of the City and Suburban Association.

It is also wished to record our sincere thanks to the groundsmen at Rothwell Park who endeavoured at all times to have the ground in fit state for play even though on occasions they had extreme odds to overcome.

The Ryde Public School again granted us the use of their practice wickets for our pre-season practice and we are indebted to Fred Randle, through whose efforts the acquiring of the wickets was possible.

On the administration side the sub-committee experienced several set-backs during the Season, generally in relation to members making themselves available for games. On several occasions teams were fielded short of the required number due to members not having advised of their unavailability. Another prevalent occurrence during the Season was members refusing to accept promotion to a higher grade when considered worthy of promotion. In these instances strong measures were taken and it is to be hoped that these occurrences are not repeated in the future.

Social matches were played during the Season against Penrith and St. Joseph's College, which were enjoyed by those who participated. A trip to Orange at the completion of the Season was arranged but unfortunately this fell through when the response to the trip was too meagre to make the tour possible.

# FIRST ELEVEN ("A" SHIRE)

Despite a similar team to the previous season in which we were runners-up, the team registered the worst record probably in the history of the Club. The team failed to register a win although on a number of occasions rain and lack of time robbed it of certain scores. Although the finals were washed out, Auburn Lidcombe receive our heartiest congratulations for their success as they had shown clearly their supremacy during the year.

The one bright spot from the season was the manner in which the team was shaping towards the end of the season and this gives every hope that the coming season will give this team the opportunity to register the successes which eluded it on numerous occasions during this season.

A comparison of the overall averages gives a clear indication of the main cause for the failure: the opposition was dismissed at an average of 5.2 runs per man more than the previous season, that is, an average of 57.2 runs per innings. Such an extra burden is difficult for any batting side to overcome. The main causes for this increase were:-

- (a) lack of a regular, reliable opening bowler who could assure an early break-through and the support of the necessary variation in attack - Peter Burt added this at the end of the season;
  - (b) numerous fielding lapses and dropped catches at vital stages lost many matches. In this regard, age is showing in some quarters.

With the emphasis on giving the keen, young cricketer a full opportunity in the coming season, the team can re-establish its former position.

G. IRELAND (Captain): Had his best season with the bat for many years.

D. WALKER (Vice-Captain): Also had a good season with the bat and showed his reliability behind the stumps.

T. MOBBS: Despite one good innings did not reach the heights of previous years in batting.

C. JONES: Tried hard but the breaks did not go his way. Had several good spells with the ball.

E. WATT: The best success of the season in that he at last realized his potential with the bat and the results indicate the reward for applied concentration. Ted also has realized that his use as a bowler lies in his ability as a stock bowler rather than with the new ball.

K. HOLLEY: Although he did not have the successes of previous seasons with the bat, showed considerable promise with the ball and is a very reliable allrounder to have in the team.

J. WADE: The hallmark of concentration which produced good results but in some instances at the expense of undue time taken. A reliable team member.

V. PROWSE: Tried hard to achieve results but also lacked the necessary breaks. Success would probably come through concentration on flight rather than pace.

P. BURT: His bowling added the necessary variation which the team has lacked in attack for some time. Requires plenty of work and possibly more attention to length rather than spin. Showed promise with the bat and a good future in the Club seems assured.

P. RICHARDSON: Tried hard but was required to face the most hostile of attacks in his initial introduction to "A" Shires. Led well against Lane Cove and in other

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J. WILSON: Bowled well against Lane Cove and in other matches did not have the luck which his bowling could have produced. Tries hard.

H. LENNARTZ: A welcome return late in the season. His variety in bowling and batting adds sparkle to the team.

R. THOMAS: Did not seem to get going and was unable to produce the form which it is obvious this player can produce. With more opportunity is sure to do well.

P. CAFFIN: Only played the first six matches but managed to take the most wickets. Peter's appearance and attitude left a lot to be desired and he will have to ohange drastically if he is to go as far in the game as he believes he will.

However, cricketers are a determined breed and no doubt most members of the C Juniors will find openings in higher grades within the next few years.

ALLEN DAVIS, (Captain); Was captain for 1st half of the season. Had his best year ever with the bat, (whilst in C grade) scoring over 300 in his first 10 innings. An opener, but must watch running between wickets.

TED AIKMEN: (Captain); Capably captained the team for the last half of the season. Topped the batting averages and took several valuable wickets. Never let the pressure of the game beat him. The 'father' of the team, Ted aided the younger members considerably.

JOHN SCOTT: An excellent batsman and nimble fielder. One of the most reliable members of the team and if he concentrates on batting, he will rise to greater heights.

PAUL BRISCOE: Proved a greater asset with the bat than with the ball. Several late stands in desperate situations proved his worth. Took 7 catches, most of which were very difficult.

LAWSON SMOOTHER: A new member of the team, with a lot of potential as an opening bat. Found out early that as a bowler, he makes a good opening bat. Lawson is one of the most popular members of the side. Must speed up in fielding.

MURRAY MELVILLE: If he put his mind to it, Murray could top the batting averages. He has a delightful style and dogged perseverance. Proved a valuable wicket keeper and seemed to enjoy the season.

DENNIS TRAVERS: Topped the bowling averages (what no hattricks this year!) Realising Dennis' potential, the B Juniors had him promoted into their ranks very early in the season. An all-rounder, he had several good innings with the bat.

JOHN HAZELWOOD: The main opening attack bowler medium-fast. Concentrated this year on bowling at the stumps with the result that 33 members of opposing teams were very unhappy. To cap it off, he swings a bat something like John Rose, and scored 58 in about 20 minutes in one game.

ROY JAMES: A careful, steady opener, but not afraid to hit the loose ball. Had a troublesome season with his eyes but seldom dropped catches.

MIKE FARRY: Also a new comer to the side, with youth and keeness on his side. Had a mixed season. but did make several determined stands when the occasions arose.

GARY MacANDREW: Leading wicket taker for the season. took yet another hat trick just to prove the first (in 1961) was no fluke. Bowls a medium paced outswinger, with the result he had 23 catches taken - mostly behind the wicket.

GREG MacINTYRE: Had an interrupted season, which affected his batting. Greg's witty remarks provided many happy moments during the season and his fielding is on the improve.

JOHN HALLAM: Didn't play many games but managed to pick up some valuable wickets. Took 5 quick wickets in one innings against Newtown late in the season.

#### FINANCE

The Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended 30th September, 1963, together with the Balance Sheet as at that date and with the report of the Auditor thereon are appended to this report.

Excess of Income over Expenditure for the year amounted to  $\pounds1,444$  of which  $\pounds100$  was set aside to provide for future repairs and maintenance to the Club's building; the balance of  $\pounds1,344$  was added to Accumulated Funds.

During the year Debentures totalling £845 were repaid to members leaving the balance outstanding at this date at £1,890.

The following extracts have been taken from the report of the Club's Auditor:

"Bar sales and gross trading profit were almost identical with the results achieved in the previous year, and the net cost of conducting the major sports of cricket, football and hockey was £148, again almost identical with the previous year's result. Social activities produced a surplus of £107, an increase of £85 over the previous year. No extensive repairs to the Club's property were undertaken during the year. Application of the year's profit, and its effect on the assets and liabilities of

the Company is illustrated in the following Statement of Funds:-
