To the Members of the Briars Sporting Club Limited -

Gentlemen.

Your Board of Directors and Management Committee present for your consideration and adoption, this Annual Report of the Club's many activities, and of the financial position for the year ending 30th September, 1973.

Fifty-five years after our foundation day in November, 1918 when an enthusiastic group of schoolboys formed a small club at a home called "The Briars", this same club has moved into, and has members of a "Jeans, T.Shirt and Thongs" generation. Previously accepted values and traditions are rightly queried. To modish youth, our motto "Virtus animusque praesens", translated "Manly skill and ready courage", may appear trite, and of an archaic form, perhaps held to be symbolic of Briars as a bastion of male chauvinism.

That this Club is still active in the community, attracting youth, suggests our values are not materialistic, and that the basis of our existence, the playing of amateur team sports and of honorary service within the club, remains viable in today's society.

The success we value most is not so much winning matches, but is of our success in promoting a club tradition of teamwork, being that cultivation of a spirit of fellowship and organised co-operation in a mutual interest.

Any review of this year's sporting and administrative achievements must be bordered with the black of sadness as two of our most revered members, The Club Patron, Geoff Whiddon and the President, Doug Vanderfield, both died within a short period of each other. We grieve at their loss. Geoff Whiddon was a foundation member of the Club, and had been President in the years from 1943 to 1948. As a mark of recognition for his long services to the Club in both sporting and administrative activities, he had been made a Life Member, and had the honour to be President in the Club's fiftieth anniversary year.

Doug Vanderfield was in his first team as President, having not long returned from New Zealand as manager of the combined Football, Squash Tour. Doug had a long sporting career with the Club and was an ideal and active President. His charm, gentlemanly bearing, and sportsmanship were legendary and was the finest example of Briar tradition.

A most touching moment for the Squash Players was their final toast on that sad night of "One for the road" for Doug. Who amongst us will ever forget "Alouette"!

The opening of The Sydney Opera House reminds us also of how deeply involved in its early stages was one of our former Presidents, the late Ron Thomson. How "Uncle Ron" would have appreciated being at Bennelong Point that day!

The sporting year could be classed overall as successful, though with some anxious moments. A spirit of optimism prevails, at least in the sporting field, with promises of better things to come. We earnestly hope the slogan "Briars to the fore in seventy-four" will be true.

Hockey takes pride of place, by having the unsurpassed record of each of the three teams in grand finals, whilst the new under-age junior team was also in a grand final. The

junior team was a successful experiment this year, and apart from being an ideal aim in the sponsoring of under-age teams, gives us a reservoir of trained talent for the senior teams, a feature unknown to us in previous years. Future success seems assured for hockey, with hopes of more than the one Premiership won this year.

A highlight of the Squash and Football season was their combined tour of New Zealand, proving a resounding social success, though less successful in a sporting sense.

Squash increased its number of teams from six to seven, indicating an expansion of our newest major sport. Two pennants were won in the autumn competition whilst in the current Spring Competition, two teams are semi-finalists.

Squash is our only financially self-sufficient sport, and its players, contrary to some views, make a social contribution to club life after matches in the same manner as do the other sports, though the lateness of the hour may mean they are not seen as much by the majority of members.

Last year football was reported as a disappointment. This season after a successful New Zealand tour, all seemed set for a good result with a surfeit of players, of enthusiasm, and, perhaps, of fitness.

Kentwell and Burke Cup Teams were the best performed, the former only being displaced in a drawn and slushy semi-final because of a lower competition place, whilst Burke were gallant in defeat in the final. Judd and Whiddon were amongst the also-rans, but nevertheless performed creditably.

Coaches of football teams which do not win, are usually fair game for the critics, but general satisfaction was felt with their efforts. Some faults were found in Football administration though the rough patches were somehow rode over, and the basis for a much tidier effort next season has been laid by the Sub-Committee.

"The tightest run ship" in the Club is undoubtably cricket with the "ship's log" being as of last year, a B Grade premiership with the C Grade, a semi-finalist. The B Grade win was even more meritorious than last year, when all opposition was swamped. This season was a hard grind, and a fine second innings recovery was needed in the final, making the win even sweeter.

A problem in cricket was the City and Suburban side whose numbers dwindle and ability deterioriates. However, we are happy to report that in the current season, we have players of ability left over, to the extent of almost being able to field an extra side.

Readers will be saddened to know that the Club's leading leg-spinner and after-dinner speaker, may well find himself completely sidelined this season.

The finding of a second permanent playing area for Cricket and Hockey could be close at hand, for Concord Council is almost ready to complete the long awaited fields in the Canada Bay area. If the Club is successful in its application, we have reached the ideal solution of our urgent need of an additional sporting area.

In the Club's early days, the great majority of members played both cricket and football

and therefore played sport all the year round. Now with four major sports, we have a trend towards specialism, and the members who play more than one sport are uncommon. Whilst not presuming to make this a point of criticism of members, this trend creates a tendency for a division of the Club into four separate camps. One needs no sixth sense not to be aware of a disruption, for danger signals have already been detected.

A spirit of ecumenism in all four sports must prevail in the future and it is vital that many more functions must be held at the Club, and elsewhere, to bring together all members, old and new, regardless of their sport.

This is a major problem of the future to ensure that all are aware that they are not just players of a sport, but should be proud to belong to and support a fine and unique Briars Club. It is therefore, vital that the new Personnel and Social Sub-Committees give of an increased effort to ensure the Club remaining a happy conglomerate, rather than of four warring factions.

The Social events held were all excellent functions. The Annual Dinner at Concord Golf Club was a highlight, with our own Member, Bill McLaughlin, President of Australian Rugby Union, being Guest Speaker.

We congratulate Bill on his appointment to this post, and on his speech at the dinner.

The Annual Ball at the Boulevard Hotel proved less exciting than that of the previous year, with the Band not so stimulating, and the food less appetising, unless your taste ran to anchovette paste piped on Jatz crackers. Nevertheless, the Ball was a high spot, being well attended and as Board is pleased to note, one of the few to be profitable.

Of outside functions, two poorly attended golf days were held, whilst there were many private Bar-B-Q type parties serving mainly as fund raising ventures for the many sporting tours planned. However, with the greater frequency of these functions held outside the Club, less incentive is created to hold them within the Club. There is a consequent loss to the Club in revenue and a further fragmentation into individual sporting factions. It is in the Club's interest for the Social Committee to start a "Back to Briars" revolution.

The Personnel Sub-Committee is always on the alert to attract new members of the requisite character and sporting ability and is virtually a recruiting office. One of its other functions is to ensure that the new member is assimilated into the Club smoothly, and is not neglected. A further role, with the Social Committee, should be the rallying of nonactive and associate members in "old-timers" functions at the Club, and this not left to the sporadic re-visits of Bob Clark for their organisation.

This Sub-Committee has plans for a new system to ensure that all new members will be under review in the probationary two year period. Providing that the task is approached with more enthusiasm and efficiency than displayed in the past, then the scheme should be effective.

The Balance Sheet and Profit and Loss Account show that the Club is on a sound financial note, with increased rentals from the shops below, and satisfactory trading, improving profit.

The good performance of the House Committee is vital in the maintenance of our financial stability in days of high cost increases in sport. It was heartening to know beer supplies continued through strikes and that the new bar roster is effective. Increases in the sales of wines and liquors could be expected next year with a better presentation at the bar counter.

A dominant element of Club structure is administration and in a club of our size and scope, there is a vast amount of work. A great responsibility is also borne by the Chief Executive Officer, Ted Stockdale. Until one becomes President, few can realise just how much work Ted carries out with such efficiency and concern for the Club's well-being. It behoves all members to lighten this burden.

In the 42nd Annual Report for the year 1959—60, two paragraphs which still have a pertinent message for today's members, are repeated.

"There is still far too much thoughtlessness on the part of members, young and old. There are too many who treat their sporting commitments lightly. We venture to say they would keenly resent any charge of letting the team and Club down — yet this is exactly what they were doing.

Others are much too casual in their treatment of the Club Rooms. The breaking of billiard cues, the shattering of the table-tennis top, leaving their empty glasses wherever they happened to finish a drink, ashing cigarettes on billiard tables and on the floor, and doing all similar things, small in themselves, but in total, a constant annoyance to those like Ted, who have to make good these omissions."

After some thirteen years, perhaps the offenders still need reminding.

Any member who has been alternately broiled and frozen like a Corning-ware dish under the Club shower, will be pleased to know that two new showers have been installed, with a new hot-water service.

We are grateful to the members of Board, Management, various Sub-Committees, Stewards and the many others who have assisted in the running of the Club's activities.

It is unfortunate that some members having accepted office, fail, for various reasons, to give proper attention to their duties. A full effort and a pride in administrative production will be reflected in a better management committee, with a flow-on to the playing field with a greater pride, and interest in performance.

The Club magazine, "Focus" was established during the year and was a welcome feature in Club life, serving as a notice-board, and mouthpiece for varying opinions. Members no longer lack a means of expressing their views. This opportunity is only as far away as the "Focus" letterbox in the office.

A founder member, a life member and expatriate in London, Bob Clark, has accepted

appointment as Club Patron, succeeding a lifelong friend, the late Geoff Whiddon. This is a worthy and popular choice, and if, as is hoped, it brings Bob home more frequently we shall all need to be on our mettle.

We again give out thanks to the Burwood, Concord and Strathfield Councils for their assistance during the year. We also extend our thanks to the following bodies with which the Club has been associated during the past year:—

Sydney Rugby Union, Council of Municipal and Shire Clubs, Metropolitan Sub-District Rugby Union, City and Suburban Cricket Association, Rugby Union Referees Association, Sydney Hockey Association, Squash Racquets Association of N.S.W. and N.S.W. Cricket Association.

In conclusion, we extend greetings and best wishes for success to the many Clubs against whom we compete on the field of sport.

• • • OUT LATE PATRON AND PRESIDENT

As reported in the foreword of the Annual Report, our Club Patron, Geoff Whiddon and President Doug Vanderfield passed away in April and May respectively this year.

We reprint from "Focus" an article on Geoff Whiddon and the text of the eulogy made by our past President Harvey Ford at Doug's funeral service.

It is also with sorrow that we report the passing of two former senior members of the Club — Alan Hulls and Norm Wales.

H. G. Whiddon

Geoff Whiddon, our Club Patron, passed away late in April after a fairly long illness. Geoff was a foundation member of the Club and represented as a forward in the late twenties and thirties. He had the distinction of being in the 1929 Western Suburbs first grade team, which was the last time that that Club won the Rugby Premiership. After the war Geoff also had a stint as coach of the Briars football teams.

He was a counsellor for the Royal Agricultural Society and as a member of the Royal Motor Boat Club did a great deal of charity work, particularly by taking children out on his boat.

Geoff was a dedicated worker behind the scenes and was Club President from 1943 to 1948 and again in the Club's fiftieth year 1968-1969. He was also a Director of the Club from its inception until bad health forced his retirement. The fact that he was one of only three life members ever appointed is an indication of the high esteem the Club held for him.

We are deeply saddened by the loss of our Club Patron and Founder Member.

R. D. Vanderfield

Born in 1914, the eldest child of Richard Vanderfield, a Sydney Timber Merchant and his wife Ruby Vanderfield. Richard Douglas Vanderfield was affectionately known to us all as Doug. He was educated at Newington College and Sydney University.

When World War II loomed ahead Doug was, as in most things he undertook, one of the first. A fighter pilot, he served with distinction in Europe, the Middle East, Malaya and New Guinea. At the end of hostilities the proud wearer of the D.F.C., Doug was Commanding Officer of 79 Spitfire Squadron in the South West Pacific. Many of Doug's Air Force comrades are with us today and I, having attended reunions and having marched on Anzac Days with them, am fully aware of the affection and esteem which all ranks to the lowest, had for Doug.

Doug followed in his Father's footsteps in the Timber Industry, firstly as a member and director of Vanderfield & Reid, and more recently as chairman of Vanderfield Holdings in which he regrouped the Vanderfield interests. Here Doug, as in so many other ways, demonstrated his interest in the family. Probably partly due to the early death of his Mother this is a trait which was apparent from the time I first met Doug. He was interested and concerned in his sisters' affairs and in his brothers' educational progress, their sporting and social activities and later in their families. If any member of the Vanderfield family suffered a serious setback it was Doug who rallied the other members of the family in support.

Outside business Doug had many interests — mainly ones in which he helped others. In community service he was a member of, and a past Director of Sydney Rotary. He was also devoted to the work of the National Association for Training the Disabled in Office Work, an organisation known as N.A.D.O.W. and in fact he was the first President of the N.S.W. Branch of N.A.D.O.W.

In the sporting world Doug's career was outstanding and it was here that one came across a seeming conflict in his character. Charming, courteous, friendly, even tempered, like able, popular, are all adjectives which could be applied to Doug and although he had survived wartime and other experiences which could easily have hardened his nature he was always a softie who was ready to give up his time for the good of others. Doug did not have an enemy for the simple reason that he did not know how to make an enemy. This side of Doug's character remained until he entered into a competitive activity. Then his spirit of daring and adventure came to the surface. While Doug's inherent sense of fair play and sportsmanship remained, from here on his aim was to give of his best and to win. Many of you will recall his oft used expression "Face the metal". As an athlete he was a champion middle distance runner. As a boxer he was a welter weight champion at University. As a footballer Doug played first grade for Western Suburbs Rugby Club. He participated in motor racing, life saving, ski-ing and I think it can be safely said that if a sport was amateur Doug was interested in it.

This spirit remained to the end when Doug was coming from behind in a competition squash match, as a member of the Briars Team.

For over 20 years Doug has been an enthusiastic and consistent member of the Briars Club. He took an active part in many of the Club's sporting activities, he supported its social functions, in later life he was a regular side-line supporter and his presence in the Club helped to mould the characters of many of its members. At the time of his death Doug was the President of the Club, a position which he justly deserved and which he filled with dignity and characteristic vigour.

Notwithstanding such a full and varied life Doug wooed and won Josie Heine and in so doing gained a charming devoted and understanding wife. Theirs was a wartime marriage which took place in this Church in 1942 and in fullness of time their union produced two sons, Richard and Peter, and a daughter, Wendy. Those of us who have been privileged to watch these children grow into adults understand what fine parents they have and how their parents' characters have been passed to the children. Doug was a fine husband and father.

Doug had an appreciation of and a desire for the best in all things. He loved people and had the happy knack of bringing the best out of people. He liked things to be done the right way. One of my memories of Doug will always be the way in which, each year, on the Saturday closest to Anzac Day in the Briars Club rooms after football, Doug called the members to order and said a few appropriate words in memory of those members of the Club who gave the supreme sacrifice. It spoke volumes for Doug's personality and sincerity that even in later years when the views of youth are changing that Doug was always listened to in complete silence.

Doug was a man of gentle and retiring nature, but his honesty and sincerity in all he did made his presence felt and I say on behalf of myself and all his many friends to Mrs. Josie Vanderfield, to Richard, Peter and Wendy, to Mrs. Marjory Whiddon and Geoff, Don and Roger we regret his passing, in him we lost a valued friend, you have lost a husband, a father and a brother but gain strength in the knowledge that Doug Vanderfield was a man respected by his peers, a man whose presence on this earth has been to the benefit and good of those who have had the privilege of knowing him.

Accommodation and Travelling

Considering the low cost per head of the Tour and the fact that billets were arranged in some areas, the overall arrangements can be considered quite satisfactory and the area covered interesting to very beautiful. Billets at Te Anau were up to 25 miles out of town for 10% of our members which made it difficult to keep in contact. Although 12 miles out of Christchurch Lincoln College was most satisfactory for training and keeping all together. Unfortunately due to heavy tourist accommodation bookings we had to stay at a Motel at Cromwell, 37 miles out of Queenstown. There is much of interest around Queenstown including scenic flights and in future planning at least 2 days should be allowed for this area. Our final 3 days at Christchurch were spent at an unlicensed private hotel and this was not altogether satisfactory. Generally most members felt the service in a crowded B 707 or DC 8 was better than a B 747 although despite the slow service in the latter on the return flight we had a happy time. The bus arrangements were good but all would have been happy to pay a little more for an air conditioned luxury bus.

Social Arrangements

These were always at least enjoyable and sometimes overwhelming. Generally our opposition enjoyed themselves as much as we did.

General Behaviour

This was very good and the team should feel proud of the reputation they left behind and the courtesy and appreciation they showed to their hosts. Some senior members of the team had toured previously and set a fine example. The large number of our friends who came to see the plane off from Christchurch indicates the regard in which the team was held.

The statistics for the 1972-73 season reveal the following:-

- a) Club Championship 4th a drop of 1 place from previous year.
- b) 'A' Shire 9th no change from 1971/72 season.
- c) 'B' Shire 1st Premiers after finishing 2nd place.
 d) 'C' Shire 3rd an improvement of 3 places.
- e) 'C & S' Played 20 won 7.

Detailed accounts of the various sides and their individual players appear later, so it is only necessary to take an overall view mainly looking to the future. Both the 'B' Shire and 'C' Shire XI's performed very creditably and, of course, the first thought which comes to one's mind is "Can the 'B' win three in a row?", and the second thought is "Now that Macquarie University are to play in all three grades can our 'C' Shire XI fulfil the potential which has been demonstrated in the past two seasons?" As Chairman both these questions have occupied a great deal of serious thought and I, for one, feel very confident that both goals are well within our capacity, and I commend this viewpoint and attitude as a first principle for Positive Thinking in the 1973/74 Season.

The 'A' Shire performance was once again a severe disappointment for, whilst we were able to put forward a good showing in all matches, the where-withal, be it in spirit, application, dedication, to turn those defeats into positive winning, was lacking. Perhaps a complete departure from what could be described as conversatism in our approach is necessary, maybe a bold and more imaginative attitude is desirable. In all the uncertainty in putting one's finger on the cause or causes, one thing is certain, prior to the commencement of the 1973/74 Season we need to find some answers.

The City and Suburban XI performed reasonably well, but there is still a great need for an influx of younger competent players before we are able to produce performances and results which are a credit to the Club we represent.

Practice facilities were still not as satisfactory as the Cricket Committee would have wished, and yet, even allowing for this, the general attitude of most Club members to this important part of the season left a great deal to be desired. The Committee will again be making strenuous and serious endeavours to improve facilities and organisation,

and would like to hope that these efforts are supported by all players. Practice is essential to both fitness and technique and all Shire representatives should be serious about those matters.

Many sincere congratulations in respect of the 1972/73 season are in order as follows:-

To Wentworthville—Blacktown who won the Club Championship and also 'A' Division Premiership.

Macquarie University No. 1 who took out the 'C' Division Premiership beating Macquarie University No. 2, what a position for a Club to find itself in!

And finally to the Encouragement Award winners 'A' Division — Pennant Hills 'B' Division Epping and 'C' Division Canterbury.

On the social side, the annual Double Wicket Competition was run and provided a surprise, but very worth while winners in M. Astri and M. Mackenroth; congratulations on a fine performance. The Briars Sporting Club fulfilled a most important public duty during the year as rainmakers to the N.S.W. Hinterland, bringing e solid 20 hours non-stop down pour to a district, Cowra, which had not had rain for the previous 6 months, but who enjoyed travelling 400 miles to play 2 games of cricket, and not seeing even the wickets pitched? 'A' SHIRE CRICKET REPORT - 1972/73 SEASON

'C' SHIRE CRICKET REPORT - 1972/73 SEASON

Although the 'C's' finished the season on a winning note by defeating Uni. of N.S.W. (1) in the play-off for third place, perhaps the word disappointing best described the team's efforts. Disappointing because it lost the semi-final, disappointing because it didn't take its chances and disappointing because it failed when it should have succeeded.

Obviously with the Club fielding four sides, it is to be expected that team changes will occur. However, when it is remembered that twenty-eight players represented the 'C's' during the season, including eighteen in the last four games, it can be seen that team spirit is difficult to maintain. All the year the bowlers supported by good fielding did their job with Macquarie Uni's 124 in the first round the highest score against us, outside the semi-final. It was brittle batting that invariably caused our downfall. This was highlighted in the second round when we were struggling to make the semis. Having dismissed Uni of N.S.W. for 114, we were fairly comfortable at 3-68, only to see the middle order crumble with our last seven batsmen ADDING only 26 runs.

With three changes to "strengthen" the team, we faced Macquarie University in the semi-final. After losing the toss we were sent in on a fairly easy wicket against a medium paced attack. We were soon 2 for 11 and never really got going although losing our last 6 wickets for 41 didn't add greatly to our score of 131. Whatever chance we had went on the lucky edge of one Macquarie batsman who, after being dropped at 4 and missed at least six times, went on to score 148 of his team's 284. John Crockart bowled magnificently, taking 6-56 off17 overs, including the topscorer.

Faced with a deficit of 153 with only one full day remaining, Briars folded for 120. Dave Jamieson (20) and Mike Mackenroth (55) being the only ones to display any resistance. Nevertheless we congratulate Macquarie University who proved throughout the year that they had the two best teams in the competition.

(All rounder) Tom Mobbs

Does Tom ever have a bad season? He headed both batting and bowling averages and as Captain set a fine example for his team. His best performances were 50 and 3 for 5 against Epping and 37 and 8 for 35 against Uni. of N.S.W. in the play-off. If half of the team had Tom's guts, we may well have won the comp.

(Wicketkeeper Batsman) Jeff Jarrett

One of the most determined cricketers in the Club, Jeff captained the side before marriage caused his premature retirement. A punishing opener who can dominate an attack, he figured in several fine openings stands. His keeping was always neat for such a tall man as evidenced by 18 catches and 4 stumpings.

Dave Jamieson (Batsman – Wicketkeeper?)

Thrust into the opening position Dave batted well early on. His solid defence proved an ideal foil for Jeff Jarrett. His 79 against Uni. of N.S.W. was the highest of the season. Unfortunately he seems so intent on not getting out that he sometimes neglects to score runs. Occasionally leaves a gap between bat and pad. Good close to the wicket fieldman and took most catches (8).

Mike Mackenroth (Batsman)

Making a comeback to cricket after two seasons, Mike came to us from the Hurly-Burly of C. & S. Cricket. This was reflected in his early innings when he seemed intent on hitting every ball out of the ground. However, towards the end of the season, his confidence and timing increased and he batted quite well, scoring 23 and 55 in the semi-final. Tended to throw his wicket away, more application needed. Very good slips fieldsman. (Says he can bowl).

Trevor Whittaker (Batsman)

Didn't seem to be able to make a score after getting a start. Trevor would seem to be quite secure when he would unexpectedly get out. He was not the keenest fieldsman and this aspect of his play should be tightened.

Mike Cotter (All rounder)

Mike used to play baseball. As a result he has a tremendous arm and his hitting is quite prodigious. Plays the ball away from his body and has no confidence against pace. A promising left arm tweaker he likes to bowl around the wicket, which reduces his effectiveness. Nevertheless only needs coaching to realise his potential and I am sure he will go well in the near future.

Craig McIntosh (Batsman)

A disappointing season for Craig. Constantly moving between B's and C's must have made it hard for him to settle down. A capable batsman who needs to concentrate more. Good field.

Scott Geddes (Batsman – Wicketkeeper?)

A very disappointing year for Scott who continually lost his wicket to reckless unnecessary strokes. He finds concentration difficult and this is apparent even in the field. Filled in as wicketkeeper at the end of the season.

John Kemp (Bowler)

Kempy opened the bowling and for the second year was leading wicket-taker with 32 at 11.03. Was much fitter this year and as a result was able to maintain his pace for long spells. Handy tailender who should bat higher (at least above Crockart).

Derek Sterry (Bowler)

Derek's greatest asset is his ability to gain lift from seemingly dead wickets. Does spray them occasionally and sometimes pitches too short. Not a prolific wicket-taker he always bowled economically and often broke several dangerous partnerships. He bats soundly while defending but needs more footwork. Coaching would help.

John Crockart (Bowler)

A model of consistency, "Crocko" always kept the ball up and made the batsman play

him. Bowled without any luck and should have had more wickets. Yields the willow willingly whacking a whirlwind 53 partnership with "Kempy" against Pennant Hills. (A RECORD?)

Col. Dennis (All rounder)

A late arrival Col. soon settled into the team quite well. He lent some solidarity to suspect middle order but unfortunately missed the semi-final. Played a fine hand of 43 when he returned for the Play-off. Handy medium pacer good field.

John Worrall (All rounder)

Promising quickie who keeps the ball up to the batsman he should take a lot of wickets next season. Left hand batsman, he is suspect outside the off stump. Capable fieldsman.

This match was played almost entirely in opposition territory and we were unfortunate in not going on to the final. Congratulations and thanks team — it was a great effort.

The foundation for the season was laid by a tour of New Zealand which yielded 2 wins and 3 losses, two of which were against combined sides. The team comprised basically the touring combination and started the year very fit and confident, however, in the middle stages a certain staleness and lethargy, perhaps a legacy of summer training, became evident and resulted in a couple of disastrous defeats. Overall team spirit and the will to win was apparent and although ability was not greatly superior to last years team the improved knowledge of positional play and of each others game was obvious.

It is pleasing to note certain players improved vastly not only in their individual game but more importantly in their attitude to team contribution, and I feel that as this was a direct result of our tour such tours should be encouraged — even at financial cost — to build spirit and pride in playing for Briars and enable the players to evaluate and assess their individual characters and ability.

I would like to record my personal appreciation and thanks to one of natures gentlemen — the late Douglas Vanderfield — our tour manager and a person I was privileged to know and appreciate.

To Ian McGregor thanks as team captain for his performance both on and off the field. His knowledge, experience and hard work contributed largely to a successful tour.

I shall not attempt to assess the players at length but they can be justly proud of their performances against teams of often greater individual ability.

A noteworthy feature of the season was the improved tackling both first up and in cover particularly in the backline.

PROPS — Bruce Evans. Improved all season, particularly in rucking ability and know-how and drove well from line outs. Ian McGregor, will to win is a vital asset and Stan combined this with excellent rucking and tackling and strong scrum work. Won a lot of ball from line outs and towards the end of season played his best football.

 ${\tt HOOKER-Bob\ Hodgson.}$ Once again a strong season. He seems to get faster with age and carrying the ball through rucks is virtually unstoppable.

Ken Gray, John Bailey, Murray Melville also played with ability but injury forced them out after a few games.

Peter Cowman showed big improvement and tackled with great purpose.

Gordon Hutchison and Gordon Pegler filled in very well for injured players on a few occasions.

Congratulations to Petersham on a fine Premiership win.

During the season Phil Brooks, Phil England, John Thorne and Rod Smith were selected to trial for the New South Wales Sub-District Team which toured Queensland.

FULL-BACK — Rod Smith was again a strong last line of defence and gained tremendous ground with raking line kicking. His forays into the backline — not frequent enough — were responsible for many successful movements. Barry Williams substituted in this position and with experience and confidence will improve greatly.

WINGS — Kevin Moore ran strongly in his best position and his tackling, particularly in cover, saved the game on many occasions. Mick Marshall showed glimpses of his undoubted ability but injuries limited his appearances and sapped his confidence. Phil Brand commenced in fine style but after 2 injuries found it difficult to recapture last years fine form.

CENTRES — Keith Wearne stabilised the backline and effected some excellent breaks whilst his tackling jarred many an opposition move. David Guille showed a marked improvement in all phases of play, handling, speed off the mark and first-up tackling and one cannot forget his goal kicking particularly the tremendous semi-final effort.

FIVE-EIGHTH — Ken O'Brien. Great hands and good positional play he used the short kick to advantage. Tackling improved during the season.

HALF-BACK — Craig Hickey. Predictably and characteristically gave his best at all times and tackled as if his life depended on it. Took some heavy knocks but came back well at the end.

LOCK-FORWARD — Terry Dunleavy. Played well above his weight and tackled fearlessly — at personal cost. Running with the ball improved but should not lead with his head.

BREAKAWAYS — Phillip England. A consistently good season. We expect him always to tackle non-stop then carry the ball, back up inside and win possession. He does not disappoint. Bob Helyar missed quite a few games but when available made a great difference in ball winning and close tackling. In possession always poses a big threat to the opposition.

2ND ROW — Phil Brooks (Captain) played with dedication and determination. Strong running and improved rucking. Phil took over the captaincy and played some memorable games to lift the teams performance. John Thorne confirmed last years promise and next year should emerge as the best 2nd rower in the competition. His untimely injury prior to the semi-final was a sad loss. But Jim Barrett filled in and his experience and fire proved him — still — one of the best forwards on the field.

It seems I now have to sit down and write the same report of Burke Cup's performance this year as all coaches have done over the previous years. Once again we had an excellent season — reached the semi-finals — and on the big day were outplayed by a better side of life-savers, more easily adaptable to the inclement conditions. I would like to congratulate Lindfield on their win in the competition. I am not going to include a summary on each player, as positions in the team were changed so frequently throughout the year. However, this was my first season as a coach with the club, and was one of my most enjoyable.

The year started off with two straight defeats, and I realised that the team lacked knowledge of the basic fundamentals of rugby. However, with the help of Rod Pegler and Mike Elder and many hours of frustrating talking (in which I never repeated myself), the team started to take shape and by the end of the first round a good combination was starting to emerge. The second round produced some good football and I felt that the last game of the season showed that fifteen training sessions had not been futile, and was the best game played.

Without criticising past, present or future coaches of the Club, I do feel that Briars rugby suffers from a lack of basic knowledge of the game, and I feel that in the future more emphasis should be placed on this aspect. Also, players should put a lot more of their own time into getting fit so that more time in training sessions can be devoted to tactics and new movements (a comment from a well-known fitness fanatic!)

I have a great respect for all my players, they did everything that was asked of them (whether they believed it or not) with the exception of one player who refused to ever have an early Friday night — though his game was never affected. They were very keen and I feel this co-operation and keenness was a major contributing factor to the success of this year's Burke Cup side.

Some players, I feel, must have special mention for their successful season. John Boyle who led the side admirably throughout the year, was relieved of this position for the last few games, not because of his ability to lead, but I felt his play would improve without the responsibility, which proved correct.

John McGrath I feel is the most improved player I have seen go through the Briars for many years. He was the best and fairest of Burke Cup, and I feel that if he continues with his present improvement he must be a great player for the Briars to come. Sandy Greaves, who only played early in the season, unfortunately broke his collar bone. He also has great potential and I hope he stays with us. So has Gordon Pegler, but he must learn to train.

My thanks go to all the players, and I am sorry if some names are not mentioned, but a team is made up of 15.
