Your Board of Directors and Management Committee present for consideration and adoption by members this 62nd Annual Report of the Club's activities and of the financial position for the year ending 30 September 1980.

In many respects the year under review reflected on, and complemented, the efforts and ambitions of the past few years. This past twelve months has produced a good measure of success in all of our sports and the good feeling of returning to the top end of the Club Championship ladder in both Cricket and Rugby must be felt by all members.

But it's not all success.

Let us look at it in segments.

Our Sporting Performance

Our Sporting Chairman's reports should be pleasant reading indeed, and the absence of any bright new pennant shining down from the club's walls should not be allowed to dampen our spirits or motivate our "knockers".

Hockey and Squash were already in good shape when the year commenced and were well dug in on the high ground. Squash recovered from some administrative re-shuffling to keep our standards and reputation at a very high level. Hockey took a deep breath and jumped up to First Division status from a position as Second Division Club Champions.

Fielding the same playing group as in previous seasons had the benefits of continuity and teamsmanship, but did not enable us to match the more skilful clubs. Nonetheless, a very satisfactory performance was achieved.

Rugby was in a recovery phase (we thought) at the end of the 1979 season, but consolidation and a further drive forward were going to be necessary in 1980. And Cricket — our beloved child, — had matured into a sixty-one year old unpredictable knife thrower.

But we did know that our cricketing links with the Croydon Juniors were starting to pay off, and so it proved to be. Cricket bounced back to third place in the Club Championship and we now have talented young players spread through the three shire teams. At sixty-two it seems we're reborn again. Four years ago, languishing at the bottom of the Sub-District Club Championship list, the road ahead for Rugby was on a vertical plane and menacing. But our Rugby administrators and players (mostly the same people) have fought back remarkably well, to run a clear third in a tough competitive season.

The conclusion must be that we retain the will to survive and the spirit to come back.

Our Administration and Service

To qualify the heading, this section is concerned with those matters that might be designated as being "in-house".

Not completely accurate, but close enough. It covers the areas concerned with Secretarial services, Treasury, House maintenance, Bar service, Focus and Personnel. A mixed bag of activities and certainly a variable assortment of results.

In an inflationary atmosphere and examined in any commercial light, our financial trading result is poor.

It reflects poor attendance, inadequate service and realises a mediocre surplus.

Unlike our sporting areas, it has not had constructive appraisal and attention from either your Directors or Management Committee and this area of operations must be given new priorities. In 1977 it received a lot of attention and the result was excellent. Its time has come again.

Upkeep of the premises has been forced to stand a long way behind our financial concern with the new ground project and the premises and fittings have suffered accordingly.

But we have stabilised on our tenancy arrangements and all appears calm in that department.

Have you ever written to Focus? Do you have a point of view on any topic? And, more importantly, when are you going to introduce a new member? Our total membership is down by four, compared with 78/79.

The matter of suspension from the B grade shire Cricket semi-final has been thoroughly worked over and exposed through "Focus" to all members.

But it cannot pass without being officially recorded in this commentary; and we will surely never again approach participation in a final series without the memory of this poignant episode.

The new Ground

Much to our delight and nervous doubt, the N.S.W. Government Sport and Recreation Department awarded the Club a grant of \$45,000. Our debenture issue, launched in July has received only modest support to date, but it is a long term project and, therefore, a long term effort is essential in order to complement the years of struggle and push this far.

Professional recommendations that are concerned with the nature of the ultimate playing surface are being sourced and will be evaluated, in order to enable your Directors to determine the final specifications and to proceed.

Bringing the concept to life is a matter that requires sound judgment and calls for critical decisions. Don't be too impatient.

Although under considerable time pressures, the objective of utilising the ground in 1981 is still current and should be achieved.

Our Social Activity

Too little attended by too few.

Again an area that has received insufficient attention and support.

Our objectives and commitment to social activities needs a thorough review, not only for the benefit of our active members, but also to occasionally stimulate participation by a much wider selection of members and their partners.

Our People

I do want to single out a number of members who have made a major contribution and at the same time acknowledge that a host of people, named somewhere in this Annual Report, made the club go in 1980.

Maurice Critchley, Ted Stockdale, David Lewis, Peter Wallace and Ian Richard.

These people especially carried out major administrative tasks.

The list of sporting contributors is hard to cut, but in aiding performance and building spirit, I submit the following list in the certain knowledge that I will be begging the printer to squeeze in yet a further name or two, and most likely after the ink has dried.

Tony Wozniak, Keith Wearne, Bob Streeter, Mike Sterry, Ken Kable, Ray Pontifex, Ken O'Brien, David Jamieson, John Staniforth, David Blair, Charlie Williams, Ian Blair, Aldo Cantori, Lindsay Calloway, Rod Smith and David Brookes.

And who would begrudge our resident "speaker" and C & S critic, Chris Mitchell, a line of space for his great contribution to the Annual Dinner.

At the conclusion of our year, Mike Elder resigned as a Director to re-establish himself in Queensland. Mike's loyalty to The Briars is well recognised and to paraphrase a farewell comment "We haven't lost a member, just gained a holiday house".

The 1979-80 season was one of the most successful the Club has experienced for a number of years, the finishing position of the respective teams being:

Club Championship — 4th
A Shires — 5th
B Shires — 3rd
C Shires — 5th

City & Suburban — Won 6, Lost 17

Under 16 years – 2nd Under 14 years – 5th

Each of the Shire teams improved their position on that of the previous season, with a consequent improvement in our Club Championship performance — from 9th in 1978—79 to 4th in 1979—80.

In addition, the C Shire team was able to win the end-of-season Limited Over Competition for clubs not participating in the semi-finals.

The general all-round improvement in performance of the Club can probably be put down to the emphasis and encouragement given to younger players, particularly in the A Shires. The benefit of this policy should be seen for a number of years to come.

A disturbing aspect of the season, however, was the disqualification of the B Shire side at the completion of the first day of the semi-final against Wentworthville.

Considerable comment has been made within the Club about the circumstances that gave rise to the disqualification and it is not proposed to pursue these further. Suffice to say that a lesson should have been learnt and no stone left unturned in the future to ensure that all players selected in semi-final teams are qualified to play.

The Briars association with Croydon Cricket Club continued during the season and this again proved a most fruitful association, a number of promising young players from Croydon turning out with the Briars and it is anticipated that this will continue in the future.

The Briars (Burwood) were associated with the other Municipal and Shire Clubs in the M. & S. Association and this body is to be congratulated on the job done in the interest of all Shire clubs.

It would be remiss if I did not make mention of the stirling performance of the Epping Cricket Club in winning the A, B and C Shire Competitions, as well as the Club Championship — congratulations Epping.

A SHIRE CRICKET REPORT 1979 - 80

After a poor cricket season the previous year the current season did not look promising, but the Club attracted a lot of young players to pre-season practice which brought about the policy that as many young players as possible would be selected in the A Shire team. By Christmas time, after winning only one game and half the season gone, it looked as though the early policy was not the right one. The side then settled down and 'put together' four wins on the 'trot', including one outright.

The side came fifth in the competition which was commendable as of the four sides who finished above us, three of the sides beat us and the other drew, the only other loss was the team that finished last.

Highlights of the year were exciting wins over Pennant Hills and Canterbury, the former was a great team performance as nineteen wickets fell on the second day to our bowlers to snatch victory with only a few overs remaining.

Opening partnerships by Bob Streeter and Darryl Lewis scoring over 150 runs on two occasions.

With the revival of spin bowling Rod Smith and Russell Roberts took nearly half the wickets to fall over the season, Russell only played half the season.

The most satisfying part of the year was the effort by the team to make practice on Wednesday evenings, averaging seventy five percent, and on two occasions, ten out of the eleven players were present. This was one of the reasons for our improved performance.

Another major factor was a better balanced bowling attack with three medium pace and two spin bowlers. The side dismissed the opposition on no less than nine occasions during the year, the previous season this only happened once, giving truth to the rumour that 'bowlers win matches'.

Thanks must go to Bob Streeter and Rod Smith for looking after the kit and afternoon teas respectively. Bob was the leading run scorer and Rod the leading wicket taker and with the added responsibilities it seemed to improve their performance.

IAN BLAIR (Captain). Returned to the captaincy after a short break and halfway through the season was getting a few grey hairs. Was most appreciative of the effort put in by the team all year, especially coming from so far behind.

Had a few good innings, bowled when needed as can be seen by the statistics, not often. Was given the nickname 'Brierly' in the field.

BOB STREETER. Bob had his finest season with the Club being the leading run scorer, scoring his first century with the Club and taking the most number of catches with two others during the year. His opening partnerships with Darryl Lewis in the latter half of the season paved the way for our victories. His catching at slip was appreciated by the bowlers. A good team player.

DARRYL LEWIS. A player with a lot of potential if he could put his mind to it. When moved into the opening spot proved an instant success. If he could improve his concentration to the level of his technique, would score many more runs. A very good field but must remember there are no T.V. Awards in A Shires.

ALDO CANTORI. Batted well when the pressure was on and had a century in the making when the Captain closed the innings. Aldo is the keenest fieldsman in the team putting a 100% effort in every time he took the field, took some fine catches during the year. A fine team man.

CRAIG HICKEY. Worked his way up from the B's and put in some fine performances with the bat. Missed a few matches in the middle of the season due to weddings, not his own, so could not settle into a regular batting position. Needs to bowl a little tighter especially on small grounds.

ROD SMITH. Had an exceptional year with the ball being the leading wicket taker, bowled long spells with accuracy. His fielding was of a high standard taking some fine catches in the outfield. His batting lacked concentration on a number of occasions, throwing his wicket away when he had sides at his mercy. A good club man.

STEVE SCHOMBERG. After a three year lay-off Steve returned to cricket working his way through the grades with good performances with bat and ball. He produced the penetration needed by the medium pacers and with long spells at the crease produced these fine bowling statistics. Did not have much chance to show his batting prowess but showed in the limited over games that he is not a No. 10. Took some fine catches.

DAVID GUILLE. David did not have a good season with the ball bowling without luck as he beat the bat on numerous occasions. After a match winning last wicket innings against Bexley could not handle the elevation in the batting order later in the season. Fielded very well during the year taking some fine catches.

DAVID WALKER. An excellent season with the gloves making a remarkable seventeen stumpings, a club record, not all from the spin bowlers. His keenness behind the stumps was most appreciated by the Captain. Not sure whether he is slowing up or showing off his agility for one so young by actually diving in front of first slip to take a catch. Batting a little disappointing.

RUSSELL ROBERTS. Coming up from the B's during the season his leg breaks gave the variety needed in the attack. Was not afraid to throw the ball up and was given good support in the field. His claim to fame in batting was his only scoring shot — a six!!

Fielded well during the year but must remember that cricket on Saturday follows Friday night.

BERT POZUELO. The youngest member in the side and like Darryl a player with a lot of potential. The only genuine all rounder in the side.

Bowled well during the year and will take many wickets with his outswinger. Batted well later in the season when he started to play shots. A good field in any position.

B SHIRE CRICKET REPORT 1979 - 80

The Season's end saw the team finish in 3rd place, an improvement of 3 positions as against the previous year.

The early part of the summer saw a lot of rain and in fact only 1 win was obtained in the first 5 games, nevertheless with 3 draws and 1 loss, we stayed in contact with the leaders as the inclement weather had affected most team's results.

Then round 6 saw the first of 6 consecutive wins (all first innings) and at the end of round 11, we had finished in 2nd place. A great effort indeed.

The semi-final against Wentworthville was expected to be a tough one and at the day's end we won 5—120 chasing 193, we all realised we had a battle on our hands, but it did not quite eventuate. On the Saturday evening Wenty started the ball rolling and after some inquiries they decided to protest on the grounds of my ineligibility.

Upon making their protest the N.S.W. Cricket Association had no alternative but to uphold it and we were disqualified. A grave error was made, however, I believe enough has been said about the whole affair. Perhaps I may say that all Chairmen in our Club should endeavour to ensure this sort of thing is never repeated.

Obviously a terribly disappointing finish to the season, but next summer with all available, I am quite sure it will be an interesting one.

In closing I would like to thank all those flannelled fools for your support throughout the season.

DAVID JAMIESON (Captain). Started very well with scores of 7 n/o, 63, 24, 39 and 51 then found promotion to the A's, where he struggled for some time, however came back to the team (infamously) and struggled for an innings or two, but batted well in the semi-final scoring 40.

Led the team and enjoyed it immensely. Ground fielding good, 6 catches.

KEVIN HOLLEY. Took over from Dave and led the team well. Kev in fact captained the team in that spell of 6 wins and in that time batted soundly and bowled tightly.

His line and length was not as good as last year, but being the fighter he is was always in there grafting away. Took 13 wickets at 20.08 and finished with 156 runs (9 digs) at 17.33. Took most catches outside the keeper ending up with 8.

KEITH AUSTIN. Without doubt one of the most punishing batsman the club has seen for many a year.

On his debut scored 92 cracking runs and didn't look back. Keith's batting was a delight to watch and technically his batting is very good, which must make him a good chance for A's next summer.

Keith finished with 337 runs from only 8 innings at 48.14, he has an excellent arm and his fielding was good throughout. Says he can bowl.

PETER CARUANA. In the A's at the start of the season Peter struggled against the tight bowling but on his return to the side he knuckled down and came good. Pete finished with 343 runs from 11 knocks at 34.30, his leg-side play was indeed tremendous, however needs to watch his footwork on and outside the off stump, when he does this consistently, I am sure he will be given the chance up higher. Fielding was not good, needs more application.

PAUL TONER. A young cricketer whose great concentration enables him to stick around and build his innings, unlike a lot of young cricketers, he is willing to listen and these two attributes coupled with a real love for the game, will ensure his future in the club. Paul finished with 203 runs from 6 knocks at 33.20. A fine effort. Keen fieldsman.

KEVIN PRICE. The all-rounder in the side, Kevin's cricket was outstanding.

His bowling was very tight (sometimes too tight) but nevertheless he snared 21 victims at 15.66.

Key's batting, when given the opportunity, was first class and on more than one occasion saved the team and conversely won the odd game. Finished with 166 runs at 33.20. His fielding was not terribly good, but then he was the grandaddy of the team.

A fine cricketer with a fine attitude. A good team man.

STEVE SCHOMBERG. A good cricketer, Steve didn't stay with us for too long and on promotion to the A's, he had scored 129 runs at 32.25 from 5 innings, and taken 11 wickets at 14.00. Another cricketer with an excellent attitude, Steve has that ability to break through the batting and his batting was punishing indeed. Fielding good.

KEN O'BRIEN. A late starter to the season, Ken joined the team and batted splendidly to reach 20 odd on five occasions but failed to go on with it. Ken's batting, in particular his

driving through the arc of mid-off to cover point, was a delight, however he needs to temper his innings a little, then his 20's will become 50's etc. His average was 26.83 from 9 digs for 161 runs. Fielding excellent. A good team man.

PETER MANSFORD. Did not have the best of luck last summer with a couple of decisions going against him and a couple of incredible catches off his bat.

However, on occasions found his form, in particular his knock of 46 against Lindfield was a gem. Tended to get a little bogged down occasionally, nevertheless his presence was missed because his experience was needed in what was basically a young team. Fielding was good.

PETER RICHARDSON. Peter started well with scores of 32, 15, 24, 13 and 22 but his form like Manso, fell away, mainly because of lack of concentration.

One of our keenest cricketers, Peter set an example to the younger guys in the side and was sorely missed in more ways than one. Fielding as usual was tremendous.

PETER WALLACE. One of our quick lefties Peter bowled very well throughout his spells. His line was better this summer, but was unlucky not to have had more wickets due to batsmen playing and missing and the odd dropped catch.

Perhaps the only criticism of Peter's bowling is that he should not vent his frustrations at the umpire, but at the batsman. Did not get many chances with the willow. Fielding has improved.

CLAUDIO ORLANDO. Without doubt one of the best prospects in the Club. Claudio found it hard early on, but gradually settled down and showed us how good he can bat. His 66 against Roseville was a really nice knock and with this innings his confidence grew, but unfortunately he tended to try his shots too soon and was dismissed too often in 10's and 20's.

Only needs to apply himself a little more, when this is done will enjoy his cricket a lot more.

Claudio kept wickets and performed very well indeed, finishing with 15 catches and 4 stumpings.

DAVID WRIGHT. A very good leftie, David missed the first 3 games, but on settling down in the side proceeded to bowl a good line and length and bowled very well to his field.

A deceptive bowler he finished with 18 scalps at 12.66 from only 83 overs, a legacy of having so many bowlers in the team. His fielding in the gully was good.

RUSSELL ROBERTS. Only played 3 games for the B's, but in that time he bowled very well indeed, especially for a leg-spinner who is only 18.

A very confident young man (sometimes too cocky). He finished with 15 wickets at 7.60, then was promoted to the A's (his fielding was quite good, however his batting was found to be lacking).

Nevertheless Russell is a top prospect and is one who will go a long way.

MAL SHORTER. The quick quickie in our team, Mal finished with 19 wickets at 17.68 from 123 overs. Only played 5 games for the team due to commitments in the A's, so his strike rate was quite good.

Definitely the fiery bowler in our team, Mal often laid the foundation for the other bowler to dismiss batsmen as they endeavoured to get away from the strike. Batting hmmm! Good fieldsman.

LAURIE YEOMANS. In his first year of cricket with the club, Laurie settled in well and enjoyed himself. Found the difference between turf and mats a little daunting initially and tended to be a little short in length, but his experience (30 years of cricket) eventually shone through and he improved as a consequence.

Like all bowlers fancies himself as a batsman (never stopped telling me) and actually did succeed when given the opportunity, maybe a promotion to number 10 in the batting. Fielding needs improving.

I feel I would be remiss if mention was not made of some of the other fellows who played, in particular Craig Hickey whose knock of 100 against Bexley was a cracker and who in fact scored the only ton for the B's. Gary Schomberg a left-handed batsman with a lot of talent, and Richard Brown, John Guest and Craig Smith, who I am sure will be given extended opportunities next summer.

Congratulations to Epping D.C.C. on winning the A's, B's, C's and Club Championship, a marvellous effort indeed.

However we finished the season off with 4 easy wins to take out the trophy for the winners of the Limited Over Competition which was contested by the teams that did not make the semi-finals, unearthing in the process a new quickie in Terry Findlay.

There were many highlights throughout the season. Winning the first match by one run against the premiers Epping I, was a great start to the season. Scoring over 300 runs against Canterbury I, to establish a new club C grade record was an outstanding performance, as was Peter Caruana's 135 runs in that match. Other outstanding personal performances came from Craig Smith who picked up a hat trick and a personal best of 7 — 9 which he took against Wentworthville. Alan Thompson bowled 259.1 overs throughout the season and as Alan would say he would have bowled a lot more but the opposition kept running out of wickets. Alan as vice-captain made the captains job a pleasure with good sound advice and constructive comments both on and off the field.

John Guest was the other main bowler who has the uncanny ability of every few overs coming up with the 'unplayable ball'.

Apart from the bowling, the most outstanding feature of the teams performance was the fielding. Some very good catching and general ground fielding was seen throughout the season and very good wicketkeeping by both Hermin Hitipeuw and Richard Brown. The fielding teams response to the bowlers bowling to the field set was responsible for the low opposition batting scores. The fielding side must rank as one of the best ever seen in C Shires.

The batting was not quite as successful, but 2 new batting stars did emerge through the season who are destined for greater things in the club. They were Paul Toner and Keith Austin. Keith adapted his aggressive style of batting admirably to each circumstance in which he batted. Paul matured throughout the season and shows that he has a good variety of shots in his repertoire.

At the end of the season Peter Mansford and Peter Richardson joined the team and showed what good opening batsmen can do to an opening attack.

Individually the team shaped up as follows:-

MICHAEL STERRY (Captain). Led a fairly successful team in his first year as a captain. Learnt a lot during the season. Had a fairly successful year with the bat but suffered a loss of form at the end of the season.

ALAN THOMPSON (Vice-captain). Specialist silly leg fieldsman, mainstay bowler, adviser and chief confidant of the captain, chief umpire, part-time batsman — just some of his talents. His bowling was always tight and has the ability to cut the ball both ways. Great team man and had a great deal to do with the teams success.

PAUL TONER. Left the team at the end of the season after 3 brilliant innings of 63 not out,

58 and 72. Nottoo keen on opening the batting but proved he can handle any bowling. Must learn to play within himself early in his innings. Has a decided weakness on the leg stump and must be careful not to overcompensate for this weakness.

HERMIN HITIPEUW. Great team man who despite his size has great ability as a wicketkeeper. Has lightning reflexes on his left side and showed his versatility as a gully fieldsman when Richard Brown took over the gloves. Having his first year on turf affected his batting but showed glimpses of signs as adapting to a very handy batsman. General keeness and attitude is excellent.

KEITH AUSTIN. 1st grade base-baller who made the covers position his own with outstanding fielding. Always showed more potential with the bat than his scores indicated. His 56 against Epping I's included some of the best batting seen in C's. Has a tendency to loft the ball unnecessarily on fast outfields, getting himself caught before he has really got his timing right.

JOHN PRICE. Could be a good spin bowler if he really worked at it. John missed several matches throughout the season and because of the bowlers available in our easy wins in the 4 Limited Over matches did not get a bowl, then however still bowled 121 overs in the season. He has potential as a batsman but however tended to go for the 'big one' too often. John has the ability but seems to lack the keeness.

JOHN GUEST. A good quickie with great potential. On many occasions beat the bat because the batsmen wasn't good enough to get an edge. John's fitness could be improved as could his run up and delivery. John must learn to use his full height when delivering the ball. Tends to wander off his line due to lack of concentration or trying too hard. Good close in fieldsman and hard hitting shock batsman.

CRAIG SMITH. Has the killer instinct — a hate of all batsmen who refuse to give up their wickets meekly or all fielders who drop one of his catches. Produced one of the best bowling performances seen in the club bowling 183.2 overs, 73 of which were maidens, taking 49 wickets for 316 runs at an average of 6.4 per wicket, including one hat trick. Bowled an excellent line and length. Very good fielder and super keen team man.

CRAIG MILLARD. Another player who has outstanding potential with the bat but has a tendency to hole out somewhere just short of the boundary. Likes to get on with the game regardless of the situation. Good outfielder.

STEPHEN GOSS. Had a disappointing season with the bat but showed in the match against Lindfield with a brilliant 69 that he has got most of the shots in the book. Needs more concentration in his batting. Good outfielder.

RICHARD BROWN. Joined the team in the middle of the season and showed his all-round ability with the gloves as wicketkeeper. Did not have a good season with the bat but did show some flashes of what he can do. Good team man.

PETER MANSFORD. Joined the team at the end of the season. Got the team off to good starts as an opening bat with Peter Richardson. Keeness and experience bolstered the team particularly in the winning of the Limited Over matches.

PETER RICHARDSON. The other half of the 2 Peters opening combination. His 62 not out and 64 and the last 2 matches showed that the timing of old had returned. Keeness and ability bolstered the slips cordon.

FOOTBALL ANNUAL REPORT 1980

The 1980 Briars Rugby Season has re-established the Club as a force in sub-district rugby. Achievements on the field have been the most successful since the middle sixties. The results were as follows:

Club Championship — Third

Kentwell Cup — Finalists

Burke Cup — Finalists

Whiddon Cup — Grand Finalists

Judd Cup — Ninth

The reasons for the above results are varied, with the following being the major ones:

- * A solid nucleus of players, who have developed since the 1976 crisis season and have finally realised their abilities on the football field.
- * A relatively small loss of players from the 1979 season, while at the same time gaining more new players, most of high quality (e.g., Bob Stevenson, Gary Whitaker, Rex Harris, Tim Koertz, Andy Steele, Peter Rae, etc., etc., etc.).
- * The success of a Kentwell Cup side, which had shown enough in 1979 to suggest it could do better in 1980. While our Burke Cup and Whiddon Cup sides have always done reasonably well (especially in 1980) the Kentwell sides of the past decade have never quite matched them. However, 1980 was the start of a new era for Briars Kentwell Cup side, for at last we learnt how to 'pull-off' the close ones.

- * A strict 'NO TRAIN, NO PLAY' in the top two sides allowed training nights to be highly successful, with complete sides on the training paddock. Furthermore, numbers at training throughout the whole season were very good, always over or close to sixty.
- * Enthusiastic, devoted and willing coaches provided the background for success on the playing field as well as on training nights. Coaches for 1980 were as follows:
- Kentwell Keith Wearne, Keith's attitude to coaching can only be described as magnificent. His time and devotion to the job were not limited to training nights and match afternoons but to every single day between the first training run to the last game. It is no wonder then that Keith is the most successful Kentwell coach since 1965. His drive and determination, against all odds rubbed off on his players, making it a memorable season.
- **Burke Ken O'Brien**, although new to coaching, Ken was able to develop our Burke Cup side into a premiership threat only the lack of big match experience taking away from them a place in the Grand Final. Ken's quiet yet firm and constructive attitude gained the respect of all the players who played under him in 1980.
- Whiddon Dave Jamieson, Jamo added, in 1980, to his long list of contributions he has made to the Club by coaching a rugby side. The results speak for themselves, Whiddon making it through to the Grand Final. If anyone of the coaches had a hard job, then Dave was the one, for his side contained some of the most experienced and therefore more 'mature' footballers in the Club. Yet Dave was able to combine the talent of these players with a great deal of success.
- Judd John Staniforth, Stano's season was filled with frustration (as only people who have coached Juddies have experienced) as his team deserved a much higher placing than ninth. The attitude of the Juddies was exemplary on the rest of the Club and a tribute to John's manner that although success was limited, their attendance at training was right up to that expected of Kentwell.

The attitude of all players to training, playing and Club involvement played its part on the field. I have already mentioned training nights and our end results, but the players efforts during the off-season and trials to get themselves fit played no small part in our success.

If the above shows why the 1980 season was a success on the football field, then it is time to praise the efforts of people who helped run the management side, equally as important as the playing side.

The Committee for 1980 comprised of: L. Callaway (Canteen), R. Handthorn (gear transport), R. Smith (Raffles), D. Vaughan (Bar Roster), M. Dovgon (gear), G. Brady (Jumpers) and M. Brown (Social). Special highlights and achievements these gentlemen should be remembered for are as follows:

* Being able to run football at no expense to the Licenced Club. This season our total expenditure on football would have been close to \$4,000. Yet, due to sound management the bill was met. Items that were purchased during the season were: A set of guernseys each for, Whiddon and Judd, completing an initiative commenced in 1979 to lessen the financial load on new members; new tackling bags; sixty pairs of shorts; ten footballs.

- * The cost of playing for Briars Rugby was only \$15, this amount including a levy of \$11 for accident insurance with the N.S.W. State Government Scheme. Players no longer need to purchase football guernseys and it is hoped will be supplied with further gear subsidies in the future.
- * Canteen takings were \$1620 over nine home games, an increase of 60% on 1979, a tribute to the hard work that Lindsay put into the running of the canteen during the season.
- * Our 200 Club also provided a financial windfall of \$800 thanks largely to Rod's work.
- * Footballers were once more a majority at any club function helping to make such events financially feasible.
- * Introduction of our own Rugby jumpers was a fashion breakthrough, their popularity ensuring that they will be a much sought after garment next winter, thank you Gary.

A new innovation to our set up was the introduction of managers for our top three teams. The managers were: Charlie Williams (Kentwell), John Powell (Burke) and Dave Blair (Whiddon) and all would agree they carried out their function with 100% success. The introduction of Dave Blair also brought along to the Club a statistician, with our competition tables board updated weekly along with a whole host of other relevant and interesting information.

A highly successful year culminated with a Dinner Presentation Night at Sydney Rowing Club on the Wednesday night following the Grand Finals. One of the highlights of the night was the presentation of Best & Fairest Pewters to the following players:

Kentwell – D. Vaughan

Burke – G. Johnson & C. Murray

Whiddon – R. Pierson

Judd – B. Burns

Club B & F — A. Steele

The success of the night was largely due to the organisation of John Baker.

A final word of thanks to two gentlemen who made substantial contributions to Briars during the year, Ian Richard and Ian Duncan. 'Beast' once more backed up on Subbies management committee to add to his other commitments on Board of Directors and New Ground Planning. To Ian Duncan I owe a great deal, for he not only left football in a good state as my predecessor but was always there to help throughout the year. I believe that Ian's role in the Briars Rugby revival has been a major one, his contributions to the Club as Football Chairman, Kentwell Coach and Player being outstanding.

Our current success must not be allowed to be a "flash in the pan", for too many people have worked too hard for the success of 1980. There is still a great deal to achieve, namely

a Club Championship and Four Cups in 1981. The platform is there with players young enough yet with the experience to go all the way, and a coaching and administrative depth to care for matters of the field. To quote our P.M. 'Life wasn't meant to be easy' and to become the new leaders in Subbies we must work harder in the 1980's. Success breeds success and once the cups start to come in the effort involved will be worth it.

Finally, I take this opportunity to wish all Club members and their families a Merry Christmas and a Happy and Prosperous New Year, 'The Year of the Briars'!

KENTWELL CUP

1980 a Year to Remember

The style of rugby that was adopted for the Kentwell Cup Team this year was based on dynamic forward power and running rugby from second and third phase. To achieve this style of rugby a team needs to be very fit and needs to spend a lot of time on developing its skills. To this end conditioning became a very important factor in our training routine and we started preseason training with good attendances and had good attendances during the trials. The results achieved during the trials were very encouraging and we started in the season with a fit and very confident Kentwell Cup team.

The first game of the season was against St. Ives and the team played very well for a fine win. It did look like being a year to remember however, after the first 6 games we had won only 2 and lost 4 and it had the appearance of being just another season.

This was not to be the case however as the team started to pick up their game and concentrate on our style of rugby. Once the team got into gear they started to roll along and had some excellent results. It was a fine effort when, to make the semi-finals, it seemed that we needed to win 6 of the 8 last games, however, the team won 8 of their last 9 games. The 10th game was the final against Colleagues.

The first semi-final was played against St. Pats Old Boys and the win by 27-10 demonstrated that when they put their minds to it the team has the best forward pack in sub-district. It was unfortunate that when we played Colleagues in the Final that Colleagues got their act together and put the cleaners through us nicely to the tune of 30-4. This was particularly disappointing considering that we had beaten them five weeks before at their home ground in what was, in my view, our best performance for the season. In this game we started rucking well and we became a very hard rucking team for the rest of the season.

A lot of lessons were learned and a lot of bridges were crossed during this season and this

season should be used as the base for successive seasons and if that is the case I see no reason why Briars' Kentwell Cup Team could not be the Premiers in the 1981 season.

As we found out this year when we trained two nights a week, the only way for success in sub-district is by two nights a week training and the strict enforcement of the 'no train — no play' rule. KERRY WEALE (Full-back). Played both winger before injury and full-back for the finals, a good fielder of the ball under pressure and developing good skills in joining the back line in attack.

ROD SMITH (Full-back). I hope Rod is still talking to me, had some great games and had some other games.

TIM O'REILLY (Winger). A good attacking winger and also an extremely strong defender.

CRAIG PHELPS (Winger). A very talented footballer who can play anywhere in the back line and played three positions in the Kentwell team this year.

GREG BUDDEN (Centre). A kamakazi defending centre who is developing good attacking skills.

MAL WEBBER (Centre). Made some fine breaks early in the season, just needs to renew his aggressive tendencies.

JOHN HURLEY (Five-eight). A class five-eight with an excellent kick, controls the game well and who won't remember his three field goals in the semi-finals.

ANDREW CRAIG (Half-back). Straight out of Whiddon Cup last year into Kentwell Cup this year. Copped heaps behind our line-out but came back for more. A good effort.

REX HARRIS (Half back). A couple of nice games from the master.

PHILIP ENGLAND (Lock). A very good season for Phil. A good, tight, eighty minute footballer (as he approaches the veteran class).

DAVID VAUGHAN & BOB BISHOP (Breakaways). Both had splendid seasons, strong tacklers and dynamic ball runners. A pleasure to have them in the team.

TIM KOERTZ (Breakaway). An eighteen year old who played a good part of the season in Kentwell. A tremendous prospect and another eighty minute player.

ALAN McDONOUGH (2nd Row). The rest of the team want to thank Alan for introducing the 400 metres conditioning run, Captain for the first part of the season and a regular member of the team. A solid, hard running, second-rower.

KIM PFIEFKE (2nd Row). Like Alan a good solid second-rower who put a lot of pressure on the opposition in the scrums. The Colleagues half-back is still wondering what hit him.

IAN STEELE (2nd Row). Played first half of the season, best I have seen Ian play, hope to see him next year.

PAUL BEVANS (Prop.). Trained as hard and played as hard as any other player in the team, a dedicated player who I would not like to pack against in the front row. A great season.

TONY WOZNIAK (Prop.). Captain for the second half of the season and the finals. A good leader, an excellent prop, a delightful person, a great season.

MILTON HOWELL (Hooker). The hooker who doesn't lose many loose heads (and if you ask him 'never') also good in the loose and scored a couple of good tries.

I am sorry if I have missed anyone else who played. I hope Tony Wozniak and Milton Howell enjoy their rugby in the U.K.

I would like to thank everybody who played Kentwell this year for making it one of the most enjoyable seasons I have personally had in rugby and remind the Kentwell team that near enough is not good enough.

JUDD CUP 1980

Until the 13th round the 1980 Judd Cup Team could have been described as one the best sides in recent memory to have never won a match. An unfortunate forfeit by Old Waverlians gave us our first points, points I feel we would have won in any event, as evidenced by our strong effort against Colleagues the following week. Round 15 saw the team crush St. Pats and in round 16 we proved far too good in the mud for Chatswood. As far as points on the board are concerned, those were the highlights of the season but it is notable that the team consistently worried the top sides and lost 7 games by only 6 points or less.

As expected, the talent scouts of the higher grades made lucrative offers to numerous players as soon as they started to produce any form. This would formerly not have had much effect on results, but the overall strength of the Judd Cup competition this year did not allow much opportunity for an unsettled side to win matches.

On the brighter side, all players maintained their spirit and keenness throughout the season making it a most enjoyable one despite the poor results. I was particularly pleased with the number of players who trained on and backed up as reserves for Whiddon Cup in the finals.

Several important lessons can be learnt from this season which, if kept in mind next year, should see the Juddies pulling their weight and matching the higher grades in winning valuable Club Championship points:—

- A firm selection policy for Judd Cup should be laid down and circularised by the Football Committee at the start of the season so that players, coaches and selectors know where they stand from the outset. I am not advocating a "no train no play" policy for Judd Cup but simply that a policy should be decided on by the Committee so that prospective players can be made aware of the degree of commitment required to play Judd Cup as well as to play any other Cup.
- 2. As far as possible Judd Cup should be run as an experimental side. New players should be given an opportunity to try out in a position they nominate, with the seasoned campaigners being prepared to play out of position while the new bloke has a go.
- Judd Cup games can no longer be won by the side which waits for the other side to make mistakes. The higher standard now requires a positive commitment from all players to play to their full abilities in each game.

My thanks to the many players who appeared briefly in Judd Cup before establishing or reestablishing themselves in higher grades, especially Joe Lancuba, Peter Dunlop and Bob Elliott.

Towards the end of the season several higher grade players were forced back into Judd Cup for various reasons, which considerably strengthened the side, including:—

GARRY BRADY. The Club has not yet seen the best of this versatile player — hopefully Garry can be played in his preferred position next season.

SCOTT HIPWELL. Added the much needed lineout ability which we lost with Dunlop's selection in Whiddon.

PETER BOWYER. "Chang" distinguished himself with some sound defence and attack in the latter part of the season.

The following players who played almost all season in Judd Cup deserve mention for their efforts this year:—

BILL BURNS. Young Bill deservedly won the Best and Fairest competition with whole hearted efforts in every game — consistently made breaks but lacked support.

ANDREW STEELE. A close second in the Best and Fairest. Andy is a non-stop footballer who looks like Kentwell material when able to train.

NEIL QUINLAN. A great acquisition to the Club coming third in the Best and Fairest — the highlight of Neil's generally sound game was his aggressive tackling.

JOHN HEALY. Although John played well at prop I feel he will not produce his best until playing in his preferred position.

LAURIE YEOMANS. A student of the "Red-back" school of tactics, Laurie as Vice-captain was a steadying influence throughout the season, occasionally was able to instigate some good backline moves and tackled soundly.

SAM INGUI. A much under-rated player who showed glimpses of better form when moved from the wing — scored a top try from full back against Colleagues.

MICK TAYLOR. A promising new player who showed a lot of talent at full back or wing — can kick goals and will go well in higher grades.

JOHN STOCKS. Another new player with a lot of undeveloped potential who also will play much better in his preferred position.

GREG WEBBER. Starting late in the season, Greg added some much needed penetration to our backline.

Many other players, too numerous to mention, also played Judd Cup this year and I thank them for their efforts, especially in regard to attendance at training.

Finally, I must thank Dave "Hello" Jamieson for the consideration he showed throughout the year for Judd Cup in his selection decisions. Dave's regular Saturday morning phone calls to finalise team selections were a feature of the breakfast B-B-Q at Woronora River.

HOCKEY REPORT

The challenge of 1980 — promotion to 1st Division was met on the whole quite successfully. We finished 6th in the Club Championship out of 10 and up to the second last round still had a chance of making the semi-finals in 1st grade. The 1st grade side finished 7th, one point behind 5th place. The 2nd grade side finished 7th also, although they were 11 points behind 6th place. The 3rds finished last.

Once again we fielded a Junior Side made up of mostly players who had never played before. They made the final of the B grade competition in a magnificent performance.

Perhaps this season with its strongest ever opposition teams has shown us more than ever that only if a team trains as a team can it hope to play good hockey. The Juniors attended Tuesday night training as a team nearly every week and trained in a 3-3-3-1-1 combination and played that way in the match and reached the finals, where playing with 2 men short they only lost 1-0. Apart from the juniors the 1st grade side consistently had over half the team at each training session and performed well throughout the season and were unlucky to lose 2 key players from the team when we were running 4th with 4 games left.

The highlight of the season is the success of the younger players in the A grade side — the under 21 brigade. Colin Huggett, Malcolm Shorter, Lazlow Kovacs, Russell Roberts and John Price all improved throughout the season and were selected in the Sydney Seconds Colts team that competed in the State Championships. Congratulations to these players all of which have come through from our junior sides. Malcolm Shorter even went one better and was later selected in the Sydney Firsts Colts team.

The Kovac brothers, Bob Bauman, Paul McKay and Warren Widger looked after the social side this year, doing an excellent job with the drink and barbecue arrangements at the ground each week and for the Barton trip and barbecue at the Sterry's place. Other social functions unfortunately were not as successful due to the lack of support by the players. Something is wrong with the attitude of most hockey players — this attitude also shows up in training attendance and attitude to the game generally. Do the players want to play top hockey, if so why don't they train — are the players only interested in the social aspects — if so why don't they attend socials or the club generally? Each player appears to want to win as many games as possible and play in the highest grade possible — how can they do that without being fit and without training? With the Club facing possible relegation to 2nd Division next year, it is up to every player to commit himself next year to hockey not some form of Saturday afternoon light entertainment. Surely even for each players sake and not just for the Club wouldn't it be nice to know how well you really could play the game if you were really fit and had trained with the rest of your team on a regular basis.

Coaching again this year was Mike Sterry who filled in the time left after coaching and organising training for both the 3 womens teams, 3 mens teams and 1 Junior team, with being a selector for both the women and mens teams, managing the junior team and being the Fixtures Secretary for the Sydney Hockey Association and Club liaison officer with the Sydney Umpires' Association. Mike has just been appointed Secretary of the New South Wales Indoor Hockey Association. As coach Mike attended 2 coaching courses held by the Coaches Federation during the year and attended most representative hockey matches held in Sydney this year. At the beginning of the season Mike represented New South Wales on the Management Committee for the Australian Indoor Hockey Championships in Melbourne.

Stanley McGuffin assisted Mike at the beginning of the year but had to pull out due to health problems. Everyone is hoping he will be fit and well for next season.

The 1980 season was Briars turn to visit Canberra the home base of the Barton Club. The Rosebuds also came this year and played against a Barton womens team. Rosebuds won and retained the David Walker Trophy. Briars won the B grade 2-1 but predictably lost the 1st grade finding the home side as usual too fast in the second half after several of our players had to back up from the B grade match.

Briars again entered the Manly Carnival and with 10 men through the whole of the Carnival made it to the quarter finals. We were defeated in the quarter finals after finishing 0-0 at full-time on a countback on short corners. We had a goal disallowed a few seconds from full-time to allow Lithgow to move on and win the Carnival.

Bob Streeter again won the Best and Fairest. Steven Schomberg was the Best and Fairest player in 2nd grade and Neil Huggett in 3rd grade.

1ST GRADE REPORT

THE TEAM

LASLO KOVACS (Goalkeeper). Played consistently most of the year. Has a tendency to kick the ball in the air too much. Showed flashes of brilliance during the season i.e., first round match against Gordon. Absorbed a lot of pressure well this year.

GEORGE FREITAS (Full back). Skilful ball player but must get rid of the ball earlier. Lacks fitness but good team man. Needs to bring more variety into his game. Combined well with Robert Wood and Mike Sterry. Regular attender at training.

ROBERT WOOD (Full back). Robert lacks confidence in his own ability. Showed he can play good 1st Division hockey. Improved his hitting and combination work. Would be one of the biggest improvers with team training. One of the keenest trainers.

MICHAEL STERRY (Right half). Too involved with Saturday morning juniors and early afternoon womens matches to give his best performance on the field. Must learn to accept bad umpiring decisions — even if the umpire is incompetent. Tended to become frustrated when he tried moves practiced at training before realising the particular player he expected to understand the move wasn't at training. Must have a better year next year.

BOB STREETER (Captain) (Centre half). The best player in the side again this year. Plays extremely well against orthodox team formations but a bit at sea against other formations. Must mark his centre forward more closely. If Bob can develop the square pass he could make himself and the Briars half line a more integral part of the attack.

NIGEL STERRY (Left half). One of the unsung heroes of the side. His stickwork is excellent and general marking good. Has been accused of not marking his winger — but when one is trying to mark 2 or 3 players one leaves the one man who is the least dangerous. Lacked support from his winger and inside forward for most of the season.

PHILLIP ADAIR (Left wing). This was Phillips first year with the Club. His stickwork and speed were excellent and he scored some fine goals. He needs to combine more with his other forwards and the half line.

COLIN HUGGETT (Inside left). One of the best improvers in the side. At the end of the season seemed to show flashes of brilliance which augurs well for next season. Good attender at training. Would benefit from watching higher grade matches. Another player who would benefit greatly from team training.

MALCOLM SHORTER (Centre forward). Played spasmodic hockey throughout the season. Must learn to adapt his play to the conditions and opposition. Could be the best centre forward in 1st Division with more work on individual and team skills.

ANDRE DECLASE (Inside right). Returned to the Briars after 4 years. Showed his old flair and enthusiasm. He was the most skillful player in the team and was sadly missed at the end of the season. His play suffered due to lack of understanding by our forwards of his setting up of opportunities for other players.

MICHAEL TASS (Inside right). Replaced Andre at the end of the season. Lacks a hit and an ability to score goals. Skillful player who with individual and team training could in combination work with Colin Huggett be the mainstay of our forward build up play. Needs a lot of hard dedication to training next season.

RUSSELL ROBERTS (Right wing). Started off the season as one of the best players but tended to fall off towards the end. Needs to vary his play more and learn to come infield at the appropriate time. Could be one of our best goal scorers next year.

JOHN PRICE (Left wing). Played towards the end of the season in 1st grade. Has great speed and potential. Needs to improve stickwork and teamwork generally. Would benefit greatly from consistent training. Must learn to vary play if things are not running for him. Next season could be Johns best if he wants it to be.

2ND GRADE REPORT

After winning the B grade Second Division last year our hopes were high for a good performance this year although realistically weknew we would meet much stronger opposition.

Unfortunately we lost more games than we won but those statistics do not show the full story. Many games were close or going our way in the first half. DEREK STERRY (Right half). One of the fittest members of the team and hardest workers. Needs to give more thought to his game. Regular trainer.

SANDOR KOVACS (Inside left). Needs to improve positional play and individual skills. Shows flair and unorthodox play that could be moulded into a valuable forward.

ALAN FISHER (Centre forward) (Captain). Always tried hard but found himself heavily marked in most games. Worked well with the rest of his team.

PETER WALLACE (Inside right). Peter has much more potential than he showed this season. Has natural ability and speed and with hard training could have a great year next year.

ROLAND BROWN (Right wing). Has good stickwork and general skills. An injury problem hampered his play and next season should see him improve. Regular trainer.

3RD GRADE REPORT

The improvement shown by the team shows in that semi-final result, for in the second game of the season Baulkham Hills beat Briars 6-1. In fact the team lost its first 3 matches but came back strongly only losing one more match to finish 2nd. This in itself is an outstanding achievement as half the players in the team had never played hockey before.

There were some outstanding individual performances by Colin Huggett who as the Captain inspired the team by example and leadership. Paul Huggett (the 6th member of the family to play hockey for Briars) has been the backbone of the defence with Paul Price and Gerard Price playing magnificently in the forwards. In fact Gerard could develop into one of the best forwards Briars has seen. Colin Huggett at 17 has made the Sydney B Colts this year — well done Colin — and in fact 4 other Briars made the same side — all of them having played hockey in our junior teams.

The most pleasing aspect of the Juniors performance this year is that they have won their games for the right reasons — they train, think and play as a team. At the beginning of the season most opposition teams consisted of players who had several years hockey experience and as individuals were more skillful than our players. The old saying that a good team will beat a team of good players is certainly true in respect of the Juniors.

At the beginning of the season a team formation was constructed to suit the players and the players gradually fitted into their roles. They trained with enthusiasm and there was at least 8 of them each week. Practice was at first devoted to basic skills but for most of the season was based on developing basic moves and team understanding. Practice games against the seniors at training in the last few weeks has made them understand more fully that passing is the best way of beating a more skilful (and faster) player and that passing exists on a 360° plane and not the 90° one employed by most of the senior players.

Unfortunately for the finals 2 of the team were absent and an unfortunate injury has robbed us of another of our players Anthony Farinda who was one of the most consistent players in the side. This cost us the chance of winning the final but even though the side lost I hope that the team will retain their enthusiasm and come back again next year.

SQUASH REPORT

The 1979 — 80 year of Briars Squash was one of changing fortunes. The spring Competition of 1979 provided the Club with a record 3 pennants, whilst in contrast the autumn Competition of 1980 provided us with another record, we didn't win one pennant.

The reasons behind such a contrast in on court performances are providing the selectors and committee with a number of problems. Some facts which come to mind and certainly have a large bearing are — at the end of the spring Competition we lost a total of 6 established A grade players. This was not taken into consideration by the Western Districts grading wizards, who pushed all our recommended gradings up. There was also a noticeable drop off in the number of players attending club practice on Saturdays. Could it be that we thought we were invincible? Or did we just get lazy. At the end of the Spring Competition, Ken Kable was elected to the position of Squash Chairman. This was the third Chairman in as many years and certainly does nothing for the morale or smooth running of the Club.

The Spring 1979 Competition semi-final teams were —

He also won the best performance trophy with an average of 5.54.

What a great team spirit this team had. Every Saturday they would be at practice first and leave last. It was almost enough to get them a pennant. New boy Ken Smith was the real star of the team with 14 wins and no losses, a great effort and one that won him the performance trophy for the year. They looked morals for the pennant, after blasting their apponents off the court in their final. Unfortunately during the finals Ken Bell had a bad fall and tore the ligaments in his good knee. As he was the number 1 player it was decided to let Ken take the court in the Grand Final even though his leg was in plaster up to his hip. This allowed the other players to play in their lower positions. It was a hard decision to make for Grant Heggarty, but one we all agreed was probably the best. Unfortunately the best laid plans, etc., did not come off and the team went down. This left us without a pennant winner for the first time in about 8 years. The principal activity of the Company during the year consisted of promoting and playing amateur sport.
