## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Your Board of Directors and Management Committee present for consideration and adoption by members, this 67th Annual Report of the Club's activities and the financial position for the year ended 30th September, 1985.

A most rewarding year for the Club, five teams made grand finals from three sports, with the 'A' Shire Cricket side the only team to take out a premiership. Financially and the administration were also very sound and it is great to see such a good balance of success in sport and administration.

The Club had a very good year financially with a 9% increase in turnover and a 51% in surplus. This was due to improved gross profit from Bar Trading, up from 38.8% to 47.3%, the increase in revenue from our efforts at the N.S.W. Open Golf held at The Lakes and income from our investments.

The Sporting Chairmen again financially controlled their sports well, with half the proceeds from the N.S.W. Open Golf going towards their budgets. Basketball, in its first year, suffered costs which are non-recurring. Hockey, with their junior program, experienced a greater deficit than expected but I am sure that the financial rewards will be forthcoming in the next few years.

The N.S.W. Open Golf held at The Lakes Golf Course was again a huge success, members and friends raising \$10,660. Congratulations must go to John Threlfo as the convenor, for the first time, while many others gave excellent service and are noted in John's report.

The Club must not lose sight of the fact that we may not have this revenue forever and our fees for sport and members' subscriptions must be realistic, if ever the occasion arose.

The most rewarding part for me this year was the improvement in the sports. Five teams made Grand Finals, unfortunately only one team was successful. Cricket also won the Club Championship for the second time in three years.

Cricket had an outstanding season, the 'A' Shires going through the season undefeated, the 'B' Shires losing the Grand Final and the 'C' Shires winning the end of season round robin plus the winning of the Club Championship. Bill Hooker as Cricket Chairman, plus the respective Captains, Greg Wallace, Peter Richardson and Peter Lucas, are to be congratulated for an excellent season both on and off the field.

Rugby started slowly but a very strong finish saw the Club fifth in the Club Championship, the Grand Final in Kentwell and the semi-final in Whiddon. Kentwell had not made a grand final for twenty years and it was great credit to the coaches, Bruce Robinson and Rex Harris, to achieve this result. Tony Wozniak returned to Football Chairman and did a first class job.

Hockey, under the Chairmanship of Robert Wood, showed improvement both on and off the field. Although semi's were not reached, we were able to field three senior sides and two junior sides. It was the first time for many seasons that Hockey had a coach and there was a marked improvement in A Grade because of this fact. Hockey moved from Burwood Park after nearly 30 years and are now playing at the Cumberland College of Health Sciences Ground at Lidcombe. Robert Wood deserves special mention for steering Hockey in the right direction.

Squash again is in the doldrums, with one team in the summer competition and two teams in the winter competition. As mentioned in the last report, the squash members are most apathetic and if this carries on for too long they will self destruct.

Basketball proved a great success for its first year, starting with three teams, two making the Grand Final. The winter comp. grew to five teams plus three women's teams playing under the Briars banner. Congratulations to Steve Schomberg for his excellent efforts during the year and I am sure premierships are not that far away.

Golden Oldies, under the control of John Staniforth, embarked on a one month tour to England and the Continent in September. A party of fifty people were on tour and from all reports, a great success. This tour was a two-year project and John is to be congratulated not only for the success of the tour but bringing older members back to the Club, who would normally not return, after retiring from competitive Rugby.

The Club sponsored a Women's Netball side during the year and it would be hoped that this will continue in the future.

The Briars Tennis Day was held again at the St. Lukes Oval Tennis Courts. Over 60 people played but unfortunately the inclement weather caused the tournament to be washed out in the afternoon. This Annual event is proving very successful.

There was a big improvement in the social scene, with record numbers attending the Annual Ball and Annual Dinner. The Annual Ball was held at the STC Centre, Canterbury Race-course, with 260 people attending and the Annual Dinner had over 230 people listening to the guest speaker, Mr. Alan Jones, of rugby fame. Other social innovations such as a Trot Night at Harold Park, Car Rally and Club Room functions, proved outstanding successes. John Price proved a very worthy Social Chairman.

Focus is a much read publication and the comments I receive, especially from older members, is gratifying. Gerard Price, the Editor, and Col Dennis, Advertising, have done an excellent job. The improvement to the printing and mailing of Focus by Grant Heggarty has reduced our costs, a problem which had arisen over the past two years.

The upgrading of the Club Rooms again has been carried out during the year, with the

external painting of the Club and repairs to the ground floor. Being an old building, constant watch will have to be made so as we are not caught with major repairs.

The membership of the Club decreased slightly during the year as shown below. Marty Watts again organising new members' meetings, did a good job.

The Club has now produced a brochure for the recruitment of juniors. Already the Club members have been attending local schools under the guidance of Marty Watts and I am sure results will be noticed in the 1986 season.

The Club has now put its mailing list on computer and with the constant change of addresses, additions and deletions, our records are now in very good shape and will be a future cost saving – many thanks to Grant Heggarty.

The Golf Day was returned to the sporting calendar by Barry Cardwell and Steve Bardwell at Blackheath Golf Club. Over thirty people attended, showing that it is a popular day and it would be hoped that it will continue on a regular basis.

During the year, two management members retired, Nigel Sterry - Hockey and Peter Dunlop - Rugby. Many thanks for a job well done.

I would be remiss in not mentioning two members who have given sterling service over the years, one retiring, one continuing. The first is Col (Cricket) Jones who is the Honorary Club Auditor and has held the position since 1963, a position which gets very little recognition but is of great importance. Col's years of experience have been a great benefit to the Board and is one of the longest-serving members in an Honorary capacity in the history of the Club — many thanks Col for a job well done and may you carry on the good work for many years to come.

The second is the retiring Honorary Executive Officer, Craig Hickey. Craig has been a member of management since 1967, starting out as assistant treasurer. He has been football chairman twice, Honorary Assistant Executive Officer and finally the Honorary Executive Officer. Over this period, Craig has always been a Club man through and through and always made sure that the Club came first. He received respect from Board and Management with his years of experience, and members were quickly put in their place who unjustifiably 'knock' the Club. I, for one, have appreciated Craig's work and he has been a great help over the past three years. I am sure we all wish Craig a happy retirement. As I retire at the Annual General Meeting, I would like to thank Board, Management and the members for their co-operation during my term. It is good to see such a good balance of success in administration and sport – it is something which Briars should be proud of.

In conclusion, we record our appreciation for support received from our municipal authorities in Burwood and Concord Councils and the Cumberland College of Health Sciences for the use of their oval during the year.

We extend our congratulations to the successful clubs with whom we have competed and to the others for the opportunity of enjoying our sporting contact.

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#### CRICKET REPORT

#### SEASON 1984 - 1985

It is with pleasure, and pride, that I am able to write the Chairman's Report for the above Season. After the 'let-downs' of the 1983/84 Season when we knew we were the best, but failed to show the results – we are now able to say we are the best, and have the results to prove it !

The achievements of the 1984-85 Season were:

- A Shires Premiers with an undefeated record
- B Shires Minor Premiers and Finalist
- C Shires winners of the Limited Over Competition after finishing a creditable 6th in the Premiership
- Club Championship Trophy winners
- Winners of the 'Tooheys Cup' 7s competition for the first time.

Success doesn't happen overnight, this Season has been a culmination of many years' efforts. The foundation stone was the establishment of the junior cricket of Croydon — Briars under Kevin Holley and Aldo Cantori, its nurturing and development by Peter Mansford, and the establishment of a close working relationship with Wests for the development of aspiring youth by the late Dave Brooks. There is no doubt in my mind that without the effort of the aforementioned in fostering youth into Briars' cricket, we would now be a 'spent' force and not the 'king-pins' of today.

The effort of the A Shires was absolutely fantastic. From the outset of the Season, they showed that they meant business. I will leave it to Greg Wallace to do the boasting in his Report, however, let me say that, like many of the older Briars, I was very proud to watch the ability and professional competitiveness that the team displayed throughout the Season. A team as gifted with talent as our current A Shires is, can only perform to the heights they have achieved with the right leadership and drive – Greg Wallace is a gifted Captain who displayed all the characteristics of the fine cricketer we know him to be. With Greg at the helm, the future is most promising.

To Peter Richardson and the B Shires team, as 'front-runners' throughout the Season they had the Premiership taken out of their grasp by a solid and determined Canterbury 10th wicket in the Final. The team performed well to get the results, however, there was a tendency to rely far too heavily upon the performances of Steve Staplefeldt – a cricketer who, with a little perserverance, is headed for a lot higher grade of cricket. Let this, however, not detract from the wonderful performance of the team – it takes eleven players to reach a Final – well done fellas, for a fine effort.

The C Shires under the leadership of Peter Lucas and later in the Season, Peter Wallace, performed remarkably well up to the last few rounds, then seemed to falter. However, the end of Season Limited Over Competition saw them again collect lost form to win the Bill Kirsop Shield.

The C & S team's performances during the year were most promising, with the ledger being well and truly in the positive. A stronger core of players capably led by Colin Dennis, Ian Blair and Craig Hickey, has ensured that Briars are able to field competitive opposition in this competition. My thanks to Col Dennis for his dedication in ensuring that another season was enjoyed by all.

On the social side we toured to Wagga over the New Year weekend only to be greeted by, yes again ! - rain ! The tour was naturally disappointing but nevertheless enjoyable - my thanks to Dave and Jann Scoble for the warm hospitality that always awaits us in Wagga.

With BBQ's at the Price household, Steve and Rhonda Schomberg's, and the End of Season function, a close-knit Club was enhanced by such enjoyable evenings – my thanks to all those that offered their houses and services.

The development and introduction of youth into our ranks via the Western Suburbs District Cricket Club was again a telling attribute to our success – Lance Brooks, Mal Croughton and the West's Committee my sincere appreciation. May the close relationship between the Clubs continue to prosper in the years to come. The Dave Brooks Memorial Trophy was founded during the season as a perpetual trophy for the annual SCG game between the two Clubs – in a close game, Wests took out the inaugural honours.

The successes of the past Season were only possible due to the dedicated work of the Committee. My sincere thanks and appreciation to the aforementioned captains, Steve Schomberg, Rod Smith, Gerard Price, Peter Wallace and Peter Mansford, for their help and guidance during the Season.

I am sure Ted Stockdale would be in agreement that, the A Shires, apart from their on-field exploits, excelled themselves in the "afternoon tea" stakes. However, a good "spread" is only rewarded with a Ted Stockdale brew of tea – again, we are indebted to Ted for his loyal support and assistance.

## "A" SHIRE CRICKET REPORT 1984-1985

What an unbelievable season ! Burwood A Grade Shires began the season with a few new faces, a new captain and, most importantly, a whole new attitude. Most players felt they had something to prove after the ordinary team and individual performances of the previous summer. We knew we were the best team in the competition and we were going to make sure every other team had no doubts about it either. This confidence began at the end of the 1983-84 season, when we annihilated each team in the Consolation Cup for the teams not in the Semi-Finals.

Further motivation came at the 1984 Annual Dinner when the "Invincibles" of the 1964 Briars Rugby team were reunited and presented to the Club. We knew we could match their unbeaten record in our forthcoming season and decided, even at that early stage, to be known as the "Unbeatables" when we accomplished this feat. It is now history that we, not only were unbeaten, but proved beyond any doubt that we were far and away the best team in Shires cricket for many years.

Our superiority was not confined to one area of the game or attributed to one or two players. We were outstanding in all four aspects of cricket – batting, bowling, fielding and attitude. This was easy to do as success in one area easily led to success in other areas.

Burwood's batting was very strong, the team scoring in excess of 250 runs in 12 of the 15 games and losing all ten wickets only twice during the rounds. Our bowling was always accurate and penetrating and rarely did an opposing batsman look in control of the situation. As a result only one team scored more than 200 runs against us. The bowlers were well supported by some excellent catching and fielding. Several catches were dropped in the first two games, but after that, only 3 catches were dropped, and 68 taken, for the rest of the season. A remarkable effort that, but it must be attributed to the increase of fielding practice at trainings on Wednesday afternoons.

Burwood's attitude was also excellent. Things like arriving at practice on Wednesdays, taking a share of the responsibilities of organising team gear and setting up the ground for play, all go towards helping a team get in the right frame of mind for the afternoon's cricket. Each player's determination to succeed and confidence in both his and his team mates' abilities ensured that Burwood was going to claim their rightful place at the top of the competition.

The season culminated in one of our most dominating displays. In the final, Burwood recovered from a bad start (2-8) to score a mammoth 398, then bowled Lane Cove out for 139.

#### The Team -

Garry Schomberg set a club record by scoring the most runs in A grade in a season (809), bettering the old record by 87 runs. He also figured in an unbeaten partnership of 264 runs with Greg Wallace in the opening match of the season against Bexley, for another club record.

Garry batted magnificently throughout the season, scoring three centuries and regularly tearing the opposition attack apart. His better scores were 132 n.o., 64, 91, 155, 52 n.o., 57 and 134 n.o. Garry also took some great reflex catches at short leg and generally fielded very well.

**Greg Wallace** enjoyed his first season as captain tremendously. It was easy to captain a team in such great form and one that wanted to win so much. Opening the batting, Greg also passed the previous A grade record by scoring 733 runs, including two centuries. As well as the club record partnership with Garry Schomberg, Greg showed his experience by figuring in eight century partnerships throughout the season, including one in both the semi-final and final. His better scores were, 129 n.o., 129 n.o., 96, 72 and 66. Greg also bowled leg spin on occasion and took several vital wickets.

Steve Schomberg loves winning. His attitude to sport is one that inspires all those around him to achieve better results as he always gives a one hundred percent effort and never entertains a negative thought. He would be an asset to any team and is a model for all players in the club to look to. Steve always bowled with great accuracy and had all batsmen in trouble with the amount of swing and cut he achieved. He took at least 4 wickets in an innings on six occasions, his best performance being 5 wickets for 13 runs, off 14 overs against Auburn in a limited over match. As well as his excellent bowling Steve scored two half centuries and took many fine slips catches.

**Bart Pozuelo** scored 626 runs this season, including two centuries. His 130 in the final combined a determined defence with many glorious attacking shots and was the backbone of Burwood's massive score of 398. His better scores were 133, 92, 68, 57 and 130. Bart also opened the bowling and made plenty of opposing batsmen look second rate with his accurate outswingers. His best performance was in the semi-final when he took 5 wickets in 10 overs to help dismiss Warringah for 92.

**Claudio Orlando** was a wonderful inspiration to the team with his enthusiastic wicket-keeping. His keenness and faultless keeping was a big part in Burwood being the best fielding side in the competition. Claudio also batted well when he was given a chance late in the season. In the final, Claudio scored his initial A grade half-century with a well compiled 72 and figured in a partnership of 142 with Bart Pozuelo.

**Richard Tregeagle** struggled to get wickets early in the season. The first two games on lifeless pitches followed by four washed out games, saw Richard with only one wicket by Christmas. Generally his bowling was up to his usual high standard but luck continually deserted him. Richard always gave a one hundred percent effort in his bowling, fielding and batting and showed himself to be among the best ground fieldsmen in Shires cricket.

Rod Smith was the mainstay of our slow bowling attack. He showed clever variation in

flight, length and direction and was rewarded with many wickets, including 10 in the match against Roseville. Rod contributed a few useful scores with the bat, his best being a whirlwind 62 not out against Macquarie University when quick runs were needed.

**Gerard Price** batted very consistently this season. In 13 innings, Gerard was only dismissed 8 times and only failed twice. His fine batting often enabled Burwood to convert a reasonable total into a very good score. This was especially evident against Macquarie University when he scored 68 not out and combined with Rod Smith in a partnership of 115 in only 58 minutes. Gerard, both as vice-captain and as the team's best fieldsman, encouraged everyone to attain a high standard of fielding.

**Peter Siebels** was one of the finds of the season. In his first season as an opening batsman and his first season in A Shires, he proved to be a more than capable and very determined cricketer. His batting went from strength to strength as his self-confidence increased, as did his fielding. His better scores were 80, 58 and 54. It was unfortunate for the team that Peter couldn't finish the season because of Aussie Rules commitments.

**Nigel Sterry** bowled very consistently throughout the season and often had opposing batsmen struggling against his accurate bowling. He had particularly fine games against Strathfield and Lane Cove twice. The highlight of his season was the five wickets he took in the final to drive the last nail into the overwhelmed Lane Cove team.

**Paul Price** improved tremendously as a middle-order batsman this season. He has a very good technique and will continue to improve as his confidence increases. Paul's season finished on a high note, as he scored his first A grade half-century in the final. He began his innings with the score at 2 for 8, but scored an elegant 53, combining with Greg Wallace in a partnership of 116 to get us out of trouble. Paul's fielding was very enthusiastic. He took three excellent catches on the long-on boundary, one of which he held even after colliding with the fence and breaking two ribs.

Ian Blair came out of retirement to fill in several times during the season and held his position for both the semi-final and final. It was very pleasing to have lan in the premiership winning team as he has contributed so much to Briars Sporting Club over the years and more particularly to the A Shire's cricket team as captain for the last 8 years.

**Bill Hooker**, as Cricket Chairman for the past 2 years, is greatly responsible for the club spirit that is obvious in Briars Cricket teams. His organisational and administrative skills, together with hard work, make everything run smoothly and his keenness for the game of cricket has rubbed off onto all players. Thank you for a job well done. Bill also played one A grade match, scored a valuable 19 runs and fielded very effectively.

Ted Stockdale was Burwood's number one supporter. It is so important to have someone as

enthusiastic, experienced and reliable as Ted to organise the afternoon teas and give the players encouragement and advice when it is needed.

Andrew Macky, Dave Young and David Jamieson all gave their best when they played in the team. Their effort was appreciated.

And now to 1985-86, another successful season !

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## "B" SHIRE CRICKET REPORT 1984-1985

The "B" Shires team continued in the 1984/85 season as a major force in the competition, completing the preliminary rounds as minor premiers and advancing to the finals for the fourth time in the last five years. However, for the second consecutive year the team was denied the ultimate achievement by the slimmest of margins.

Undoubtedly, the strength of the side was based on a particularly effective middle and lower batting order centred around David Young, David Jamison, David Trewin, Steve Stapelfeldt and David Baccarini regularly filling the positions from 3rd to 7th wicket, with the last three, together with Adam Lax, when available, providing an efficient bowling attack supported once again by above average fielding capabilities. In a team, which over recent years, has derived its success as a result of the harmonious blending of the talents and enthusiasm of individuals, it would be remiss this season not to mention the outstanding individual performances of Steve Stapelfeldt, which are dealt with in greater detail in the player profiles and statistics.

Having completed the preliminary rounds as worthy minor premiers, the path through to the finals met with considerable misfortune and distuption, as a result of injuries to David Jamison (semi-final), Adam Lax (both games) and captain Peter Richardson, who was unable to participate in the second day of the final as a result of a car accident. Despite these adversities, the team responded particularly well in two games of typically fluctuating fortunes.

In a rain delayed semi-final at Roseville Park, Burwood lost the toss and having been asked to bat on a difficult wicket we were in immediate trouble at 3 for 2, and later, 6 for 41 (David Young 34) before a typical rearguard acting from Steve Stapelfeldt (27), David Trewin (29), David Baccarini (70) and not the least at all, Adam Lax, who contributed 17 not out in a last wicket partnership of 72, saw the side reach a well-compiled 203. The following week Roseville, under sustained pressure, failed to respond to the challenge reaching only 135 after, at one stage being 8 for 41 (Adam Lax 4 for 16 off 14 overs, Steve Stapelfeldt 5 for 54 off 24 overs).

The final was played against our old adversaries, Canterbury at Lance Hutchinson Oval. Winning the toss, Burwood elected to bat and were comfortably placed at 4 for 125 (Peter Mansford 20, Paul Simpson 23 and David Young 32) before an uncharacteristic middle and late order collapse culminated in a final score restricted to a moderate 165, of which David Jamison contributed a solid 45. In the time that remained on the first day, Canterbury appeared set for a large first innings total with an opening stand of 58, before David Trewin with a totally inspired performance, bowled well above his ability to have the opposition in trouble at 6 for 90 at stumps. The match was thus evenly poised as it entered the second day, but with three quick wickets from Steve Stapelfeldt for only one run, Canterbury were 42 runs in arrears with only one wicket in hand. In a tense session prior to lunch, the final paid gradually whittled away the deficit to pass our total and lead by 15 runs. The efforts of David Trewin (4 for 56 off 24 overs) and Steve Stapelfeldt (5 for 71 off 32 overs) were particularly fine performances. In a desperate effort to secure a win in the time that remained, Burwood declared at 7 for 149 off 30 overs, but on a docile wicket we were unable to make significant inroads into Canterbury's second innings, which reached 4 for 132 at the close of play. Congratulations to Canterbury on a well deserved win.

Despite the disappointment of the final day, the B's derived particular satisfaction in contributing to the winning of the club championship. Our congratulations also to Greg Wallace and his youthful A side for their achievement in winning the A Grade premiership in such a dominating manner.

Once again, thanks to Bill Hooker, who contributed so much to the achievement during the year through his usual efficient administration of the sport, to my fellow selectors for the hours of thoughtful deliberation which took place behind the scenes, and to Ted Stockdale and Chris Mitchell for their continued and very much appreciated support.

The players who contributed most to the team during the season were as follows:-

**Peter Richardson (Captain)** – Experienced a comparatively poor season with the bat, on seven occasions failing to reach double figures and on no occasion taking his score beyond 30. Disappointing season culminating in missing the second day of the final after aggravating a nagging lower back injury. Recaptured form of old in taking ten catches close to the wicket in the latter half of the season.

**Peter Mansford** — Joined the B's in the ninth round after early unavailability for business reasons, and immediately proceeded to give the stability to the early batting, being dismissed cheaply only once in eight completed innings. The unflappable manner in which Peter goes about his game provides staunch support and an example to a team where youth predominates.

**Paul Simpson** — Still at school, Paul in his first year with the club showed considerable promise. Despite giving the appearance of a lack of concentration early in his innings, was most consistent. However, needs to apply himself into converting a good start into bigger scores as evidenced by his inability to carry any of his nine entries into the 20's, to a score of 40 or more.

**David Young** — Started the season in good form earning a promotion to the A's in midseason. Later returned to the side and demonstrated the "big match" temperament missing in previous years, with confident innings in the finals series; in particular, his aggressive innings of 34 on a rain-affected wicket against Roseville in the semi-final set the side on the path to recovery, after a disastrous start.

**David Jamison** – After a period of hibernation in C. & S, David returned to Shires and immediately impressed with consistent batting displays in the middle order, often being called upon to bolster the batting after moderate starts by the earlier batsmen. This was no better exemplified than in the final when David played a virtual lone hand during a late order first innings collapse, scoring 45 valuable runs in a most determined manner. A most welcome return to the Shire's fold from this experienced player.

**David Trewin** – Together with David Jamison, provided the stability in the lower order, so often needed. Very much suited to wickets with the ball coming on to the bat, David has an ability to score runs freely in the arc from backward square to mid wicket, a skill not often seen in this grade of cricket. Although not a prolific wicket taker, David's bowling was marked by a determination which is a characteristic of his whole approach to the game, no better evidenced than in the final, where in the absence of Adam Lax, our main strike bowler, David gave a typical wholehearted performance, providing the spearhead late on the first day to have Canterbury reeling at stumps, after a good start. Took some very good catches in slips and showed his good all-round cricket knowledge in providing thoughtful advice as vice-captain.

**Steve Stapelfeldt** – The 1984/85 season witnessed the conversion of Steve Stapelfeldt from a player of immense raw potential into a mature, thinking cricketer who was unquestionably the outstanding player of the side and arguably of the B Shire competition. In statistical terms, Steve headed the averages and aggregates for both batting and bowling; however, his full value lies in the manner of his performance with an exceptional ability to turn a match with both bat and ball. This was illustrated in the game against Lane Cove, who after proceeding comfortably to be 1 for 67, were suddenly 6 for 67, after Steve burst upon the scene with 4 wickets off consecutive balls. Undoubtedly, Steve will not contribute significantly to the group of outstanding young cricketers who currently comprise our A grade side.

**David Baccarini** — After a slow start given limited opportunities with the bat, when six completed innings produced only 40 runs, David proceeded to a late season onslaught, culminating in a magnificent 70 in the semi-final, when with admirable support from the tail enders, converted a precarious score line of 7 for 90 to a total of 203. Proved a reliable,

economical first change support to the opening bowlers with the ability to secure a vital breakthrough. Continued to provide a good example to others with his anticipation in the covers.

Adam Lax – In a season dogged by unavailability, Adam nevertheless, contributed significantly in the games he played including hauls during the preliminary rounds of seven and six wickets respectively against the ultimate semi-finalists Canterbury and Roseville. Adam continued his exceptional record in the end of season big matches in taking 4 for 16 off 14 overs in the semi-final, before succumbing to a severe ankle injury which precluded his participation in the final.

**Brett Smith** — Joined the side as wicket-keeper in the fifth round, and particularly in the initial stages, showed glimpses of potential which if to be fully realised, needs to be combined with a higher level of concentration. In limited opportunities with the bat, helped save the side from trouble on a couple of occasions. Often contributed to the development of the team's senior players with helpful advice.

**Paul Lang** – A dedicated young player in his first year with the club. Apart from a particularly fine innings of 60 not out on an under-prepared wicket against Warringah, experienced some difficulty on the quicker paced wickets, a problem which should be alleviated with more experience.

**Peter Wallace** – Perhaps lacking the pace and consistency necessary for a front line opening bowler in B's, nevertheless Peter is an honest toiler with the ability to provide the occasional unplayable ball. A good team man, Peter was particularly sound in the field, taking a couple of very good outfield catches.

Other players making limited appearances in the season were Mark Wright (6 games), Craig Smith (5), Paul Price (4), Brad Wilson (3), Paul Mattick (3), Andrew Macky (3), Garry Holmes (2), Brett Howle (2), Alan Thompson (2) and Peter Siebels (1).

## "C" SHIRE CRICKET REPORT 1984-1985

After being runners-up in the 1983-84 season great expectations were held for the new season for "C" shires. Despite having a number of new faces to settle into the team the season could not have started better. We beat the young Epping III's outright in the first round and then defeated the formidable Epping I's on first innings in Round 3. This was a particularly pleasing result as we rolled their strong batting line up for only 147 and despite a minor middle-order collapse, passed their score with the loss of only six wickets.

Round 4 saw us playing Warringah at Weldon. This saw the usual "C" grade collapse after being 1 for 113 we were all out for 152. However, rain and bad light prevented our bowlers having a crack at the Warringah batsmen.

With a few games under their belts, a couple of the new boys were ready to show their potential. After winning the toss against Wentworthville, we declared at 6 for 276, Brett Howle and Brad Pillinger batting superbly for  $75 \times \& 51$  respectively. However, their innings were overshadowed by a magnificent 95 by Paul Mattick. Paul then struck with three quick wickets at the end of the first day. We easily obtained the first innings points on the second day. However, if we had not dropped 14 catches on the second day, we would have had a very easy outright.

The next match saw the old hands, Peter Mansford, Ian Blair and Bill Hooker tear the Lindfield bowlers apart as we built up a score of 4 dec. for 269. In spite of a late start the second week we dismissed Lindfield for 129. We set Lindfield 141 to win off 18 overs. A number of dropped catches enabled Lindfield to obtain the outright. We had butchered another outright.

The last before Christmas saw us field a weakened side against Pennant Hills. Numerous dropped catches saw Pennant Hills score 288 with M. Clarke and C. Smith putting in gallant bowling performances in the heat. Two stupid run-outs and most batsmen getting starts but not going on with the job saw Michael Clarke join Herman Hipiteuw at the crease with the score at 9 for 243, with defeat seemingly close at hand. However, with Clarkey showing batting skill never seen before, he and Hermy moved the score past the 250, then 260 and then towards 270. Everyone started to ask "could Herman and Clarkey do the near impossible and score the runs to snatch victory". Unfortunately, Herman was dismissed just 15 runs short of victory. Clarkey, whose previous highest score for the club was 4 not out, remained unbeaten on 12. In doing so he had more than doubled his runs in Shires cricket.

To say our results after Christmas were overall disappointing is an understatement. Negative cricket against Lane Cove cost an outright after dismissing them for 50 in the first innings. Dropped catches allowed Canterbury to score 285. After Canterbury agreed to forfeit their second innings we declared our first innings at 9 for 85. We snatched outright points with some brilliant second innings batting by C. Smith (50x), T. Bikou (56) and P. Lucas (42).

We defeated Auburn easily in a one-day game but once again we dropped a number of catches.

Then the wheels really fell off. A number of catches were dropped to allow lowly placed Roseville to score 330. Poor first innings batting left us with no chance of gaining points. Then poor batting saw us score only 163 against Strathfield which was just not enough.

This meant that we needed to beat leaders Baulkham Hills outright to ensure a place in the semi-finals. On a cold afternoon we were put into bat and were all out for 150. However, we struck back to have Baulkham Hills 4 for 24 at stumps. Unfortunately, on a hot second day, some inept bowling and fielding saw Baulkham Hills score 254, to end any chance of us making the semi-finals.

So what went wrong? Certainly our fielding during the season was at best, disgusting. We dropped over 80 catches during the season. YES 80 CATCHES DROPPED !!! But the most disappointing part of the season was the lack of commitment by some players. On numerous occasions players would arrive at the ground just prior to the commencement of play. The most disturbing thing was that this was often the more senior members of the team.

I hope the "C" grade captain for the 1985-86 season is given 100 percent commitment and support by his players.

I must thank Bill Hooker, Greg Wallace, Steve Schomberg and Peter Richardson for their support during the season.

Peter Lucas: Paid the price late in the season of trying to play with injuries.

Herman Hipiteuw (V-Capt) (Wkt): Started the season in good form but unfortunately joined the rest of the team in dropping vital catches.

**Paul Mattick:** Except for his 95 against Wenty had a disappointing season with the bat. Bowled superbly early in the season before going to B's. The best fieldsman in the team.

Alan Thompson: Still one of the best "C" grade bowlers in Shires cricket. Brought laughter to the rest of the team in his attempts to get his body behind the ball when fielding.

**Michael Clarke:** Continues to improve as a spin bowler. Showed what a class bat he is with fine innings of 12x and 4x against Pennant Hills and Epping II's respectively. Gary Schomberg beware, Clarkey is gunning for your spot.

**Craig Smith:** Earned the status of an all-rounder with his performances during the season. Must learn to control his language on the field.

**Tom Bikou:** New player to the club. Proved himself to be a very strong leg-side player. Must work a lot harder on his fielding.

Brett Howle: Had a successful first-up season as a middle-order batsman. Must work harder on his fielding.

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## **CITY & SUBURBAN CRICKET REPORT**

#### SEASON 1984-1985

During the intensive and emotionally charged team meetings that were held early in the season, the strategists determined that the gentlemen of the C. & S. should set out to achieve the following personal and team objectives.

- 1. To eliminate bickering and spiteful comments.
- 2. To get to the game at least before the completion of the first over.
- 3. Having won on the field, to not subsequently lose more than one match as a result of the scorebook failing to balance in our favour.
- 4. To show more racial tolerance.

Now it should be noted that the Official Captain attempted to have included performance related objectives. To do with things like batting, bowling, catching, running between wickets and suchlike. The strategists, having taken counsel from The Honourable Mitchell, pooh-poohed such suggestions and a motion of no-confidence in the Official Captain was carried unanimously for the fifth straight season, which took care of objective number five on the spot.

Just before commencing the preparation of this report, I spoke with the teams Cabinet, so that there could be some real consensus about how we had performed in meeting these objectives.

I will just have to wait until everyone's talking again, before I can make any further analysis of how successful we were in handling the number one objective. But the side did settle down and we only lost the first four matches before stunning the Cricketers Club with a great victory at Rothwell Park.

Mr. Ian Blair hardly said a nasty word in scoring 62 runs in majestic fashion. Indeed the whole said was really happy, even though the Cricketers Club had lost their second wicket prior to the arrival of both our opening bowlers, together with Messrs. Hickey and Priday as I recall, who were pretty angry that the Official Captain had allowed proceedings to get away at 1.40 p.m. without them.

Objective two was discussed again at the tea break. But amidst some spiteful comments, they claimed that they were at the ground having a smoke in the shed before the end of the first over, so that they were technically within the terms of the objective. You can't give these people any room. Both opening bowlers on this day, Mr. David Guille and Mr.

David Wright had modest success this season, but Mr. Wright's several good performances earned him enough in match payments to abandon his teaching responsibilities and set off around the world for nine months.

Although neither Mr. Wright nor Mr. Guille topped the bowling performances, statistically the averages were a triumph for our new found racial tolerance.

Two gentlemen of Ethnic origin headed the lists for the first time and even Mr. Ireland and Dr. Walker were complimentary about their command of English.

Both Nick and Terry, as they prefer to be addressed performed consistently well. Nick topped the bowling and ran up 205 runs for the season as well. Terry qualified for C. & S. history with consecutive sixes off the last two balls of the match to defeat Old Sydnians, and actually enjoyed fielding, which is even more remarkable.

Sadly, some of Nick's quieter moments in the field tended to produce some ugly Ockerisms. The team defended a rebuke by the Official Captain, claiming constructive criticism. But some damage was inflicted on objectives one and four. Some of these better performances had, by mid-season, lifted our performance to such an extent that our record showed five wins from eleven matches. Quite a turnaround. But disaster was only narrowly averted in the match against Yaralla when former gentleman, Mr. Peter Burt took charge of the score book. Only a runner and the team's internal Auditor saved us. Leaving objective three intact; but only just.

Once again the team rallied against the Official Captain, arguing that they were appalled that a non-player should have been placed in charge of the book, in a crucial match, when both of his sons were at the wicket and with Mr. Holley as the supervisor.

Fortunately, the Official Captain's Mum and Dad were present, so the final vote was only ten to three in the team's favour. Mr. Holley incidentally made eight welcome appearances and looks like a future Official Captain. He was, however, not present several matches later, when Mr. Peter Burt again slipped in, unnoticed to the scoring seat. Objective three was not threatened at all on this occasion as he managed to turn defeat into a draw, but I am not going to identify the match as the Trade Practices people are just itching for some action. And so the season wore on, and the objectives became more strained. Mr. Watts, filling in as Official Captain won some tosses, but lost sight of Objective One when he actually yelled at the players about their poor performance. All out for 55 is not so bad.

I understand Mr. Chegwyn, with a double figure score on the day, started a walk out. It was only the cool heads of Mr. Colin and Mr. David Blair, who both wanted a bowl, that restored some harmony. They both got an over each, which seemed fair enough.

It's hard to fathom the team's standards at times. On one occasion, they turned on Mr. Kersey (who took six extremely valuable wickets) over his cap, which is not precisely in the

Briar's colours. It's a great cap, colourful, flamboyant and Mr. Kersey wears it with great dignity. But I was accused of biassed mateship and told to smarten up my attitudes. They insisted that he be fined heavily by our St. George opponents, and he was, leaving the Official Captain without any respect at all. Having attained a near 50% winning record at Christmas, we subsequently held onto that, finishing with ten wins from the twenty-three completed matches, with two drawn games.

I would expect that Mr. Ireland's form will return next season, and it's probably time for him to be rewarded with a new position in the batting line-up.

Mr. Yeomans continues to plug away economically and should be left to bowl for longer spells. Mr. Guille was troubled by the onset of old age elbow and if not fully recovered next season, might bowl some slow stuff.

I'd like to see Mr. Moller more available, as we could use his penetration. Dr. Walker will continue to amaze us with his great keeping skills for some time to come, and should enjoy the job next season, with the promise of keeping to Mr. Ross Howarth, who really looks the goods as an off-spinner. He'll bag plenty of wickets if we can entice him out on a regular basis.

The Official Captain plans to play some golf next summer, but will, no doubt, be available to take seven wickets in an innings again, somewhere. The new Official Captain can look forward to the same support that I have received, as I now move into the Inner Cabinet and onto the Strategy Board.

# Football Annual Report (Contd.)

Without doubt, the highlight of the season was the performance of the Kentwell Cup side. Although beaten in the Grand Final, it was Briars first appearance in the decider for twenty years. More important, was the style of play adopted by the side. To succeed in pressure football, you must have as many options as possible. Traditionally, Briars have been strong in forward play. This last season, Kentwell added backline play, scoring many existing tries, surprising our opposition, who had grown used to our style of play. The credit for adopting the fifteen man rugby style of play must go to Bruce Robinson and his assistant Rex Harris. Both have spent innumerable hours studying Briars and opposition teams styles of play, enabling them to maximise Kentwell's performance. The pleasure that both players and spectators derived from Kentwell this season was due to the dedication of Bruce and Rex – thank you.

Our Whiddon Cup players appear to like to perform every five years; this year's side made the semis for the first time since 1980. Prior to that, it was 1975. The side was consistent throughout the season, peaking close to the semis. However, success eluded them when it was required.

Our other sides had mixed seasons, at times giving hope of success at play off time, only to mix good performances with mediocrity. Peter Dunlop emphasised the need to win in last year's report; we have not accomplished this object as yet. While participation and effort form part of the overall Rugby philosophy, it is the <u>need to win</u> which <u>must prevail</u>. This can only come from the players themselves, no-one else.

If we didn't win cups, it was no fault of our coaching staff. The efforts of Bruce and Rex, I have mentioned. Dusty Saunders' performance in getting Whiddon to the semis was very commendable and the effort and dedication of Phil England, Warren Rann and Billy Burns was not rewarded by our on-field performances.

One competition which we won hands down was in team management. David Blair, Charlie Williams, Ray Tuffin and Doug Staniforth's efforts were magnificent. As if managing a rugby team is not a large enough contribution, each participated in other areas:-

- \* David Blair, member of the Sydney Suburban Rugby Union Executive Committee.
- \* Charlie Williams, helped the running of the home game canteen.
- \* Ray Tuffin, Club trainer, responsible for the low injury toll the club has experienced over the last two seasons.
- \* Doug Staniforth, purchased all Rugby gear, set-up of home games, jointly ran home games canteen.

Briars Rugby was well served by its committee in 1985. The efforts can be highlighted as follows:-

- \* Financially, Rugby more than met its budget. The home game canteen attained record takings, which reflects the work of Chris Murray and Doug Staniforth. Other major fund-raising activities were carried out by Larry Thompson, through one major raffle plus raffles at each home game.
- \* A pre-season recruitment campaign attracted new faces to the club, including Kentwell Cuppers, Gary Neate, Greg Mitchell and Ross MacLean. The brains behind the campaign was Bruce Robinson, while John Jessup carried out the logistics to perfection. J.J. also proved his versatility by being deputy chairman as well as Jaffle maker.
- \* Rugby continued to support all club functions, with major support for both the annual ball and the Briars Dinner. One aspect which has deteriorated is the after match social participation by players. I believe this aspect is here to stay, as it is a common symptom amongst all Rugby clubs, in the main due to R.B.T.

To formally end the Rugby year, our presentation night was held at Massey Park Golf Club - one hundred people attending. Thank you Larry Thompson for organising all aspects of Rugby's social calendar.

So, 1985 has come and gone; what about the future?

In the short-term, provided we keep our current players, coaches and administrators, we will continue to be competitive, without domination.

Our long term prospects will depend solely on our ability to attract new blood to the club. The current crop of players are getting older, so the prospects of running out of Golden Oldies seems unlikely. The future lies in the local area, the school venue being the most attractive. To successfully achieve recruitment through the school medium, we need a very strong administration base, which can cope with the added work load. Our current resources are stretched to the limit, so new administration blood must surface.

Rugby is at the crossroads. It has a base for success in the future provided more players and members are willing to become involved in the short-term for long-term success.

#### KENTWELL CUP FOOTBALL REPORT

Despite losing 20-10 to Matraville in the Grand Final, the 1985 Season was certainly a success story for the Kentwell Cup team. Highlights of the season were -

- Grandfinalists
- Defeating Colleagues 28-0 in the semi-final

- An all-time record score in Kentwell Cup, when the team won 72-0.
- Scoring 65 tries in the season including 9 in the finals.

The team scored 396 points to 189 against.

I believe the success of the team compared to last year's can be attributed to a number of factors. We recruited some very good new players and the club owes a lot to Owen Moore for encouraging his mates to have a game with the Briars. There certainly was a lot more dedication to fitness, both pre-season and during the season – two nights a week training is a must for Kentwell Cup. Backline play continued to develop (look at the number of tries!) and some less experienced players of previous years became valuable contributors to the team. Finally, and I believe most importantly, the team was not prepared to settle for second best. Its been a long time since a Briars team came off the ground after winning by 20 points and been very disappointing in the way they played. The expectations of the team was such that anything but total effort and concentration was not good enough.

As a coach I was most pleased to see our football skills develop in three particular areas. Undoubtedly, the moves developed within the backline complemented the big, hard running back, who, at times, devastated the opposition. Line-outs skills improved dramatically despite still having no "big" men, whilst the rolling maul by the Briars forwards completely outclassed opposing teams.

For next season we must continue to look to recruitment, particularly we need those big second row/back row forwards in line-outs. A more consistent approach to the goal kicking task throughout the club again is essential. There is also a fundamental need to introduce a programme for the younger players in the club who have the basic requirements of size and speed to more quickly develop their individual skills and positional play. I'm sure we have 4 or 5 players in the lower grades that, given the proper direction and encouragement could make the top team and Phil England certainly showed the way at the end of the season.

Before looking at the individual contributors to the team, special mention must be made of Tony Wozniak and Terry O'Kane who were selected and played in the representative team; Brent Cash who was selected but could not play; Garry Neate, who deservedly won the best and fairest and added significantly to our forward skills and Joe Lancuba whose final series effort demonstrated to all that he was the best half in the competition.

The team was:-

Aron Maher/Full back - Improved greatly this year in all his skills and positional play. Is going to be one of the stars in 1986.

**David Guille – Fullback.** Top effort to come back late in the season and made a more than significant contribution. David may look 40 but played like a 25 year old.

Brent Cash - Wing. Scored 13 tries and undoubtedly could succeed in grade football. Great season.

**Ross Maclaine** – **Wing.** Bigger than all the forwards and faster than all the backs, Ross was a great acquisition. Should play in the representative team next year and I hope he brings a few of his Lane Cove mates with him.

**Owen Moore – Centre.** Devastating player who had all the opposition bluffed. Got a lot more room this year and took every advantage.

Mal Webber - Centre. What a comeback - The Michael Hawker of the Briars, Mal always made the advantage line. Great defensive effort throughout the season.

Tony Cooper - Five-eight. Very skilful player who was the perfect link. A late season injury was a tremendous blow. Combined his skill with a big heart.

Brian Hurley - Centre. Went on a weight training program in the off season. That was certainly noticeable - he put on weight ! A change in program will see Brian with the Kentwell Cup next year.

**Peter H. Hansen** – **Five-eight.** Harry played two seasons – the first bit and the last bit. Great hands and showed his defensive expertise in the final against the mountains. Perhaps a full season next year Harry ?

Joe Lancuba – Half. If everyone showed the same dedication and will to win as Joe, we would win every game. A quite gifted player who is now the complete half back.

**Bob Bishop** – Lock. A number of serious injuries interrupted Bob's game this year but I've no doubt he still has one big year left. Talent is ageless Bob.

John Jessup – Breakaway. Went on the same program as Brian. By the end of the season JJ was back to his very best.

In conclusion, I've no doubt that in 1986, if the team can display the same dedication and discipline, that we can win the Cup. The objective must be to finish the home and away games in the top two – from there, no one will beat the Briars in 1986.

Its been a great pleasure to be associated with such a fine group of men, who became a "nearly great" team.

#### BURKE CUP FOOTBALL

Whilst improving on last year's performance, the 1985 Burke Cup side again did not ply consistently or to its full capacity, finishing seventh for the season with Fifteen competition points. 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### GOLDEN OLDIES RUGBY REPORT

This, the third Golden Oldies Rugby Report to appear in the Club's Annual Report, is somewhat unique in that it has been compiled on Japan Airlines Flight No. 771 out of Tokyo on which most of the Briars Golden Oldies Rugby Team are returning to Sydney after the 1985 London Festival and European Tour.

As most reports in this journal will refer to statistics, I will take care of just a few of those at the outset:-

Total Number of Tourists – 52 comprising 31 Gentlemen 19 Ladies

2 Children

Number of Players (rugby) - 29

Total miles travelled to reach Festival – 13,057

Leading Try Scorer – David Hales (runner-up Rod Smith II)

Number of times luggage handled on tour -39

Number of bread rolls and croissants consumed for breakfast after leaving London -1,910

Number of gallons of beer drunk on tour -- (not available at time of going to print)

Most fined tourist - Gordon Dunlop - primarily for foreign currency violations.

As you can see, the actual results of the rugby games played is of secondary importance in the true spirit of Golden Oldies Rugby but I am happy to report that the Briars were able

to pass on the trophy inherited from the Glenfield Grizzlies in the 1983 Festival for never having won a match in international competition in the **VERY FIRST** game of the 1985 Festival. Our hapless victims were the Old Vulgarians from England who had no answer to the thoughtful match strategies painstakingly devised before the match by guest selectors Larry Thompson and David Guille. Fresh from a moving Opening Ceremony on the hallowed turf of Twickenham, the Briars, sent on the field at London Irish with the specific match plan of scoring more points than the opposition, thrilled the spectators lurking around the beer tent with a powerhouse display of superb running rugby, scoring, I think, 4 tries to 2. After this match the organisers presented Briars with a bottle of scotch for being selected as the best-dressed team to play on the London Irish ground that day. Many other compliments were received throughout the Festival week in respect of the Briars Blazer which served to identify our Club very effectively, although the girl checking us in at Narita Airport on the way home has to be excused for asking whether we had been in Japan for a song and dance Festival !

The second game against Richmond saw the Briars beaten by a better team on the day. We played well in this match but were up against an impressive outfit with a couple of exinternationals who regularly play together at Club level for about 15 matches per season. It is my unpleasant duty to advise that Peter Burt (who otherwise toured without blemish) was the guest selector for this match and must shoulder a fair proportion of the blame for the result. A well executed try by the red-shorted Doug Staniforth was roundly applauded by both teams although Doug's conversion of his own try was the subject of such conjecture. Sporting a can of XXXX and a grin from ear to ear, Doug granted a rare interview to a British T.V. crew, part of which, I believe, was shown on a Sydney channel. Club Patron, Bob Clark, was present at this match and we were proud to have Bob join us for the official team photo.

The Boston Brahmins from the ol' US of A were next and a closely contested draw was a fitting result for the last game of the Festival. Several Briars played for the Brahmins who were a little short of numbers and, I regret to say, went to no end of trouble to involve themselves in several "ugly" incidents with members of the bona fide Briars side. The guest selector plan was abandoned by ananimous consent for this match and the usual chaos, presided over by Robbo and Stanno, prevailed.

All three Festival games were followed by the traditional after-match celebrations with rugby enthusiasts from all over the world drinking and yarning together and thoroughby enjoying themselves. Little can be said in an official publication such as this about the goings-on between matches but all personnel who fell below the standards expected of a rugby tourist were duly fined in a fair and just manner, with the reasons for each fine being handed down by His Honour, Mr. Justice Burt. Although no records of judgments were kept, for obvious reasons, the fines levied amounted to a total of 110 Deutschmarks plus the value of a quantity of cheese purchased at a cheese factory out of Amsterdam.

After the London Festival, we travelled via Oxford to Amsterdam, where we played the 4th and final match on tour. Like the Richmond game the Amstel-Veen side were too big and

experienced for our lads and a loss was recorded, due also to the loss of players with injuries and of players who did not tour Europe, not to mention the effect that the rigours of touring were having on our team. It is interesting to note that the philosophy of Golden Oldies Rugby has not yet been fully understood by the senior sides in England and Europe where most of the older rugby players play regularly in local competitions, unlike our side which came together for this tour. Without wishing to detract from the fun, friendship and fraternity aspects of Golden Oldies, I would recommend that the Briars play more Golden Oldies games between Festivals. After the Amstel--Veen game the apres-rugby atmosphere was the same as elsewhere with the Briars being treated to goot zupe and draft Heineken Beer in the Club house next to the field.

Leaving Amsterdam, the tour continued through Rudesheim, Munich, Venice, Lucerne, Paris, Trier and finally home via Tokyo.

The Fifth International Golden Oldies Rugby Festival will be held in Auckland, New Zealand from 3 May to 10 May, 1987. Our intention at the time of writing is to enter two teams, one in the 35–40 years category and another in the over 40's category. We would especially like to see those who have played Golden Oldies Rugby for Briars since 1983 but who were unable to tour in 1985, make a commitment to tour in 1987. In addition, all Briars who will turn 35 by 1987 are invited to join the Golden Oldies **NOW** in readiness for the 1987 Tour.

I would like to thank all tourists and also those who played in the games against Wests Black Knight and the Central Coast Seagulls this year for their support. Finally, the Golden Oldies wish to express their appreciation of the financial assistance provided by the individuals who reached into their pockets in response to our fund-raising activities.

Playing in a new competition format, two grades above what we played in 1984, i.e. A2 grade, the A side performed with credit, creating a good base for a very successful season in 1986.

Prior to the season starting there was an air of expectancy amongst the A grade squad, as we viewed the opening round. Our pre-season games had given us confidence and an opportunity to try out different combinations.

The first match against Manly did not get off to a good start. Before the opening whistle Sandor Kovacs broke a bone in his hand while practising. An accident that kept him out of the game for a few weeks. The 1-1 result in that game was a big boost to the side, although we were well aware of shortcomings such as basic skills in trapping and passing and a chronic lack of fitness. Before the 1986 season begins, much time must be given to physical fitness, not only to take advantage of good starts, but also to help sharpen our mental approach to the games. Often, especially with the 6 draws we had, we would score first and have the opposition in trouble, only to loosen up and allow them to score within minutes of our scoring. This was particularly noticeable against Gordon, Ryde and the second match against Parramatta – games we could and should have won.

After three games in the first round, we had 4 points with 1 win against Western Suburbs 2–1 and 2 draws against Manly and Gordon 2–2. Due to rain we were forced to play two of our harder games on Sundays, after tough Saturday games. This demoralised the team somewhat, especially the 0–7 loss to North Sydney and to a lesser extent 0–4 to Sydney University.

We finished the first round with 7 points, about 5th place on the table. The June period saw us play very little hockey at all, so when we started the second round with a 2-1 win over Manly, playing some of our most skilful hockey to date, we had reason to look forward to making the top 4. However this was not to be, even with the return to Briars of Bob Streeter and Colin Huggett, we could not lift our game enough to swing vital matches our way. Fitness was a major factor here as was the lack of real commitment by players to the team concept. Attendance at practice was adequate at best, but despite these problem areas, I feel the team as a whole and individuals within the team, developed a great deal during the season.

Factions within the team also dissipated as the season wore on. This contributed greatly to team spirit.

I would like to thank all the players for their support and encouragement this season. A

special thanks to Robert Wood and Mike Sterry whose advice on team matters made my job much more enjoyable and more effective than it would otherwise have been.

## THE TEAM:

## L. KOVACS – Goalkeeper:

Laszlo once again had a very up and down season. Initially his enthusiasm helped produce some outstanding goalkeeping, this being reflected in the fact he led best and fairest for most of the first round. He lost confidence towards the end of the first round, especially in static situations. Needs to be more aware of his surroundings and to concentrate more. A very good team man.

#### D. ROMEO – Goalkeeper:

Dominic came into his own for the last few games of the season. He proved to be fearless in defence and with a greater degree of fitness and tactical sense could develop into a fine keeper for the club. Needs to ensure he is properly protected when playing, i.e. gloves, etc.

#### P. JONES – Full back:

Peter started out the season well, tackling with aggression and using his long, powerful hit well. He had difficulty adapting to the new style of defensive play introduced and this probably led to a deterioration of his play as the season progressed. Peter had a preference for the forward line, scoring the first time he was given the opportunity to play there. Basic skill levels and fitness need to be worked on. Always willing to learn and was a consistent participant at practice.

## R. WOOD - Full back:

With the commitments and a suspect knee Robert had this year, he played well above what could have been expected. Robert's biggest enemy is himself through a lack of confidence in his undoubted ability. His runs forward to link up with the forwards on attack and his fine tackling were the highlights of his play. He also adapted well to his new defensive role. Excellent team man. Thanks for your support and encouragement, Robert.

## **B. STREETER** – Full back:

Bob joined the team in the second half of the season providing solid support at the back. His tackling and power hitting were a much needed addition to the defence. He needed a push every now and again to map himself back into the game. Fitness would need a lot of work if Bob wishes to be competitive next year.

## D. STERRY - Right Half:

Overall, Derek had a very disappointing season. A lack of motivation seemed to be the main reason for this, as the one or two times he became worked up, he showed the team that he has some very good, basic skills and a feel for the game.

### M. WOOD - Centre Half:

Did not play up to his own expectations. He spent the first round as centre half but had difficulty distributing the ball laterally. The second half of the season was spent as a full back which was much more suited to overseeing the pattern of play the team was adopting.

## S. SCHOMBERG – Left Half:

Steve was the opposite to most of us. He started slowly and after a remark made which dented his pride, his motivation and commitment to the game at hand was an example to the rest of the team. He went on to win the Best & Fairest award for A grade. Steve played left half in the first round and centre half in the second. His stability and tenacity proved a real headache for opposition attacks. Steve should spend time on his hitting and trapping skills. Another good team man who always endeavoured to attend practice and encouraged others.

## G. PRICE - Right Wing:

For a player with his speed and ability, Gerard had an indifferent season, scoring only 2 goals. Lost opportunities, a lack of fitness and commitment during the game, handicapped not only his enjoyment of the game but also the overall effect he had on the opposition. He was great breaking down the wing, using his speed but very slow to come back to form up into a defensive grouping after the attack broke down.

#### N. STERRY – Inside Right:

Nigel proved his usefulness during this season, playing in three different positions. He prefers the left side of the field but when asked to take on the inside right position mid-way through the season, he performed with credit, combining well with both the right wind and centre forward. He spent most of the season there but also took on the positions of inside left and left half. Basic speed is an area Nigel should work on for next season.

#### **R. ROBERTS** – Centre Forward:

Russell's positional play and acceleration with the ball were good. Russell scored 11 goals during the season but did not live up to the potential he most definitely has. Very hesitant between the 25-yard line and the top of the circle. Had periods where he lost concentration but once again fitness could see that problem overcome.

#### A. DECLASE - Inside Left:

Andre is a very talented player but one who does not fit well into a team game. He allowed situations to effect his game too often, although he controlled his emotions greatly this year (no red cards). He started the season as inside right but the right side combination failed to click, so he moved across to the inside left position, one that seemed to bring out his passing ability more. If he can learn to become a team player, with his skill he would become a key player in the side.

## P. PRICE - Left Wing:

Paul has matured a lot this year as a hockey player. He gained confidence to the point where he was picking up crosses with ease and cracking them past the approaching goal-keeper. He picked up 5 very good goals. If he can commit himself right from the start of next season, he will be one of the most valuable players the team will have. Well done, Paul, a very versatile player of the future.

#### C. HUGGETT – Inside Right:

Colin rejoined the Club midway through the second round playing inside right from the outset. His first game was exceptionally good. He later found the pace of some of the better teams too much for him which led to poorer performances towards the end of the season. Colin has great potential given a good fitness base.

# Individual Players –

Matthew McFarlane – Goal-keeper: Has the ability to be a good goalie. He made some excellent saves during the season and started to learn when to come out and when not to come out. ## **UNDER 13's HOCKEY REPORT**

This current season has been a great one for Junior Hockey, especially so for the U-13's team, not because we finished the season seventh out of the ten teams in the competition but because the thirteen kids that participated in this team can now play hockey <u>confidently</u> and enjoy it. Something that every sportsman/woman tries to achieve. In every competition you get winners and losers. We were at the end of August, I feel, definite winners for the boys and for the future of Briars Hockey.

The boys have learnt to push the ball, run into a gap, pass it when called upon to do so, and so on. They have acquired a sense of field positioning. They have quite amazed me for U-13 hockey players, both on and off the field.

The competition this year was very diverse. Some of the teams were extremely good and some were not so good. Briars on the whole were only learners at the commencement of the season, but definitely not learners at the end of the season. The growth of hockey skills in all aspects of the game has been phenomenal from some of the boys. Overal! their confidence in themselves and their coach has been my greatest achievement with them this season.

I note here an example of this fact. Briars at the end of the season played in the Parramatta U-13 Carnival which included seventeen other teams from the Sydney Metropolitan Area and one Newcastle Area representative side. We unfortunately (or so I thought) had been drawn in the pool to play this team. The last of the preliminary games for the day provided a crowd of 500 or more the pleasure of watching us play the Newcastle team. I might also add the fact that only four of the boys had played hockey before, an achievement in itself and for the future strength of Briars Hockey, my ultimate aim.

#### Team Synopsis:

**GOALKEEPER** – (Daniel Thiele): Definitely the find for Briars Junior Hockey in 1985. He has got the ability to become a representative player in his own right. He must learn to anticipate the movement of the ball to other players in the D. He must not get caught out of position following the ball.

**LEFT BACK** – (Shaun Rohrlach (V-Capt): Easily the best player at the start of the season, but fell away as the season ended. Must learn to look around and then direct the free hit to gaps in the field.

**RIGHT BACK** – (Spencer Golechtly): Another improver who has learned and improved as the season progressed. Blitzed Newcastle forwards in final game. Must keep on tackling back when beaten by faster players and also improve by not trying to 'belt the leather' off the ball on the free hits. **CENTRE HALF** – (Graham Varis (Capt.)): Also a very capable player at the start of the season. Must learn to distribute the ball to team's forwards and not hang on to the ball too long. Finished the season strongly, nearly taking the Best & Fairest.

**RIGHT HALF** – (Andrew Berghuis): Always gave a solid performance on the field, never gave up trying and as an U-11's player, has learned a great deal this year. With steady application, he also has the ability to develop into a future representative player.

**LEFT HALF** – (Adam Byrn): Adam's performances this season were very up and down. He has the basic skills and thinking as a half but should learn to play against the opposition and not the umpire, on the field.

**RIGHT WING** -(Marcus Thiele): Improved as the season progressed. Runs very well with the ball and as an U-11's, is not afraid to tackle the bigger blokes. He will improve as he grows older and bigger.

**INSIDE RIGHT** – (Mathew Titmus): The most improved forward in the line up. As an inside forward he must run onto the 'Um' ball and tackle back to assist his halves. Got goal hungry in last few games. Keep it up, it's what Briars hockey needs.

**CENTRE FORWARD – (David Allen):** He has, through the season, improved because he practises what he has learnt, such as dribbling the ball, using the back-stick, but he must, as any forward should, learn that he cannot beat the clever players in the opposing team and therefore must learn to pass the ball after receiving it from his halves to his inside forwards and then run into a gap and anticipate a return pass.

**INSIDE LEFT** – (Reuben Brown): He has also improved as the season progressed. Must learn to run on to the ball and remember that playing hockey, you can tackle and dispossess even the bigger boys (and girls).

**LEFT WING** – (Ronald Tapia): Tried hard all year and combined well with his centre half and inside left to make many breaks up the wing. Must learn to turn on the wing and centre the ball on the freestick.

WING FORWARD – (Michael Ackroyd): Another Under 11's player who stood tall with the big boys. He has plenty of speed and ball control. He certainly can play hockey, as the Newcastle team found out. Thanks for filling in on the many occasions.
