WOMENS SPORT AT BRIARS---HOCKEY AND NETBALL





One must never forget that the clubs' origins were at the end of WWI, in 1918, which was a quite different Australian society to today.

Briars club moved with changes in society, however one could never say that is was at the forefront of change.

A male dominant sporting club from inception, Briars members and administrators were overall a conservative lot and resisted change.

The most obvious case was that of Women in the club, forbid talking of Women's Sport or Women sporting members.

The baby boomers shocked the established Briars ways when they joined..." just look at the length of their hair", he's a "red ragger", not mirroring the accepted Briars conservative views, certainly created waves.

In the late 60's women were allowed in the club premised on certain occasions, but not past the lounge area and beyond a hump in the floor that delineated more than the two joined building that formed the club premises.

Focus Newsletter, November 1973

The decision to allow females into the Club Rooms at all times has been deferred until September 1974, which means until that time the girls are permitted into the Club at any time"

Focus Newsletter, November 1974

"Following a report from the Members A' Representative of complaints about the use of the Club by women at any time, it was decided that they will only be allowed in after organised sport or for any special function. However, this has not been implemented because the President at the Annual Meeting last year said that the members would decide the issue. The Club Annual Meeting will be held on Friday, 13th December."

THE GREAT DEBATE

"The great debate of the moment is: "Should women be allowed into the Club at any time?" This important issue will be put before the members at the Annual General Meeting. The present situation, governed by the Articles of Association of the Club, is that female guests are permitted into the Club on Thursday and Saturday nights. This rule however, has been relaxed experimentally for six months prior to the Annual General Meeting.

A decision to permit female guests into the Club at any time, would involve a change in the Articles of Association of the Club, as well as a review by the Licencing Commission. So, there it is:

Should a member be able to bring a female guest to the Club at any time or should the Briars remain as was originally intended, a sporting club for men?

This important issue will be put before the members at the Annual General Meeting.

Focus Newsletter, September 2000

"Whilst the Female Membership Information Night on 7 July was not overly patronized, there was a lively discussion and a number of points were brought up which have been considered by the Information Steering Group. A further paper should be distributed for the information of members and, concurrently, each sport has been asked to provide details of the possible development of women 's teams within their sport."

Focus Newsletter, December 2000

"The issue of female membership has been the subject of discussion at an Information Night held in July. There were several additional points arising out of that meeting and a final issues paper will be issued shortly. Board will be discussing this matter at the December meeting and a recommendation will be made to members, probably with the distribution of the issues paper. The AGM will be held on Friday, 16 February 2001 followed by an EGM to vote on the amendment of the club's articles to allow female membership. The meeting has been brought forward one week due to the club's commitment to the ANZ International Golf Tournament. Please diarise as your attendance will ensure a representative vote of club members."

Focus Newsletter, April 2001

"Female membership - at the EGM held after the AGM on 16 February 2001 a change of articles to allow females to apply for membership of the club was put to those attending the meeting. The vote to amend the articles was carried unanimously after an opportunity was given to discuss the issue. This was a historic moment in the club's history and the input of members into the information process leading up to the EGM is appreciated."

The early days of Briars female sport began in the 1970 in Hockey and later in the 1990's in Netball.

Nevertheless, Briars did support women's sporting teams as far back as 1977. The Rosebuds women's hockey teams were made up of girlfriends and wives of Briars members and were somewhat supported by the club in an unofficial manner.

SPRING IS HERE, AND THE ROSEBUDS ARE BLOOMING ...

The Rosebuds Women's Hockey team have distinguished themselves by playing in the Grand Final in their inaugural year. During 1976, the wives and girlfriends of Briars sportsmen decided that anything the men can do, the women can do better. Thus in 1977 saw a women's hockey team formed under the direction of Jenny Guille. Legend has it that Personnel Chairman Greg McPhee suggested the name - Rosebuds. Maroon and Gold were adopted as the team's colours. The team entered the 4th Grade of the Ryde-Eastwood competition. During the season, the Rosebuds won nine out of twelve games played. This is an excellent record for their first season, especially when it is considered that only eight players were available for the first competition game. The Rosebuds had convincing wins over the Panthers and the Wanderers but close games with the Ryde Rebels, the eventual Premiers. Bob Streeter, Briars A Grade Hockey Captain, coached the team towards a successful season. Jill Kennedy and Leah Walker were voted by their peers as the team's most useful players.

To make sure that the Rosebuds don t wilt, plans are in action to enter two teams in the 1978 competition. The girls have demonstrated their enthusiasm by six of them qualifying for C Grade Umpire Theory Badges.
